The School Climate Handbook contains our mission and vision statement as well as important information about our common-area expectations, discipline policies and acknowledgment systems.

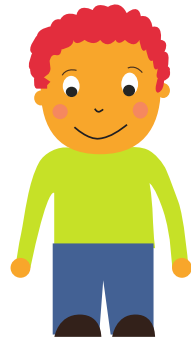
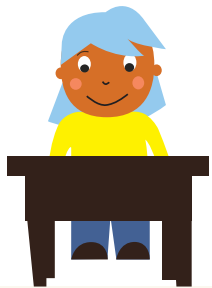
