FROM THE DISTRICT

Students will have access to most PPS Digital Toolkit applications during the summer. Students who enroll in summer school may notice changes in some applications once summer school begins. Most PPS Digital Toolkit applications will remain active until the end of July. Applications may be temporarily unavailable at the beginning of August as PPS shifts to the 2021-2022 school year. PPS will be moving from Clever to using MyPPS (my.pps.net) as a district-wide

portal. Students using QR Clever badges to log in to Chromebooks will no longer be able to use their Clever badge once the change to MyPPS is complete. Students will need their PPS username and password to log in to their chromebooks until they are issued a new Quickcard (QR code) at the start of school.

Please note that during the summer months, teachers are not active inside the digital tools and applications. Parents should be aware of what students are doing online. Parents may find the Securly application and digital and civic literacy resources helpful.

Library Connect and PPS--check this out!

Your student now has access to resources provided by Multnomah County Public Library through his or her Library Connect username and password. This means that if your child lost his or her library card or hasn't memorized the library barcode number, you have nothing to worry about! Simply use the Library Connect login id and password and you are good to go! Everything has already been set up for your student. There is nothing you need to do but know the login number and password. The login number is 01+student ID number. Password is your child's birthdate, month, day, year (8 digits). If your child already has a password associated with his or her library card, then the password wasn't changed. Read the attached flier for more information. SCHOOL RACIAL EQUITY AND SOCIAL JUSTICE TEAM CHECK-IN

RESJ STUDENT REFLECTION ON SEESAW

At the beginning of the school year, our staff watched a video titled, <u>Race Forward video</u> <u>starring students from Buckman Elementary</u>. The Equity Committee was so inspired to do something similar with our Bridlemile students. The committee put together a Seesaw assignment that will be introduced and assigned to the entire student body during Technology class the week of May 24th. **The purpose of this assignment is to normalize talking about race and racism in our Bridlemile community.**

- Is the Seesaw assignment mandatory? No, this assignment is optional.
- Will the responses be shared with others? Yes. The directions in the assignment clearly state that the student's responses may or may not be used in our final video that will be shared with the students, staff, and community. Parents will be notified if their student's video is picked for the final product. <u>Student's work will not be used without adult consent.</u>
- Reminder- this assignment will be on your student's technology Seesaw account. Mr. Stenger will review the assignment during technology class next week (May 24-28).

Dear Bridlemile community,

Data from the Race and Our Community survey is finally available! 67% of respondents asked for more resources on equity and social justice issues, and many indicated a desire for age-appropriate resources for kids.

One stand-out piece of data is that many community members lack understanding about white fragility, white saviorism, and ableism. Here are some resources to explore about each of these three terms:

White fragility

white fragility: discomfort and defensiveness on the part of a white person when confronted by information about racial inequality and injustice. (source - Oxford Languages)

<u>Seeing White</u> (podcast about whiteness, white fragility and the history of racism - 14 episodes, about 30 min each) <u>White Fragility</u> by Robin DiAngelo (book)

White saviorism

white saviorism: sometimes combined with savior complex to write white savior complex, refers to a white person who provides help to non-white people in a self-serving manner. (source - Wikipedia)

<u>Unpacking White Saviorism</u> (7 min read) <u>On White Supremacy Culture</u> (9 min read)

Ableism

ableism: a set of beliefs or practices that devalue and discriminate against people with physical, intellectual, or psychiatric disabilities. (source - Center for Disability Rights)

<u>Ableism 101</u> (5 min read) <u>Stella Young on disability and inspiration</u> (9 min video) <u>Crip Camp</u> (documentary film)
