#### **Attendance Procedures**

Regular attendance contributes to success in school. You are encouraged to send your child(ren) to school on time and ready to learn. However, if your child is sick, you are encouraged to keep him/her at home. Please call our office to report absences daily. The number is (503) 916-5700. You may leave a message if you are calling outside of school hours. Upon returning to school, a note signed by parent or guardian is required for any tardy or absence.

#### Accident & Illness

If a child is injured or becomes ill at school, we are not permitted to administer more than emergency treatment. In the case of serious accident or illness, we will try our best to:

- Contact parent(s) or legal guardian
- Contact the given emergency numbers
- Take the child to hospital (if emergencies arise and we are unable to reach you)

Please let us know as soon as possible if there is any change in your home, work, or emergency numbers. It is important that the school has accurate records for illnesses and emergencies.

#### Medication

If it is essential that prescribed medicine be taken at school, the parent shall take a written statement from the doctor to the office indicating diagnosis, name of drug, dosage, and possible reaction to the drug. Medication shall be labeled with the child's name, the name of the drug, dosage, and how long medication should be given. Physician's orders are to be renewed every six months. A permission slip for medication is available in the office for parent signature. Children are not to have medication in classrooms or lockers.

#### Use of Telephone

The school telephone is a business telephone for the school. Except in cases of emergency, we hesitate to call students or teachers from the classroom to talk on the telephone. Students' permission to use the telephone should be limited to emergency calls. A note will be required from a child's teacher if a need exists to use the telephone. The office will be glad to relay important messages to the child. However, we ask that parents avoid calling the school on a frequent basis to communicate messages regarding baby-sitting or supervision changes unless an emergency exists. If necessary, these messages should reach the office well before our 3:00 PM dismissal time. Thanks!

#### **School Meals**

Portland Public Schools provides students healthy and balanced meals at the following prices:

Students may qualify for free or reduced price meals, depending on parents' income or status (Food Stamps or Aid to Dependent Children recipients, Foster Child Care provider, etc.). Please call Nutrition Services at (503) 916-3399 for additional information.

Lunch for students is 11:00 AM, 11:30 AM, or 12:05 PM, depending on grade level. We have a closed campus policy whereby students are expected not to leave the school grounds at Noon unless parents have made arrangements. This, of course, is for the safety of the students.

#### **Inclement Weather**

Information concerning school closures is broadcast on the radio at regular intervals beginning at 6:30 AM. First, schools can be closed. Second, schools can be on a two-hour late opening due to weather. On late opening days, school begins at 10:00 AM. Please do not send your child to school before this time. Finally, early dismissal may be called. It is imperative that your child know what to do in case of an early dismissal.

#### **School Visitations**

Parents are welcome to visit our school. It is important that you sign in at the office upon arrival to let us know you are in the building. We appreciate your cooperation with this request.

Please make arrangements with your child's teacher if you wish to observe in the classroom. Conferences are not convenient during this type of visit, but teachers will be available after school. In order to avoid any conflicts, please call the school office at (503) 916-5700 to arrange for an appointment.

#### Money

Please limit the cash students carry to the amount needed for that day. This helps to avoid any problems with money being lost or stolen.

#### Field Trips

A permission slip will be sent home for each school-sponsored field trip. We must have a signed permission slip by a parent/guardian to allow a student to leave school. We cannot accept handwritten notes or phone calls in place of the field trip form.

It is customary for teachers to take their classes on walking field trips in the school community during the school year. A Walking Field Trip Permission Form will be sent home in the Opening Packet. This permission extends for the entire 2012–13 school year.

#### Damage or Loss of Library Books/Textbooks

Report cards and school records will be withheld for any student who has missing or damaged books for which payment has not been received. The money will be refunded if the materials are found.

All students in the 6th–8th grades will be checking out textbooks this year (in Social Studies, Language Arts, Math, and Spanish). Textbooks are checked out the first week in September and are due on June 1. Some textbooks will be kept in the classroom but others will be taken home as needed. To help alleviate mix-ups, students will write their names in pen on the inside front cover of all textbooks. Students will be responsible for these books and will be expected to pay for any lost books at the end of the year.

#### Lost & Found

A large quantity of jackets, gym clothes, and other items accumulate at school in lost and found. If labels are not used, would you please mark clothing, etc., with a permanent type marker. If these items are labeled or marked, we have a good chance of returning them to the owner. Lost and found articles will be kept in the corner of the cafeteria. If your child is missing something, send him/her to the lost and found table. Parents are invited to check lost and found articles also. Unclaimed items will be sent to the PTA clothing center in June.

