The campout visited several different locales over the years, finding Cedar Ridge in 2012. Cedar Ridge allowed the campout to quadruple in size, from approximately 100 participants to now more than 450.

The Simple Version:

Go west on 26 W 23.6 miles 23.6 miles from the tunnel by the zoo Turn Right on Hwy 47 NORTH. Travel approximately 15 miles to

Tent Camping

Most ASCO attendees tent camp. Campers can set up tents along the tree line at the bottom of the field in front of the Cedar Ridge Lodge. There are several Porta-Potties scattered in the tent area to avoid the uphill walk to the dining hall in the middle of the night. There are additional restrooms with showers and changing areas located on the upper grounds.

Tent locations are first come, first served, keeping to the perimeter of the field, leaving the field open for activities. For families looking for a quieter tent area for early bedtimes, setting up your tent as far from the campfire area as possible is recommended.



Vehicles are not allowed on the field except for loading, unloading. After checking in, you may drive down an access road to the field, unload your camping gear, then park your car in the extended parking lot near the entrance to Cedar Ridge.

Please inquire with your registration if you have a camper van, trailer or RV that you are wanting to bring. Sleeping quarters on wheels are discouraged this year from being on the field with the tents and there is limited space available on the upper basketball court.



Those who aren't tent campers can choose to stay in a bunkhouse. Cedar Ridge has 4 heated bunkhouses that can sleep up to 16 people per room in 3 rooms each. Campers provide their own linens for the bunk beds.

Gender identifying male and female bathrooms with showers are located nearby in a community bathhouse.

The ASCO committee tries to assign families with similar-aged children to shared bunk rooms. It is helpful if you talk to your CSS friends and give suggestions of bunkmates in your registration.

The bunkhouses are the most accessible accomodations with fairly easy access to the dining hall for those who may have difficulty trekking up and down the hills at Cedar Ridge.





Rustic cabins and platform tents hold 6-8 people. There is a cabin and a couple of platform tents next to the main lodge. Other cabins are near the pool along the treeline. There is a circle of platform tents in the woods above the pool area. The pool house community bathhouse is nearby. You will need to supply your own linens and blankets.

Unlike the bunkhouses, these facilities are not heated and do not have electricity.



The Upper Grounds

The most luxurious accommodations are in the Upper Grounds which include a Loft, House, and Lower and Upper Lodges. The ASCO planning committee and coordinators have first preference for these rooms.

Meals

NEW THIS YEAR: Cedar Ridge will be preparing and providing our meals in the Dining Hall/Main Lodge. There will be a breakfast, lunch, and dinner on Saturday and a Breakfast/Brunch on Sunday. Menus will be provided one week before the event.

There will be an option during registration to purchase a dinner of pizza and salad for Friday. No gluten or vegan pizza options will be available for this dinner. Many families grab food on the way out to ASCO.

Cedar Ridge will try to accommodate common dietary restrictions. Meals will contain vegetarian, dairy free, and gluten free options. However, if you have a limited diet and the menu does not look like it will work for you, please feel free to bring your own foods and talk to one of us about storage options.

Parents will be responsible for monitoring their children with food allergies. Meals served in the dining hall will be nut-free but there may be peanut butter or other food allergens at ASCO. Please share any dietary restrictions or allergies when you register.

We will have only one meal on Sunday. If you know you will be staying late into the day, please be prepared with some extra snacks for your famished kiddos (swimming will do that to you!).





Responsibility

A common saying of camp out is that you may rarely see your child (especially older children). ASCO does take a village, but parents are ultimately responsible for their children and the children they bring with them. Some campers bring walkie talkies to keep in touch with kids. In recent years, cell service at Cedar Ridge has improved considerably, making it possible to text each other.

Arranging check in locations or times with your kids throughout the day can be helpful. By midnight, all children and teens will need to be under the care of and chaperoned by their grownup or a grownup your family has made arrangements with.

Teens should not be allowed to roam the grounds after midnight without a chaperone.

If anyone sees a student (or adult) engaging in behavior that is not safe, responsible, or respectful to each other or the Cedar Ridge property they should feel supported in saying so.



What will I do?

ASCO Jobs




Every adult (9th grade and above) has a one hour job shift while at ASCO. Coordinators may have longer shifts. It is very important adults show up to their shifts.

Late arrivals and no shows can burden the other parent volunteers.

