MOURNING LOSS OF GUY ORCUTT, WILSON ENGLISH TEACHER

Wilson High School and the PPS community are mourning the unexpected death of Guy Orcutt, an English teacher at Wilson, who died Sunday Oct. 24 due to complications from pneumonia. He had just turned 63. Guy's wife, Linda Stouch, is a para-educator at James John.

Guy began teaching at PPS in 1998 at Whitaker Middle School first in photography and then language arts and social studies. He moved to Portsmouth Middle School for 2002-03 and joined the Wilson staff in 2003. He most recently taught English to juniors and seniors. His Mass Media elective for seniors was an especially popular course.

Guy was writing the last chapter of his novel and had completed a screenplay called "A Forest Walk." The Friday before he died, he shared selections from the screenplay with his students. He left copies of the screenplay on his desk to finish reading that Monday. Instead on that Monday, Wilson students wrote tributes to their beloved teacher.

"Guy always emphasized that we should think for ourselves and not just go along with the rest of society. This lesson is one that will stay with me forever," wrote a Wilson senior. "He was my favorite teacher and when I heard the news, my world fell apart because I lost Mr. Orcutt not only as a friend but as a teacher," wrote a Wilson junior.

In addition to his wife Linda, Guy is survived by their daughters Zoe and Lily, both graduates of Grant High School. Lily, a student at Occidental College, is on a semester exchange in Austria. Zoe, who has a master's degree in social work and lives in Vancouver, Wash., was with her mother at her father's side when he died.

Wilson High School is planning a celebration of Guy's life tentatively scheduled for Saturday Dec. 11. Details will soon follow. The family is planning a memorial service for early January when Zoe can attend.

We miss Guy dearly and our hearts go out to Linda, Zoe, Lily and their extended family.

Director's Notes:

When *Dark of the Moon* first premiered in England in the 1940s, the *London Times* said, “The American authors give us an astonishing play, a fearsome legend.” I could not agree more. And when I first directed it in 1991, it was the ferocity of the narrative that was most attractive. The writers have exploded tragedy to levels rarely seen except in works by the Greeks and Shakespeare. This loose adaptation of *Romeo and Juliet* mixed with the beautiful poetry of the Appalachian dialect offers a remarkably cathartic escape for both actors and audience.

Nearly two decades later, I once again tackle the script. The emotional intensity is no less exciting, but surpassing that is the incredible social relevance the play has in these trying times. The playwrights have clearly given us much more than a tragic love story; they offer an aggressive exploration of the politics of fear. How do we engage with “the other”? How do we respond to that which is different than us? If we adopt absolutes, do we not then interrupt the thoughtful art of listening? If we draw lines in the sand, do we not fail to utilize empathy as a powerful communication tool? When power becomes more important than compromise, do we not obliterate the chance for civilized discourse?

Have you watched the news in 2010? Have you looked around? Heard the hateful rhetoric? Witnessed the demonization of “the other”?

Dark of the Moon is one of the most produced plays in high schools and colleges in America. Not unlike Arthur Miller’s *The Crucible*, I think we as teaching artists like this play because we hope to provoke such questions. By producing a drama that shows the extreme results of intolerance on both sides, we hope to ask audiences to look at the full spectrum of possibilities...to get beyond hard lines so as to accept a world where harmonious coexistence might be the norm. What a concept...

As always, it is a privilege to be a guest at Wilson High School, working with such talented young performers. I feel blessed to have been able to dive back into one of my very favorite theatrical works. I am most proud of this company and the dedication these students have displayed each and every day. And I offer huge thanks to Jamie Miller and the parents for their trust and support.
