Music at James John with Vibe- K-2 Vocal Instruction and Grades 3-5 Choirstarting in January

Thanks to generous support from the James John PTA and the 2018 James John All Hands Raised Grant Fund, we will be offering one vocal music class per week to all of our K-2 classes beginning in January. The classes will be offered through our community partner, Vibe Music and the instruction will take place in individual classrooms. In addition, the music teacher will be organizing a school choir for students in grades 3-5. The choir is open to all students in grades 3-5 and practice will take place two days a week after lunch recess.

School Counselor – Andrea Nahurski

Comments from the Counseling Corner:

The school counselor's position at James John is to support students in their social and emotional growth. Students may work with the school counselor in small groups to support various skills such as friendship, problem-solving, and emotional regulation. If the need arises, students can visit the school counselor on an individual basis if they'd like to check-in about issues that may be impacting them at home such as grief, loss of a loved one, etc. The counselor's office is available at times to check-in with an adult in a private place, take short breaks to reset for classroom success, complete classwork or projects in a quiet space, or problem-solve in a small group as needed. In addition, the school counselor serves on the Student Intervention Team (SIT) to plan for individual student academic and behavior needs, coordinates with the Special Ed team to attend evaluation meetings and create behavior support plans, connects families to community agencies for further support, and participates on the school Climate team.

All children need the security of knowing the rules and boundaries of behavior to feel secure and be able to thrive at school. Our school expectations are that students Be

Safe, Be Respectful, Be Responsible, and Be Kind. Since the first day of school, we have been teaching all of our students the behavior expectations for the various locations and activities we engage in at school. James John's Climate team has a committee of several staff members known as PBIS, which stands for <u>Positive Behavior Intervention Support</u>.

The PBIS Committee strives to promote positive behaviors and programs at school such as Pride of the Pride slips, token incentive chains, weekly Lion's Pride awards, and monthly student recognition assemblies. Other tasks of the PBIS committee include examining data, presenting at staff professional development, collaborating with other school-wide committees, and more. Around the school you'll see posters detailing these expectations in our "common areas." We have posters for bathrooms, the cafeteria and auditorium, hallways, and playground. The first days of school, students in grades 1-5 participated in a rotation of these locations and experienced staff members teaching them the expectations specific to each area. Next guarter, we'll revisit this format again with all students K-5. Additionally, every classroom teacher teaches the specific behaviors expected throughout the day, and reteaches expectations to provide a positive and efficient classroom environment. Because our classroom instruction relies on students' exploration and sharing of ideas and materials, it is imperative that every classroom fosters pro-social behavior by teaching clear expectations, routines, and procedures. Please ask your students about expected behaviors at school and how they might differ from what's expected at home. Take a look at our posters and check-in about what events are coming up, and feel free to talk with staff at school about how we build our community at James John.

We are also very fortunate to have a partnership with Multnomah County which provides bilingual mental health support to families and school-based therapy for students at James John. PTA News

Dear James John Families -

In November, we all received word from Dr. Melvin about a racist word chalked on the playground. This incident does not represent the best of our neighborhood, and our kids deserve better. While no one condones this action or wants this kind of language at, in, or on our school, the best thing we can do is... talk about it. Talk about it with each other, talk about it with our kids.

According to the most recent <u>school climate report</u>, we have an opportunity to help our students feel safe. We can do this by staying connected, setting high expectations, and making the most of teachable moments in school and at home.

Towards that end, the January 21st PTA meeting is dedicated to how to talk to your kids about race. Too few parents talk with their kids about race, and this has serious implications because kids may assume talking about race is taboo and have no way to test and vet the stereotypes that our society makes implicit.

<u>Studies</u> show that even infants can distinguish skin tones. By early childhood, kids begin to have more favorable opinions of people they perceive as "the same" as they are – even if the similarities are meaningless.

The <u>Hechinger Report</u> outlines some interesting facts:

- Only 10 percent of parents discuss race often with their children.
- A parent's race impacts how often these conversations are happening. Twenty-two percent of black parents discuss race often with their children, compared to six percent of white parents.
- Nearly thirty-five percent of all parents surveyed said they never talk to their children about social class.
- Fifty-seven percent of all parents said they rarely or never talk about gender with their kids. These conversations are less likely to happen with younger children.
- Less than a third of parents of three to five-year-old kids discuss race and ethnicity sometimes or often.

Your PTA is committed to diversity in all its types, because that is what is best for every small human who attends our school. With early snow in at least one forecast, time for a reminder on how to stay updated

Meteorologist Rod Hill of KGW recently issued a winter forecast that projected 8 to 10 inches of snow, including possible early snow in November or December. If that turns out to be correct, that would much earlier snow than last school year, when our first weather-caused disruption to the regular classroom schedule did not come until Feb. 5.

Whatever the accuracy of the forecast, it seems a good time for a refresher for the Portland Public Schools community about how we let you know about school closures and delays caused by weather, or school emergencies or other special events. Here are the ways we get that information to you:

School Messenger: You can get text alerts and auto-dialer calls on your cell phone with important news and updates. Text "Yes" or "Y" to 68453.

Website: Our website, <u>www.pps.net</u>, will have immediate updates. Look for a yellow bar across the top of the home page when there is an urgent situation or weather-related closures.

Twitter: We put out urgent communications on this social media platform. Simply <u>follow our</u> account to get updates.

Facebook: We also put urgent communications on Facebook. "Like" our account to get posts into your timeline.

Phone calls: Auto-dialer calls go to the primary numbers on the student registration form in all supported languages. Remember to update contact information with your school if your phone number changes.

The decisions about weather-caused closures and delays are made after a PPS transportation crew personally inspects roads starting at 2:30 a.m., and consultations with a large group of experts and district leaders. Read more about the process in a <u>PPS Pulse story from March</u>.

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