#### Promotion/Non-Promotion

Since each student has a unique rate of growth and development, involving a continuous process, student progress and promotion in the Portland Public Schools are determined on the basis of each student.

If a student has failed to achieve the basic skills necessary to succeed at the next level, non-promotion can be considered by the teacher and principal in consultation with parents.

#### Discipline

Students are expected to conduct themselves in a manner that does not interfere with the rights of others (both school personnel and fellow students). All individuals have the right to attend school without fear of being physically or verbally abused. While everyone has the right to express themselves within limits, no student has the right to cause disruptions that interfere with the teacher's responsibility to teach and the students' right to seek a good education.

It is a very small percentage of students who cause discipline problems. Acts that disturb the operation of the school or jeopardize the safety of others will be subject to disciplinary action, based upon classroom guidelines and the Harrison Park School Discipline Plan. Our Discipline Plan follows the District's *Handbook on Student Responsibilities, Rights, and Discipline*.

#### Dress & Grooming

The responsibility for dress and grooming of a student rests with the student and his/her parents or guardians. A student's dress or grooming shall not affect his/ her participation in school-related activities. If, however, it disrupts the educational climate (in the judgement of the staff), or is a threat to the health or safety of the student or any other person, the school has a legitimate concern and may require the student to change his/her dress or grooming.

#### **Objects Brought to School**

Knives, matches, cigarette lighters, fire crackers, guns of any kind, caps, etc., should never be brought to school. Any weapon (simulated or real) requires district- and federal-mandated discipline for the student, which could include expulsion and referral to school police.

We discourage students from bringing toys, cameras, iPods, and electronic devices to school. Students are responsible for their own property. They may become damaged or stolen. We know that some parents want their child to have a cell phone on hand. However, any use during the school day is prohibited. If parents have the need to contact their child during the day, they may call the office.

#### Bicycles & Skateboards

It is recommended that bicycles in the Portland area be registered, and we would suggest that you have your child register his/her bicycle if s/he has not already done so. If bicycles are brought to school, they should be equipped with a lock and be kept locked while at school (bike racks are located at the front of the school). Bicycles are not to be ridden on the playground. State law now requires that youngsters under the age of 15 wear helmets. Skateboards may not be used on school grounds, per District policy.

#### ACTIVITIES & EVENTS

Back to School Night

Harrison Park offers Back to School Night on September 29 so that parents/ guardians have the opportunity to learn about classroom programs. Homeroom teachers provide overviews of their goals and activities for the year. Support staff also are available to answer questions and give insights about their programs.

#### Family Activity Nights

Harrison Park offers Family Activity Nights throughout the year with fun activities for all the family. These events, developed by staff and parents, provide an opportunity for parents to participate in fun learning activities to support their student's education. Some events are curriculum-related while others are simply an opportunity for parents, students, and staff to have a great time together. Last year we held the Apple Harvest, Lunar New Year celebration, Dia Del Niña, Family Math Night, the Harrison Park Art Show, and Title I Reading Night.

#### Family Fitness Fun Nights

With the goal of encouraging fitness and fun activities for families, the Harrison Park PTA has organized Family Fitness Fun Nights for any family wishing to come to the gym for recreational fun. These are held the first Friday of most months in the year (dates are shown on the calendar).

#### Run For The Arts

In the Spring students and staff participate in "Run For The Arts," a jog-a-thon to raise money for art-related performances (musical, dance, puppetry, mime, poetry) and visual arts workshops we bring to Harrison Park School. The support of our parents and community provides many arts learning experiences to enhance our educational program.

#### Academic All Stars

Following 1st, 2nd, and 3rd Quarter, we hold our Academic All Stars celebrations to honor student academic achievement. Students in grades 6–8 earn letter grades. Those students who achieve a GPA (grade point average) of 3.0–3.49 are recognized for Honor Roll. Students who achieve a GPA of 3.5–4.0 are recognized for Principal's List.

#### Field Day

Field Day is held during the last two weeks of school and is coordinated by our PE teacher. This event includes a variety of fun activities that promote physical fitness and good sportsmanship. Students, staff, and parents look forward to this event. Parents are welcomevolunteer to assist with this fun event.

#### Field Trips

Each grade level participates in fund-raising to support field trips related to the curriculum. These trips provide students with hands-on experiences that reinforce what they have learned in class. At Harrison Park, we are fortunate to have excellent support from community partners, enabling our students many opportunities for field trips.

#### **Outdoor School**

Students in 6th grade have the opportunity to attend Outdoor School, an exciting learning experience that provides hands-on learning. This year, Outdoor School will be three days and two nights, with the date not yet determined.

