THE SCHOOL & COMMUNITY

Roosevelt High School is located just twenty minutes outside the heart of downtown Portland in the beautiful state of Oregon. Nestled in the growing neighborhood of St. Johns, the school was originally built in 1910 and opened in 1911. When the school first opened its doors, it was named James John High School after the neighborhood's founder, James John. Its first graduating class had only four students. Then, in 1921 the school closed and its replacement, Roosevelt High School, opened the following year.

Today our student body has 1500 students. This year, the graduating Class of 2023 is the second largest in the school's history with over 390 students. The campus was newly renovated in 2018 increasing our enrollment and helping make Roosevelt one of the most ethnically diverse high schools in the state of Oregon and we communicate to our school families in over 27 languages. In an increasingly global economy, Roosevelt students are a step ahead in their exposure to multiple perspectives and cultures. The school's diversity fosters a culture of inquiry and inclusivity. Roosevelt's students are also supported by the thriving and vibrant St. Johns community with committed educators and high expectations from all students.

Academics

Roosevelt students are expected to take a rigorous, college-prep schedule which includes a full schedule for 9th, 10th and 11th graders and at least 6 out of 8 periods for 12th graders. **Advanced Placement & Dual-Credit Courses**

Roosevelt High School encourages students to take advanced courses when they feel prepared for the rigor and challenges these courses offer. Roosevelt offers both Advanced Placement and dual credit courses in partnership with Portland State University, The University of Portland, and Portland Community College.

Advancement Via Individual Determination (AVID)

AVID is a nationwide, research-based program that focuses on underserved students in the academic middle. Through structured support in advanced reading, writing, and research students learn the skills to be college and AP ready. Roosevelt has a strong AVID program going into its 17th year with 16% of 10th-12th grade students electing to take AVID for the 2022-2023 academic year. All freshmen take 9th Grade Seminar, which is a college and career class using AVID strategies. After freshman year students choose if they want to continue in the AVID program.

Spanish Language Arts

Over the past 20 years Roosevelt High School has developed a rigorous program of study for students to develop their academic Spanish skills with the goal to ultimately prepare them for upper division college Spanish coursework. The program serves students who are either native Spanish speakers or come from a Spanish immersion program. The courses develop the students' reading, writing, and oral fluency through Spanish Language Arts classes similar to the in-depth study of English in Language Arts classes. Freshmen and sophomores take introductory level Spanish Language Arts courses, and juniors and seniors take AP Spanish Language & Culture and AP Spanish Literature & Culture courses, which expand their academic skills to college level and beyond. Students consistently pass the two Spanish AP exams, with 80% passing with a 3 or higher in AP Spanish Language, and 60% in AP Spanish Literature in 2021.

Graduation Requirements

Students are required to earn a minimum of 24 credits (0.5 credit for each semester course successfully passed).

Class Rank/Grading **Calculations (GPA)**

The GPA, computed at the end of the sixth semester, includes all subjects in which a student has received a letter grade. The transcript reflects a standard and weighted GPA/Rank. Weighted GPA is calculated by adding one point for each AP course completed. Roosevelt High School reports standard GPA and Rank on the secondary school report. If a student repeats a course (R), the GPA on the transcript is reflective of the higher grade earned.

ADVANCED PLACEMENT

In May of 2022, 186 Roosevelt students took 263 Advanced Placement (AP) exams in English Language and Composition, English Literature and Composition, Environmental Science, US History, Calculus AB, Biology, Chemistry, Japanese Language and Culture, Spanish Language and Culture, Spanish Literature and Culture, and Statistics. In 2022 52% of students passed their AP exams with a 3 or higher.

- 15 AP Scholars (students who received scores of 3 or higher on three or more AP Exams)
- 1 AP Scholar with Honor (students who received at least a 3 or higher on four or more AP Exams)
- 3 AP Scholar with Distinction (students who received at least a 3 or higher on five or more AP exams)

CAREER AND TECHNICAL EDUCATION

Roosevelt offers a variety of courses for students to explore different career fields and career related skills to prepare them for study at four-year colleges and universities, community colleges, technical institutions or other post-secondary training. In the class of 2022 there were 83 CTE Program of Study Completers. This means that the student took and successfully completed two full years of classes within their program of study.

March 13, 2020 was the last day of in-person instruction for the 2019-2020 school year at Roosevelt High School. The 2020-2021 school year began with online only instruction on September 2, 2020, and continued for the remainder of the school year. Portland Public Schools, in response to required guidance from the Oregon Department of Education, moved to Passing (P) and Incomplete (INC) grades for all high school coursework beginning March 2020 due to COVID school closures and the state shift to distance learning. This grading adjustment is reflected on the spring 2020 portion of student transcripts. In addition, proficiency credit and pass grades were issued for coursework which met Oregon Department of Education guidelines for proficiency credit. These credits are noted on student's transcript with proficiency next to the course name (i.e. English 4- Proficiency) and a grade of P(Pass).
