PERFORMING ARTS




Choir Auditions for Next Year are Open!



PPS MASKING UPDATE

On Wednesday, May 11, Multnomah County health officials updated COVID-19 guidance given the current surge in cases. The Multnomah County Health Department now recommends that masks be worn <u>indoors</u> until coronavirus case counts and hospitalizations fall. The current increase in COVID-19 cases <u>is expected</u> to peak in mid-June near the end of the PPS's school year.

In alignment with public health guidance, Portland Public Schools strongly recommends that all staff and all students wear masks at schools, in district office buildings and at other indoor events beginning Monday May 16th. This recommendation includes masking at important end-of-year events such as proms, school performances, assemblies and indoor graduation events.

<u>Summer Scholars</u> registration opens on Monday, May 16th. Portland Summer Scholars is a high school credit recovery program for students who need to retake a course required for graduation. The pace of our program is somewhat intense in nature due to the condensed time frame we operate in. While most semester courses meet over the span of 18 weeks, our Summer Scholars classes meet for 3 hours per day for 13 days straight. Students will earn .5 credit for each class they successfully complete.

There will be two sessions for students to take courses this Summer:

Session 1: June 27th- July 14thSession 2: July 18th- August 3rd

<u>In-person</u> classes will be held Monday - Friday, 9:00am-12:00pm at each of the sites listed below.

Online classes will be held Monday - Friday, 1:00p - 4:00pm.

Courses will be offered at four High School locations across the Portland Area

- Grant High School
- Franklin High School
- McDaniel High School
- Roosevelt High School

Interested in enrolling? For students who are interested in recovering credit through Summer Scholars, they should meet with their high school counselor to review their transcript and choose the appropriate course(s). Portland Summer Scholars follows a prioritization process for situations when classes fill up to a maximum capacity. Our prioritization process, based on the current school year, is as follows: PPS Seniors PPS Juniors, Credit Recovery and Credit Deficient, PPS Sophomores, Credit Recovery and Credit Deficient, PPS Freshmen, Credit Recovery and Credit Deficient, PPS Students (grades 9-11), Credit Advancement, Non-PPS students.

OHSU COVID-19 SCREENING TESTING

K-12 students can sign up to get free weekly COVID-19, PCR tests through their school during the 2021-2022 school year. The Oregon Health Authority (OHA) has contracted with OHSU to provide these tests to participating K-12 schools in Oregon. Grant High School will be participating in this important program. Parents can Opt their students into this program by completing the attached forms (Opt in form + OHSU Authorization form) and return to the main office at Grant HS.

Please note: This partnership program has multiple steps and processes that may take 2-3 weeks before we can distribute a test kit with labels to the student. After submitting paperwork to the Main Office, students should check in every Monday for status.

Our program rolled out on November 15th and continues on Mondays (when school is in session):

Mondays -

Students pick up test kits from the main office as they leave for the day.

Tuesdavs -

Students complete their saliva sample, at home, before they come to school. Then, they bring to school, the labeled saliva sample tube, in the labeled biohazard bag, and drop it off at the main office on their way into school that morning.

Expectation of Communication from OHSU: **OHSU** is committed to sending results to **ALL families within 48 hours.** Positive and inconclusive results will receive a phone call; negative results will generate an email. - Students leaving early must sign out in the Attendance Office, and if returning, sign back in at the main office

HAVING YOUR STUDENT CALLED OUT OF CLASS (informs attendance office)

With notice: You can use this <u>form</u> to let our attendance secretary know that you will need your student called out of class.

Without advanced notice: Please call our Main Line at 503-916-5160. Please do not leave a message as it may not be heard in time.

Data is entered as soon as possible. However, we are not always able to process the large volume of data prior to it activating the auto-dialer, so you may receive a call even though you already reported. All data should be processed by the end of the day.

Graduation is just around the corner for our Seniors!

The graduation of our Class of 2022 is rapidly approaching. This is an exciting time for everyone involved, and we want everything to go as smoothly as possible for you and your family. Here are a few important reminders to help ensure you stay on track to graduate, and be able to participate in the commencement ceremony.

- 1. Continue attending all of your classes and do the best you can until the last day of school. Don't let "senioritis" impact your success. Students who have NOT fulfilled <u>ALL</u> of their credits and other graduation requirements will not be able to participate in the graduation ceremony. This is a district policy, which we cannot alter.
- 2. Remember the "60 Day Rule" (beginning April 2nd). Commencement disqualification: Requiring that seniors be disqualified from participation in commencement exercises and related activities if within 60 school days of the last senior school day (June 2, 2022), they are found to be in violation of district Alcohol or Drug policy or any violation resulting in a three or more days of suspension or more serious disciplinary action. (Reference 4.30.020-AD) Be aware that all school pranks resulting in vandalism or disruption of the school day could also be a violation of this rule, and may result in not being allowed to participate in prom and/or graduation.

Senior Fees/Fines will be shared beginning: Next week

To graduate you must clear all charges to your school account; these could be as far back as middle school. The Grant Bookkeeper, Maggie Vera (mvera@pps.net), is with whom you will make your payment.

Library Overdue Books and/or Fines

Does your senior have overdue books and/or fines? Here's how to check. Your senior student needs to bring back materials or pay any fines owed in order to be cleared to receive their diploma. We understand there are books still being used in class; those will need to be returned on June 2nd & 3rd. Remind your student that when returning their library or textbooks, they should wait for a library staff member to scan in the barcode and confirm their items have been cleared from their record. 




4-Star Hunger Project

Student Body Elections are Happening This Week!



Oregon Health authority warns counterfeit pills laced with illegally manufactured fentanyl, a synthetic opioid, are flooding the Pacific Northwest. Unless a pharmacist directly hands

you a prescription pill, assume it's counterfeit and contains fentanyl. You can get facts about fentanyl from <u>CDC fentanyl facts</u>

The health room is available every school day. We are often asked if we can give out medications like ibuprofen or benadryl. We cannot give out medications to students unless it is provided by parents or guardians.
