WILSON STUDENTS SOLVE COMPLEX PROBLEMS, WIN SCHOLARSHIPS

Congratulations to Marcus Robinson and James Ranney for winning the Barry Richmond Scholarship that will pay for each of them to attend the International System Dynamics Conference in Albuquerque, New Mexico the last week of July. They will present their models in a parallel session at the conference. Their STELLA models and papers competed against other applicants from the college level (or above) for the award. They are the first high school students to win this scholarship. Other students who plan to attend the conference in July are Pedro Alzaga-Elizondo, Julia McDowell, Henry Li, and Joseph Kibi (a Wilson modeling student from two years ago). Each of these students will present a poster of their model at the conference. The annual International System Dynamics Conference is attended by between 600 and 700 university professors and business people from around the world who are interested in using system dynamics models to solve complex problems. Our very own Wilson teacher Diana Fisher was the 2007 recipient of the Barry Richmond Scholarship. Besides teaching at Wilson, Diana is the author of numerous resources on system dynamics modeling in the classroom. Congratulations!

MUSICIANS TREAT AUDIENCE WITH END OF THE YEAR CONCERT

Several weeks ago the PIL honored the league's top athletes, coaches at their annual celebration at Nike's Tiger Woods Center.

Two Wilson students (Erika Chesnutt and Nick O'Donnell) were selected as Wilson's PIL Sportspersons of the Year. Erika plays Lacrosse. Nick participates in football, wrestling and track & field at Wilson. Two Wilson coaches (head coach, Kent Dorsey and assistant coach, Jeremy Shetler '92) were selected as Wilson's Coaches of the Year. Kent is a Jackson graduate and is the Head Coach for Wilson's championship wrestling team, and Jeremy is an Assistant Coach for Wilson football, wrestling and baseball. Jeremy was also honored as the league's Ron Pheister Assistant Coach of the Year. The honors for Wilson continued as the PIL named Dr. Jim Chesnutt '81 (and Wilson parent) as the recipient of the Robert Blanchard Distinguished Service award. Chesnutt, a longtime Wilson team physician, has helped train others in the district and is medical director of Oregon Health & Science University's sports medicine program. "This is a real honor," states Jim, "not necessarily for myself but because it represents a joint achievement by the OHSU Sports Medicine Program, the PIL Athletic Department, and the PIL Hall of Fame to implement an athletic trainer program that improved health and safety for the athletes of the Portland Public Schools. WILSON SAYING GOODBYE TO 4 TEACHERS

Thousands of students have walked through their doors at school. At the end of this school year, four teachers will leave the classroom and walk out their doors for the last time in their careers. **Jon Beima**, **Roy Ikada**, **Mark Mochon**, and **Pat Murphy** are retiring and will say good-bye to Wilson. Here's just a little about each of them.

Jon Beima began his teaching career in 1984, as a student teacher at Wilson under the tutelage of Al Gray. It was because of a telephone call from Mr. Gray to the district office that Jon get an interview, and he has been teaching at Wilson ever since. Mr. Beima has enjoyed working with all of the quality faculty at Wilson over the years. He says that through all of the challenges, with Measure 5 redistributing Portland education dollars to the rest of the state, superintendent changes, and what seems like constant reorganization of the district administrators, the constant has been the dedication of his fellow teachers. Jon is known around school for his songs. He adds, "I began writing math songs a year or two into my teaching career, (Gotta Do My Algebra, Algebra Get Outa My Life, Old Time Geometry, Catching the Sine Wave, Log Rythms, My TI-84). The first time I sang in the classroom, I announced to my classes that the famous '60's math musician, Jonny Kwayjun, was coming to my classroom the next week. I mentioned that students' parents would probably know of him and maybe even have records. I was shocked that no parents knew of him." Jon also started writing songs for the faculty, to keep spirits up during the trying times. He has written between 30 to 40 songs. Here are a few of the titles: In House Bill 3565, Ben O. Canada, I Love That Dirty Water, CIM Misery, If I Were A Wizard of Wilson, Assimilate, Ten Days For Free, BHAG. Jon also began writing songs for Wilson retirees, and it has become a much enjoyed yearly tradition. Next fall, Jon will be teaching part time at Clark College in Vancouver. To continue interactions with students, Jon also plans on volunteering in one of the high schools in Vancouver. (Now, those will be some very lucky students!) What will Mr. Beima miss when he leaves Wilson? Jon tells us that he has had many wonderful students over the years, and "I will miss teaching at Wilson."

Roy Ikada began his teaching career at Wilson High School 19 years ago. He has taught courses in Computer Application, Keyboarding/Computer and Web Page Creation. Besides his work in the classrooms, Roy briefly coached volleyball at Wilson and was the assistant golf coach before taking the head golf coaching position. Roy has coached the Men's Golf team for five years, leading to many successful seasons. According to Coach Mike Clopton, Roy is a very organized, quiet person who just loves golf. What else do we remember about Roy? Mr. Ikada is that teacher who stands outside of his door before class starts and greets each student as they walk into class. "As each student walks in, Roy chats with them or simply says hello to them by name," adds Erica Meyers, WHS Business Manager. This kind of teaching will be missed!

Mark Mochon began his teaching career in 1978 at Hood River Junior High. As the sole member of the Technical Education Department at Wilson, Mark teaches up to four levels of Architecture, four levels of Technical Drafting, four levels of Woods and four levels of Metals. Reflecting on his time at Wilson, Mark would like to thank the entire Wilson community for the continued support of the Technical Education Department over the years. "Nationwide, the 'Shop' classes are scrutinized and questions are raised about their usefulness and relevancy," adds Mark. "Thank you for keeping the program alive and giving some kids a chance to excel in an area that can lead to a vocational career." When asked about what he will miss, Mark states, "Working with the students that truly have a passion for working with their minds and their hands."

Pat Murphy began his teaching career in 1986 after working for ten years for the juvenile court in Clackamas County as a juvenile court counselor. His first teaching job was at Mt. Tabor Middle School. From there he moved to Franklin High School and then for the past 11 years has been teaching at Wilson. Pat is quick to state that teaching is an amazing way to make a living. "After 10 years of working with kids who victimize others it is extremely satisfying to work with kids who are pursuing productive and positive goals," he adds. Pat is encouraged each day when he see kids showing empathy and concern for each other, adding "Little things like being friendly, saying something positive about someone, helping to assist others with a fund raiser or any number of other things. Then to see them over the years go on to other positive pursuits is equally rewarding." Pat truly loves running in to former students who have graduated from college and are productive, contributing citizens getting married and raising families. "I have a student in one of my classes who is a child of a former student from Franklin. That makes me feel a little old. What a great kid though. Both of her parents have done well in life," states Pat. What will he miss the most? Pat says the interactions with students. "Once I am no longer a classroom teacher I will lose the opportunity to have a relationship with many students. I enjoy hearing about their lives and thinking about what lessons they will need to understand how history can provide some sort of guide to help them in the future." Pat Murphy has a sign in his room that says, "Wise men learn from their own mistakes. Wiser men learn from the mistakes of others."

The Wilson community owes a lot to Jon, Roy, Mark and Pat. All the best to you! Enjoy your retirement and thanks for so many years.