#### **Book Fairs**

During the year, the PTA sponsors Book Fairs to raise funds for Harrison Park. They are a great opportunity for parents to pick up books for their children, with a portion of the funds going to support our program. Last year's PTA-sponosred Book Fair was a great success. They have scheduled the first Book Fair for this year to take place during Conference Week.

#### 82nd Avenue of Roses Parade

SUN staff joined approximately 40 students and their families to walk in the 82nd Avenue of Roses Parade for the second year. Participants showed school pride, wearing black and gold Harrison Park tee-shirts, ribbons, and necklaces.

#### **Building Screening Committee**

The Learning Center staff, school psychologist, and speech and language pathologist participate on the Multidisciplinary Team. This team, in addition to regular staff and administration, forms the Building Screening Committee, which meets to determine the course of action to be taken with students who have been referred for possible assessment. The committee discusses each student presented and, if assessment occurs, makes recommendations about special services or placements. The committee also can serve as a resource to staff and families who seek new ideas and strategies that address the needs of particular students. Parents are consulted throughout the assessment process.

#### Learning Center

Students who qualify for special education assistance in reading, writing, and/or math are eligible to receive services from the Learning Center staff. Supplemental instruction provided to students is coordinated with homeroom teachers and other support programs. The amount of time spent in the Learning Center by a student is dictated by the student's IEP (Individual Education Plan).

#### Title I Program

Title I is a federally-funded program designed to provide support to students needing help in the areas of reading and math. As a learning community, we have focused our attention on reading instruction. Under the direction of Coordinator Michelle Irons, Title I staff work closely with homeroom teachers in order to provide the most effective services possible. The Title I program has been very successful in early intervention for identified primary students and in reading support for students in all grade levels. Title I is responsible for establishing a parent compact that outlines responsibilities of students, parents, teachers, and principal.

#### High School Credit

This year students in 8th grade have the opportunity to earn high school credit. High school credits can be earned in Algebra and Spanish, provided the student successfully completes the program requirements for that class.

#### Talented & Gifted (TAG)

In compliance with the Oregon TAG Mandate for gifted education, Portland Public Schools focuses its services on meeting the student's instructional level and rate of learning every day in the classroom across the curriculum. Classroom teachers assess a student's level and rate in all subject areas and modify the instruction to provide appropriate content challenge and instructional pacing.

To facilitate this approach, the principal is responsible to oversee the identification process, arrange staff development and parent meetings, and act as an on-site resource for gifted education in the school. From the District Office, TAG TOSA's (Teachers On Special Assignment) and Achievement Coordinators assist in identification procedures, alternative program options, staff development, parent meetings, and instructional planning to meet students' needs.


#### Speech & Language

Speech and language services are provided to students with communication disorders, such as articulation, fluency, voice, or language difficulties. The speech/language pathologist diagnoses and provides intervention for students eligible for service based on Oregon State eligibility criteria.

#### School Psychologist

The school psychologist functions as the school's primary link with the district special education services. S/he serves as a member of the Building Screening Committee, which meets regularly to determine plans of action for students with educational needs. If it is determined that assessment is not appropriate for the student, the school psychologist may assist the teacher or staff in developing a building-level plan to meet the particular needs of the student. If the student is to be assessed, it is the responsibility of the school psychologist to obtain written consent from the parent, to get developmental/social history, to administer cognitive and academic tests, to obtain adaptive behavior of classroom behavior checklists, to do student observations, and to obtain medical reports when necessary.

#### School Counselor

The school counselor promotes successful school experiences for all children through group guidance, provides individual counseling and affective classroom activities, and helps students build positive attitudes toward themselves and others. Activities for personal awareness, getting along with others, and problem solving are offered. The counselor can help families contact appropriate community resources and is available to consult with parents about child development, parenting concerns, and the transition to high school.

#### **Physical Education**

The PE program emphasizes physical fitness and developmental skills in addition to various sports activities. Self-confidence is enhanced by goal-setting and progress made toward reaching these goals.

#### Sports

Harrison Park has a strong tradition of successful sports teams thanks to the efforts of volunteer coaches. If we are able to get coaches, this year we will have Cross Country, Volleyball, Soccer, Track, and Basketball. If you are interested in coaching or just want to learn more about these sports, contact the office.

#### Technology

In an effort to increase students' access to technology, computers are located in each classroom. This year, we will have the Computer Lab along with three mobile computer labs for teacher and student use as well as building implementation of on-line student testing (Oaks Online), which is a state-wide initiative.

#### Library

The Harrison Park library serves as a resource center for all students, parents, and teachers. Students are encouraged to become involved in daily reading. They are taught library skills that will be valuable throughout their lives.

