#### WILSON COMPETES IN ENGINEERING CHALLENGE

Wilson students once again step up and put their math, science, and engineering skills to work. Chosen to be one of nine Oregon high schools to compete in the Intel/Trail Blazers Engineering Challenge, our students will design, engineer, and build a unique t-shirt launcher. Wilson's team includes: Zander Clucas, Jacob Harrel, Kevin Vo, Ian Guthrie, William Behn, Deena Barbera, and Austin Deaville, with guidance and technical support from Wilson teacher Mark Mochon. Our team received a \$400 grant from the Intel Corporation to help them build the best t-shirt launcher. Rules state that the device should be able to deliver t-shirts to fans at all levels of the Rose Garden Arena, and teams are required to document their journey via journal, photos and video. According to the Oregonian, all nine teams will travel to the Trail Blazers' December 13 game to show off their original engineering design. Teams will use their device to launch t-shirts from center court into the cheering crowd during halftime at a Trail Blazers game. Good luck students!
