Classroom Visit Highlights This Week

Here's a graphic way of helping children self-assess. In order to keep the focus on learning, it's important for students to consider why they are or are not successful when expressing an answer to any specific question.



Kindergarten: More reading and writing groups where children were able to show their knowledge of letter sounds.

First grade: Learning targets form the foundation of every math lesson.

Second grade: Class meetings show children are able to listen to each other and empathize.

Third grade: Learning how to read complicated graphs (and materials pick-up was fun!).

Fourth grade: Complicated coding and science challenges abounded! Wow!

Fifth grade: Making math meaningful, it's about the thinking, not the answers.

Forest Park teachers continue to pull out all the stops to ensure students are actively engaged with their learning every day. Distance teaching is a challenge that doesn't daunt our incredibly dedicated staff. They are here for you and your children!

Talented and Gifted

TAG Update and Reminders - for the month of DECEMBER

An updated version of the FPE TAG Plan is available in the link and on the District website.

TAG stands for Talented and Gifted. Students can be identified as TAG in one, two or three areas, which are reading, math, and intellectual. The identification comes when a student scores in the 95th or above percentile on nationally normed tests that are selected by the TAG department. You can begin by opening a dialogue with your child's teacher. Students can be nominated for TAG by parents and/or teachers. A nomination form acts like a permission slip to have your child tested in the area(s) selected. You can also access the nomination form for Forest Park Elementary here. All nomination forms are due to your child's teacher no later than the updated day of DEC 4th, 2020. Late applications are not accepted. Your child's state testing scores from the previous year may also qualify your child for TAG eligibility. The TAG department has mailed the postcards identifying students whose Winter 2020 state testing scores were in the 95th or above percentile in reading and/or math. If you received a post card and would like your child to be identified as TAG in reading and/or math you will still need to complete a nomination form (linked above). There is no additional testing required in those areas (reading and math) if you received one of those postcards. Please note you may have received one of the post cards even if your child is already identified as TAG in reading or math. If this is the case, you do not need to complete a nomination form.

Completed TAG nomination forms are due Friday DEC 4th, 2020, for those who received letters from the District TAG office that your student(s) scored in the 97th-99th percentile on their SBAC or are being considered as TAG potential. Visit the District tag website for the nomination forms in your home language. Once the parent sections and signature have been completed, your student's teacher will complete a similar form as well as the TAG Facilitator Form that I complete.

There will not be any announcements of student TAG Identifications before the new year.

Reminder: If your child has been identified as TAG in the past while in PPS, that eligibility will be continued until graduation. Children do not need to be re-nominated. Teachers have all received class lists of their TAG-identified students and what area(s) they are identified in (math, reading and/or intellectually gifted).