#### Electives

Our electives program for 2012–13 includes Art, Technology, PE, Library, and Spanish. All electives except Spanish are available to students in all grades. Spanish is offered to students in grades 7–8, with 8th graders having the chance to earn a high school Spanish credit.

#### Self Managers/Bulldog Club

To encourage and recognize positive characteristics in students, Harrison Park offers the Self Manager (3rd–5th grades) and Bulldog Club (6th–8th grades) programs. Periodic student/teacher conferences help students identify criteria they meet and, if needed, plan ways to meet their goals. Various rewarding activities occur throughout the year for those maintaining Self Manager badges.

#### Safety Patrol

Harrison Park operates Safety Patrols on a daily schedule. Any 4th–8th grade students who apply and qualify for Safety Patrol are trained and supervised by a staff member in cooperation with Portland Police. Please ask your children to follow the directions of the Safety Patrol.

#### **Reading Buddies**

Students in the upper grades team with younger students to provide rewarding experiences in mentoring and reading. The younger students learn from their "buddy" and the older students gain practice in reading aloud and sharing their knowledge.

#### **Reading Challenge**

New this year, the PTA-sponsored Reading Challenge will reward and reinforce reading by Harrison Park students. Students have their parent/guardian monitor their reading and fill out a form that is turned in to the PTA. Students receive incentives and awards based upon their reading hours completed.

#### Honor Roll/Principal's List

Students in 6th–8th grades earn letter grades. Those students who achieve a GPA (grade point average) of 3.0–3.49 are recognized for Honor Roll. Students who achieve a GPA of 3.5–4.0 are recognized for Principal's List.

#### **Presidential Academic Awards**

The Department of Education and the White House provide these national awards, given at the completion of 5th–8th grades to students who meet the following challenging requirements:

Award for Educational Excellence

- Grade point average 3.50–4.0
- Math & Reading 95th percentile or higher in standardized achievement test
- Award for Educational Achievement
  - Students who show tremendous growth and improvement and an unusual commitment to learning.

#### **Chess For Success**

Students in 1st–8th grades may participate on the Harrison Park Chess Team, which meets as part of the SUN Extended Day program and is sponsored by Chess For Success. Students learn chess and have opportunities to participate in tournaments. Playing chess is great in helping student focus, solve problems, and just have fun. Ralph Leftwich has coached chess going back to Clark School and continuing here at Harrison Park. The team has earned berths to the State Chess Tournament, both for the team and individual players, and won second place at state in 2010.

#### **SUN School**



Harrison Park is a SUN (Schools Uniting Neighborhoods) school. SUN offers academic and social supports and services to our students and Schools uniting families. SUN also offers an after school program for students in grades 1st–8th during the fall, winter, spring, and summer. Class offerings include homework club, art, chess, fitness, music, and sports. Registration is on a first-come, first-served basis. Financial assistance is available. For information please call the SUN Site Manager at 503-442-9962 or stop by the office for a registration form.

#### Weekend Food Backpack Program

Harrison Park SUN School coordinates the weekend food backpack program. To be placed on the list to receive this service, families need to complete a basic application; no financial information is needed. Due to high demand, families are put on a rotating schedule and receive backpacks on a random basis. Anonymity of students receiving backpacks is very important. #### School-Based Health Center

The Multnomah County Health Department School-Based Health Center Program facilitates access to comprehensive preventive, primary, and mental healthcare for Multnomah County school-age youth to keep them healthy and ready to learn. Primary care services include

- physical exams, immunizations
- early detection, diagnosis, and treatment of illness and injury
- prescription medications
- mental health services
- referrals for healthcare services not provided at the health center.

The staff at the health center includes: Office Assistant, Nurse Practicioner, Certified Medical Assistant or Licensed Practical Nurse, Community Health Nurse, and a Mental Health Consultant.

#### **IRCO – INSPIRE**

The Immigrant and Refugee Community Organization's (IRCO) In School Program for Immigrant and Refugee Education (INSPIRE) offers culturally appropriate academic case management and after-school tutoring for Latino, Slavic, and Asian and Pacific Islander youth in 4th–8th grades. Case managers work

closely with parents to help improve students' academic performance and connection to school. In addition, INSPIRE staff organize culturally relevant parent events and meetings and regularly communicate with parents about student progress. The INSPIRE program is funded by the Portland Children's Levy.

