Seniors may be disqualified from participation in commencement exercises and related activities if within sixty (60) consecutive days of the last senior school day they are found to be in violation of District Drug and Alcohol policy or any violation resulting in a disciplinary action Level 3 or greater.

YDI Scholarship: \$1,000 - 1 Award, Due April 29, 2016

To be eligible for the scholarship, a student must be a resident of the United States, 16 years of age or older and must be enrolled within three months of registration in a qualified high school, college, or university within the US. E-Waste Scholarship: \$1,000 - 2 Awards, Due April 30, 2016

Eligibility: Applicants must be a high school freshman, sophomore, junior or senior or a current or entering college
