#### **Portland Public Schools - November 2014**

**Share your views on proposed changes to the school transfer policy.** Portland Public Schools is considering changes to the school transfer policy to make it more equitable and to help strengthen programs at all neighborhood schools.

How changes are being made:

- A <u>citizens' committee</u> spent many months studying the policy and interviewing stakeholders.
- The committee <u>recommended changes</u> to Superintendent Carole Smith on Nov. 4.
- The superintendent is making recommendations to the school board Nov. 25.
- The school board is scheduled to vote on changes Jan. 13.

Superintendent Smith's recommendations include:

- Ending the neighborhood-to-neighborhood lottery system and using only the petition system for students to transfer to a neighborhood school outside the neighborhood in which they live.
- Strengthening the petition system in which families can explain why a child needs to transfer to a different neighborhood school.
- Conducting a review of all focus option schools, including Dual Language Immersion programs, ACCESS Academy and Metropolitan Learning Center.

- Changing the lottery for focus option schools to increase access for low-income families. After low-income applicants have been approved, siblings of children already in that school would continue to receive preference.
- Allowing students who must transfer to a school for special education services to stay at that school through the highest grade.
