

THE SCHOOL & COMMUNITY

Roosevelt High School, is located just twenty minutes outside the heart of downtown Portland in the beautiful state of Oregon. Nestled in the growing neighborhood of St. Johns, the school was originally built in 1910 and opened in 1911. When the school first opened its doors it was named James John High School after the neighborhood's founder, James John. Its first graduating class had only four students. Then, in 1921 the school closed and its replacement, Roosevelt High School, opened the following year.

Today our student body has approximately 1400 students. The campus was newly renovated in 2018 increasing our enrollment. Roosevelt is one of the most ethnically diverse high schools in the state of Oregon and we communicate to our school families in 31 languages. In an increasingly global economy, Roosevelt students are a step ahead in their exposure to multiple perspectives and cultures. The school's diversity fosters a culture of inquiry and inclusivity. Roosevelt's students are also supported by the thriving and vibrant St. Johns community with committed educators and high expectations for all students.

ACADEMICS

Roosevelt students are expected to take a rigorous, college-prep schedule which includes a full schedule for 9th, 10th and 11th graders and at least 6 out of 8 periods for 12th graders. Students are encouraged to take advanced courses when they feel prepared for the rigor and challenges these courses offer. Roosevelt offers both Advanced Placement and dual credit courses in partnership with Portland State University (PSU), The University of Portland (UP), and Portland Community College (PCC).

Class Rank/Grading Calculations (GPA)

The GPA, computed at the end of the sixth semester, includes all subjects in which as student has received a letter grade. The transcript reflects a standard and weighted GPA/Rank. Weighted GPA is calculated by adding one point for each AP course completed. Roosevelt High School reports standard GPA and Rank on the secondary school report. If a student repeats a course (R), the GPA on the transcript is reflective of the higher grade earned.

ADVANCED PLACEMENT

In May of 2025, 379 Roosevelt students took 612 Advanced Placement (AP) exams in in Biology, Calculus AB, Calculus BC, Calculus BC: AB Subscore, Chemistry, Computer Science A, English Language & Composition, English Literature & Composition, Environmental Science, Human Geography, Japanese Language & Culture, Physics 1, Spanish Language & Culture, Spanish Literature & Culture, Statistics, US Government & Politics, US History, and World History: Modern. In 2025 66% of students passed their AP exams with a 3 or higher.

- 36 AP Scholars (students who received scores of 3 or higher on three or more AP Exams)
- 21 AP Scholar with Honor (students who received at least a 3 or higher on four or more AP Exams)
- 12 AP Scholar with Distinction (students who received at least a 3 or higher on five or more AP exams)

CAREER AND TECHNICAL EDUCATION

Roosevelt offers a variety of courses for students to explore different career fields and career related skills to prepare them for study at four-year colleges and universities, community colleges, technical institutions or other post-secondary training. In 2025 there were 79 CTE Program of Study Completers. This means that the student took and successfully completed three full years of classes within their program of study.

SPANISH LANGUAGE ARTS

Over the past 22 years Roosevelt High School has developed a rigorous program of study for students to develop their academic Spanish skills with the goal to ultimately prepare them for upper division college Spanish coursework. The program serves students who are either native Spanish speakers or come from a Spanish immersion program. The courses develop the students' reading, writing, and oral fluency through Spanish Language Arts classes similar to the in-depth study of English in Language Arts classes. Freshmen and sophomores take introductory level Spanish Language Arts courses, and juniors and seniors take AP Spanish Language & Culture and AP Spanish Literature & Culture courses, which expands their academic skills to college level and beyond. Students consistently pass the two Spanish AP exams, with 96% passing with a 3 or higher in AP Spanish Language, and 65% in AP Spanish Literature in 2025.

PORTLAND INTERNATIONAL SCHOLARS ACADEMY (PISA)

Portland International Scholars Academy (PISA) is an optional full-day high school program located at Roosevelt and McDaniel High Schools. PISA offers newcomer classes for the core content areas of Language Arts, Math, Science, and Social Studies in which teachers use appropriate scaffolding to make grade level standards aligned content comprehensible for students; students take elective and CTE classes with their mainstream peers. Students take core newcomer classes for two years and then transition to all mainstream classes the following year. Students with interrupted education (SIFE) are eligible to take foundational courses in literacy and math as well, allowing them to stay in the program for up to three years. Students who are eligible for high school and new to the US, have been enrolled in a US school less than three years, and score "Emerging" on language screener are eligible for PISA. At Roosevelt, 5% of our students qualify for PISA.

The goal for newcomers in the program is to earn a high school diploma or to transition to PCC YES to continue developing English skills if they will age out before earning required credits.
