## A Message to Students and Families From Grant HS Student Services Team

We understand that recent national discussions on immigration have raised concerns for many in our community. At Grant High School, we are committed to ensuring the safety and well-being of all students, regardless of background.

We want to reassure you that state laws prevent Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) officials from interacting with students on school grounds or gaining personal information without a valid arrest warrant. Additionally, we uphold Oregon laws that protect individuals from being detained based solely on immigration status.

The safety and privacy of our students are our top priorities. We are committed to safeguarding educational records and ensuring that all students, regardless of their immigration status, feel safe and valued. Our school community strives to treat every individual with dignity, and we maintain policies that safeguard students from discrimination. We are committed to supporting each of our students with compassion and understanding.
