

How can your autism consultant support you?

Coaching

When you are supporting a student with an educational eligibility of ASD and in need of some ideas to support the student, the autism team can help. We can come out to your building, meet with you, chat about what the students goals are, observe the student in their classroom and work with the team to develop some ideas to support the student.

Professional Development

We are available to come to your building to provide professional development that is meaningful to your staff. Whether it is a whole building professional development about characteristics of autism or a small group presentation on providing accommodations and modifications, Pivotal Response Training or Social Thinking, we are able to personalize professional development for your team, para-educators, or general education teachers. Contact your autism consultant to set up a professional development opportunity for your building.

Attend Team Meetings

If your building has a special education team meeting, let us know! A great way to get to know the team, talk about students and be proactive in our support is to join teams for their teaming time. Include your autism consultant in your special education team meetings!

Complex ASD Evaluations

Evaluating students is a complex process. Sometimes we run into students where we are trying to distinguish between multiple disability categories or the team still has questions after completing parts of the evaluation. Given these situations, the team can apply for a Complex ASD Evaluation. The form is available on our website under "Complex Evaluations." Fax the form into the BESC and we will get back to you to support your team.


ASD Library