When you register for ASCO, you will have the opportunity to request types of jobs and shifts and note special circumstances. We try to honor preferences as we can.

If you have already finished your shift and see other parents are struggling to get things done, jump in and lend a hand. We do it for the kids.

Capture the Flag

Basketball


There are multiple basketball courts and many basketballs. Start a pickup game or sign up to host a scheduled game.

Frisbee Golf

Cedar Ridge has a frisbee golf course. Bring your disks and pull together a golf game. Some of the baskets are in the tent area, so watch out for campers.














What's the nightlife like?

Each evening, when darkness settles in, people gather at the campfire. While camp out no longer has s'mores as an official activity (think hundreds of kids with flaming marshmallow torches), some parents choose to bring supplies and carefully supervise their children in creating the delicious gooey treats.

Sometimes we get lucky and a guitar playing parent may share some tunes around the campfire.

After 10pm, late nighters are welcome to hang at the campfire (as long as an adult is present to supervise the flames) but keep noise to a reasonable level.

The last people to leave need to make sure the fire is out.



Our last Campout was in 2019. That means current ninth graders were able to attend ASCO in the 5th grade. New families meeting and getting to know returning families can be hard. Let's make it easy - and fun! On Friday night during the mayhem of capture the flag on the field, parents can gather up on the hill by the dining hall and get to know each other. Let's make sure new families to camp out feel welcome and those attending their last camp out feel loved.



The Saturday Night Mid-Level Mixer

After the variety show, the mid-level students can make their way up to the community room in the upper grounds for a dance/party hosted and chaperoned by brave mid-level parents. The success of this party is largely dependent on the availability of snacks, so if you are a mid-level family you might consult with your student and bring some snacks to share. This event celebrates the incoming 6th graders at their first camp out dance and the outgoing 8th graders at their last.

NEW AND IMPROVED

Check out the expanded **Game Room** located under the dining hall for kids of all ages.

Young children will need to be chaperoned by their parent or guardian.



Quiet hours begin at 10pm.

With many of the kids and adults still up and wanting to socialize, we will have the fire burning until 11:30 Friday and Saturday evening. The dining hall and game room will remain open until 11:30 both evenings and are a place to hangout, play games and visit while letting sleeping campers have some quiet.

Safety monitor shifts will end promptly at midnight. At this time, all kids and teens must be under the care of and chaperoned by their grown up.

Campers may bring treats to share during the late night fun. This is great - as long as they do not create dirty dishes, as the kitchen is closed.

S'mores are a popular treat by the fire. Please provide your family's own smore-making supplies.

Late Night in the Dining Hall

If you want to host a scheduled tabletop session or a card game in the evening, let us know. We can post a notice in the dining hall. Campers are encouraged to bring games for community use, but please put your name on the box.

Registration

Registration opens April 11th. We will have an online registration open and in-person registration events at the school.

Registration is a 2 step process:

Step 1. Fill out the ASCO google form

Step 2. Pay using the Konstella link provided in the registration form, or bring a check to the CSS office.

The cost to attend campout includes three meals on Saturday and breakfast/brunch on Sunday. \$80 per person ages 15 - adult \$60 per student ages 5 - 14. Ages 4 and under are free.

If your family qualifies for reduced lunch, the ASCO fee is discounted to \$60 per person ages 15 to adult and \$40 per student ages 5-14.

If your family qualifies for free lunch through direct certification or by application, the ASCO fee is discounted to \$30 per person ages 15 to adult and \$10 per student ages 5-14.

In addition we have included in our planning a limited number of hardship scholarships for families in need.

What To PACK

Clothes for every possible weather scenario (or watch the weather closely in the days prior). A few extra layers and beanies recommended if tent camping.

Swimwear and Towels

Personal items

Tents and bedding if tent camping. Extra Blankets. Bedding linens if in a platform tent, cabin, or bunkhouse.


Flashlights

Plenty of snacks, including s'more fixings, and drinks (if you want something other than water or coffee).

A few dollars if you think you will visit the Cedar Ridge camp store. (New this year.)

Sunscreen (the baby shampoo on the slip n' slide washes it away)

Leave your furry friends at home. Cedar Ridge does not allow pets.


Leave your drones at home. At previous camp outs, campers have complained about the use of drones.


Leave your wheels at home. No skateboards, bikes, or roller skates.