#### **GEAR UP CAP**

GEAR UP (Gaining Early Awareness and Readiness for Undergraduate Programs) CAP (College Ahead Program), is a federally funded college readiness program at Harrison Park. GEAR UP's mission is to support early college preparation and awareness activities in order to increase the number of students who are prepared to enter and succeed in postsecondary education. GEAR UP will be working with the 7th and 8th graders this year, closely following them through high school and into college. GEAR UP sponsored programs at Harrison Park might include:

- Academic tutoring/mentoring
- College and career fairs
- College field trips
- After-school academic and leadership programs
- Parent engagement
- Cultural and educational enrichment
- College information workshops

Whether you already know about the GEAR UP program or are new to it, you will be an important part of the success of your students as they begin the road to college.

#### Campfire

Camp Fire's Middle School Program is a free in-school and after-

school program, whose focus is it to support kids and families on the path to high school graduation and future career goals. We work with school staff, students, and their families to set and accomplish school year and future goals. Our program offers individualized academic assistance and mentorships to students that empower them to make positive choices and work toward success. We are committed to exposing youth to opportunities in their communities and beyond. Camp Fire is committed to working with your child as they discover and reach their fullest potential.

#### Early Kindergarten Transition Project

Incoming Kindergarten students get an early start on school in this program funded by Title I. This is a three-week, half-day program in August where students receive instruction and learn classroom routines. Parent classes are provided twice a week to help parents get ready for working with their child as they enter Kindergarten.

#### Bike Fix-It Fair

Last year, Franklin SUN partnered with Harrison Park SUN to host the 4th Annual Bike Fix-It Fair. Community members got their bikes fixed for free at Harrison Park by skilled mechanics in addition to receiving brief lessons on fixing flat tires and chain repair maintenance. There were free lights, locks, and helmets given away to many of the attendees, and 44 bikes were serviced. We plan to hold the Bike Fix-It Fair again next spring.

#### Free Tax Service

For the fifth year in a row, AARP Tax Aide services will be offered at Harrison Park School in the SUN area. Beginning early in the tax season (late January) the **FREE service** will be available for 11 weeks. This is provided by trained volunteers through the Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) program, sponsored by CASH Oregon and AARP, and monitored by the IRS. #### Girls On The Run

Girls on the Run of Portland Metro is a nonprofit organization that operates an after-school character-development program for 3rd–5th grade girls at sites throughout Portland. Our mission is to use the power of running to educate and prepare girls for a lifetime of self-respect and healthy living. During the fun, non-competitive program, the girls run and play active games, talk about important issues, eat snacks, and learn how to celebrate being a girl. The program focuses on building girls' self esteem and improving their physical and emotional health. This helps prepare them to face the most challenging years of adolescence with confidence and inner-strength. GOTR is offered through SUN for 12 weeks during the spring. #### SAFETY TIPS FOR PARENTS

#### Safety

The issue of student safety before and after school hours is not only a high concern of school staff but of parents as well. In the interest of student security, your child should not arrive prior to the opening of the building at 8:40 AM. Parents have the responsibility to provide for students' safety before and after school hours. Schools do not have personnel to provide supervision outside of student school hours. It is not safe for students to play after dismissal unless they are directly supervised by the parent or the parent's designee.

When traveling to and from school, students should be mindful of the following safety considerations:

- Travel on busy streets where you may obtain help if needed.
- Do not cut through parks, fields, or other deserted areas.
- Whenever possible, walk with other students.
- Practice good citizenship. (Show respect for the property of others and follow safe traffic rules.)
- Be wary of strangers or vehicles not routinely seen en route to/from school.
- We must have written permission for a student to ride with someone other than persons listed on the registration form.

Here are some additional general safety recommendations:

- Keep a written, accurate description of your child on record, including scars and any distinguishing marks. Update as necessary.
- Have your child fingerprinted and keep the card in a safe, accessible place, along with pictures updated every six months.
- Teach your children their area code, telephone numbers, and address. They should know these by heart.

- Show your children how to dial the operator and what they should say to make a collect or emergency call. Practice this.
- Know where your child is at all times.
- Do not let your child go to public restrooms alone.
- Do not leave your child alone in your car.
- Do not put your child's name—first or last—on hats, clothes, bicycles, wagons, etc. Children respond when addressed by their name. A person using your child's name will not automatically be thought of as a stranger.
- Teach your children to avoid strangers. A stranger is anyone who they do not know very well.
- Do not leave your children in the toy section of a store or wandering through a mall unattended.
- Know your child's friends.
- · Be involved in your child's activities.
- Practice with your children the ways they walk to and from friend's homes or school.
- Teach your child which homes and businesses to go into near your home when you are not around.
- Teach your children to keep the doors locked and not to answer the door to strangers.
- Listen when your child tells you that s/he does not want to be with someone. Find out the reason why.
- Notice if someone pays undue attention to your child.
- Encourage healthy parent-child communications.
