Counselor's Corner

Thank you to all the families who showed up to support their student's learning during conferences. When students see parents engage with the school, they understand that we are a team for their growth and development. During the month of November, Skyline will be highlighting the IB learner profile trait Inquirer. Helping students become enquirers involves nurturing their curiosity and helping them develop a love of learning. Guidance lessons this month will focus on helping kids develop a growth mindset about their learning. Carol Dweck, author of *Mindset, the New Psychology of Success*, explains mindset:

"In a fixed mindset students believe their basic abilities, their intelligence, their talents, are just fixed traits. They have a certain amount and that's that, and then their goal becomes to look smart all the time and never look dumb. In a growth mindset students understand that their talents and abilities can be developed through effort, good teaching and persistence. They don't necessarily think everyone's the same or anyone can be Einstein, but they believe everyone can get smarter if they work at it."

You can help your student develop a growth mindset by focusing on the learning process rather than the outcome, encouraging them to take ownership of their learning, and helping them recognize the connection between the effort they put into things and the amount of learning that results.

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Building Fluency Through Repeated Reading

What is fluency?

Fluency is reading words with no noticeable mental effort. It is having mastered word recognition skills to the point of overlearning. Fundamental skills are so "automatic" that they do not require conscious attention (Big Ideas in Beginning Reading website). Fluency has three components: accuracy, rate (speed), and prosody (expression). Fluency is not speed reading, it's automatic reading.

How can I support my student's fluency development?

One strategy is repeated reading.

What is repeated reading?

Repeated reading is reading a passage **out loud** 3-4 times (there does not appear to be a benefit to reading a passage more than 4 times).

How does repeated reading work?

Start by having your student read the story or passage out loud to you, with a focus on reading the words correctly. If your student makes a mistake, tell him/her the correct word, have him/her repeat the correct word, and then read the entire sentence over again from the beginning.

After reading the story once, start your repeated readings. Repeated readings don't have to be the same thing each time! You can mix it up using the following activities.

Choral Reading

- Pick 2-3 paragraphs from the story (or the whole story if it is short).
- Read those paragraphs together, with the adult setting an appropriate pace.
 - The pace should not be so fast that your student cannot keep up, but not so slow that your student does not benefit from the activity.
 - While reading with your student, model appropriate intonation, expression, phrasing, etc.

Echo Reading

*This is a good option for students who do not like to choral read.

- Pick 2-3 paragraphs from the story (or the whole story if it is short).
- The adult reads the first sentence, modeling appropriate intonation, expression, phrasing, etc.
- Your student then reads the same sentence immediately after you have finished.
- The adult will begin the next sentence and carry on in this manner until the 2-3 paragraphs are complete.

Slide and Glide with Phrases

- Pick 2-3 paragraphs from the story (or the whole story if it is short).
- Alternate reading phrases with your student:

- Adult will read the first part of the sentence and stop at an appropriate time (e.g., at a comma or a natural break in the sentence), and your student will read the rest of the sentence.
- Try to avoid stopping in the middle of a phrase (the goal is for your student to develop expression by paying attention to the natural pauses within the story)
- The adult will begin the next sentence and carry on in this manner until the 2-3 paragraphs are complete.

Timed Reading

- Your student will read the story out loud for one minute.
- The adult will time the student, while keeping track of any words that the student misses (it's helpful to have a second copy of the story that the adult can read from).
- At the end of the minute, the adult will count up how many words the student read **correctly** in one minute (CWPM).
- After the reading, the adult tells the student how many correct words he/she read and gives feedback on any errors.
- You may choose to do a second timing, with an emphasis on increasing how many correct words are read and decreasing mistakes.
- It can be motivating to record these scores on a table or a simple bar graph, so your student can see improvement from day to day.

Quality Reading

*This is a good option for students who tend to speed read.

- Have your student read the story or a portion of the story out loud, focusing on reading with great expression.
- After the reading, have your student rate the quality of the reading.
- If you do this activity over multiple days, your student can focus on trying to improve his/her quality each day.
