Annika Sundstrom, Girls Cross Country: Annika broke 20 minutes for the first time as she finished a close third to her teammate at 19:54 and helped guide her team to an impressive victory over Benson, Barlow, Reynolds and Centennial. She helped lead the Wilson Girls to finish in places 2-8.

Caleb Seely, Boys Cross Country: Caleb led his team to a victory over Barlow, Reynolds and Benson and ran 16:11 for 5k. Thanks to Caleb's leadership the Wilson team had the first four finishers and seven of the top ten.

WILSON HIGH SCHOOL IS PROUD TO ANNOUNCE OUR NATIONAL MERIT SCHOLARSHIP COMMENDED STUDENTS AND SEMIFINALISTS!

The National Merit Scholarship Program is an academic competition for recognition and college scholarships. Approximately 1.6 million high school juniors enter the competition each year by taking the PSAT in their junior year. Of those 1.6 million, two-thirds of the top 2% earn Commended Student status, while the top one-third go on to the semi-final stage of the competition. Commended Students do not continue in the competition, but they may become candidates for special scholarships sponsored by corporations and businesses. Around 16,000 Semifinalists, representing less than 1% of high school seniors, will now have the opportunity to continue in the competition for up to 7500 National Merit Scholarships worth \$33 million.

Semifinalists and their high school submit a detailed scholarship application that includes academic record, participation in school and community activities, leadership, employment, and honors and awards received. Applicants also write an essay and must earn SAT scores that confirm the earlier PSAT scores. About 15,000, or 90%, of the Semifinalists will advance to Finalist standing, and about half of those will win a National Merit Scholarship. The nationwide pool of Semifinalists represents less than 1% of high school seniors. Finalists will be notified in February of 2017.

You must attend one workshop before you can get a letter of recommendation from your counselor.

COUNSELOR'S CORNER

Wilson counselors have a combined length of experience of over 75 years of helping teens and their parents navigate the high school experience. Check this space each month for helpful tips for parents of high school students, starting this month with **Ten Tips to Help Parents Understand the Adolescent Brain:**

- 1. The thinking, reasoning, and decision-making part of the adolescent brain (the prefrontal cortex) isn't done developing until the mid-late 20's. . . Adults in an adolescent's life can help by modeling healthy problem-solving and decision-making.
- 2. Model the behaviors you want your adolescent to engage in. . . Often our children become who we are.
- 3. Adolescents interpret emotional expressions and body language differently than adults. . . Let your teen know if you are tired or sad or frustrated, otherwise they may think you are mad at them which can unnecessarily increase conflict.
- 4. Sleep is essential. . . It is the time during the day that the brain decides what information to keep and what to get rid of.
- 5. Substances such as alcohol, tobacco, and other drugs can structurally change the adolescent brain. . . Adolescence is an intense developmental period—the brain is very sensitive to the harmful effects of powerful chemicals during this time
- 6. Risk-taking and exploring are an important part of adolescent development. . . Adults can help create opportunities for adolescents to take healthy risks and practice making choices on their own.
- 7. Encourage healthy activities as experiences shape and mold the adolescent brain. . . The adolescent brain is busy making connections—if a certain part of the brain isn't used those neurons will be pruned away—like a tree. Encourage your adolescent to engage in activities they want hardwired.
- 8. Have clear and consistent expectations and consequences. . . Make sure teens know the "rules to the game" before they start playing.
- 9. Problem-solve when everyone is calm. . . Remember—it is hard to think clearly or retain information when you are angry. Adolescents tend to respond to conflict using the primal, emotional center of their brain rather than their underdeveloped prefrontal cortex.
- 10. Listen more than lecture. . . Really hear what your adolescent is saying—share adult wisdom by practicing what you want to preach.
