

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

Removing the dependance of carbon fuel systems at each school site will result in healthier schools.




Engagement Approach

Engagement Schedule

1. Initial Engagement Sessions

a. 2-3 sessions held at schools (1 virtual?) before work begins - create awareness, initial reactions

2. Progress Engagement Sessions

- a. 2-3 sessions held at schools (1 virtual?) midway through analysis
 - targeted discussion, outcome focused

3. Outcome Engagement Sessions

a. 5-6 sessions held at schools (1 virtual?) at end of project – sharing results, telling the story
