PRINCIPAL'S WEEKLY MESSAGE - From Filip Hristić

View all Principal messages here.

Dear Wilson Community,

Next week all of our Juniors will take the SAT on Wednesday, 3/4. Most of the testing will be done in the gym while the rest of the students will have a 'regular' B day. All students will have early dismissal - school day will end at 1:15. Many Seniors will spend the day working on their graduation requirements - Reading, Writing, and/or Math Work Samples; My Plan Essay; Career Related Learning Experiences. We are telling our Seniors that they have to be done with all their graduation requirements by April 20 in order to purchase their Prom tickets. Juniors, too, must be on track to graduate (passing all classes) in order to purchase Prom tickets!

As we transition from Winter Sport to Spring Sports, we recognize that many of our student athletes miss a lot of class time because of early dismissals to sporting contests. To mitigate this issue, we will pilot afternoon Tutorials starting Fourth Quarter (4/7). Instead of doing Tutorials in the morning, as we have done thus far, Tutorials will be moved to the end of the day. This will not impact the official start/end of the day. It will simply allow student athletes who are dismissed early to miss Tutorials instead of their 4th/8th period. We will survey students, families and staff before the end of the year to evaluate the effectiveness of this pilot and make a determination for next year.



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Finally, I want to send another request to all of you who are able and willing to please donate to the <u>Wilson Foundation</u>. Our goal is to raise \$75,000 before the end of the school year. 100% of the money raised will go directly to building our academic programs, reducing class sizes, and supporting the overall well-being of our students.



Merla and Pat Lotz Scholarship for WHS Music Senior - \$2000 Award

Merle and Pat Lotz were active music teachers and in Portland from 1951-1995. Merle spent 32 years in public school choral teaching (at Jefferson, Wilson, and Benson High Schools); as well as serving as church music director, performing as pianist with the Oregon Symphony Pops orchestra, and running his own dance band for 45 years. Pat was a public school music teacher, accompanist for the Portland Chorale, and a private piano teacher for 45 years. She and Merle took the Wilson high school choir on a trip to Europe in 1971, creating the memories of a lifetime for 70 young singers.

This music scholarship is a powerful way to honor and celebrate their many years of dedication to music education, as well as their love of students and people, and their understanding of the positive impact of music in the hearts and lives of all people.

Applicants must have taken music classes at Wilson. In addition to this application, you must have two teachers write a letter of recommendation. One teacher must be from Wilson and the other can be a private music teacher or your WHS Music teacher.

Four Years Free @ PSU New GPA requirement - 3.2

Portland State University proudly covers standard tuition and mandatory fees for qualified incoming freshman students. All applicants are automatically considered for Four Years Free, no separate application is required.



Four Years Free is an institutional aid program that covers standard tuition and mandatory fees for eligible Oregon high school graduates who enroll full-time. The program covers remaining standard tuition and mandatory fees after financial aid is applied. Initial awards are calculated at 15 credit hours per term and the amount is finalized at the end of the second week of the term when registration closes. Differential tuition and fees are assessed separately for certain academic programs and students are responsible for covering those additional charges.

Four Years Free money does not cover room and board, books and supplies, transportation or personal expenses.

Eligibility

Students must meet all of the requirements below:

- · Oregon resident
- Oregon high school graduate
- 3.20 cumulative unweighted high school GPA
- · Pell Grant-eligible according to FAFSA
- · First-time PSU student
- Enroll full time (12 to 15 credits per term)
- Start in fall term
