Building Security and Safety

School Visitors and Volunteers

Parents are welcome to visit their child's classroom (24-hour notice with the classroom teacher is customary). All parents, visitors and volunteers in our building must check in at the Office and wear an identification badge while on the premises. You will be stopped by staff if you are not wearing a visitor's badge. Due to health and safety issues, pets from home are not allowed in the building.

If you wish to be a school volunteer, first fill out the Volunteer Information Form and background check at https://apps.pps.net/volunteermanagement/. If you are interested in being a SMART reading volunteer and reading with our students one-on-one on a weekly basis, please email vernon@getsmartoregon.org. Other volunteer opportunities can be set up directly with classroom teachers.

Supervision: Students should arrive at school no earlier than 8:25AM. Prior to this time, there is no supervision for students who are at school. Unaccompanied students should not be in the school hallways until their first bell has rung. Additionally, students should leave school promptly at 3:15PM. There is no supervision for students at school after 3:22PM.

Student Building Access Before and After School

Students eating breakfast should use the Cafeteria entrance on NE 22nd Avenue between 8:25AM and 8:55AM. For students who are not eating breakfast:

- MYP students must enter through the back SW playground doors from 8:38AM 8:45AM.
- PYP students must enter the NE Killingsworth main doors or the SE blacktop doors from 8:53AM 9:00AM.

Expect to see the Principal and Assistant Principal holding the MYP & PYP doors open each morning.

SUN School and YMCA students may re-enter the building at 3:15pm through the Cafeteria entrance on NE 22nd Avenue.

Pedestrian Crosswalks

Students and families are expected to cross at the crosswalks. Safety Patrol monitors the crosswalk at NE Killingsworth and 22nd Avenue from 8:35AM - 9:00AM and again from 3:15PM - 3:25PM.

Kindergarten Pick Up: Parent/guardian and/or approved individuals pick up students from their classrooms at 3:15PM.

Grades 1-8 Pick Up: Teachers escort students to the playground for dismissal at 3:15AM. Brothers, sisters and friends who are going to walk home together should arrange a meeting spot outside the building where they can wait for one another. Parents can meet students on the playground. Students in grades 6-8 stop by their lockers before proceeding to the playground.

K-5 students who are not walking home on their own and are not picked up by 3:22 will walk with their teachers to the Office so they can call their families.

Car Pick Up

- Please turn off your car engine while waiting for student dismissal.
- Observe the no parking and bus only signs.
- All car pick-ups of students should take place on NE Emerson Street (directly behind the playground) rather than on NE Killingsworth Street due to safety reasons.
- Cars ignoring posted signs may be ticketed by the Portland Police.

Telephone Messages

Except under emergency circumstances, students will not be called from class to come to the phone. Only messages that are absolutely necessary will be delivered to the classrooms. Please do not call the school to inform your child of after-school directions unless it is an emergency. Messages from phone calls in the last 15 minutes of the school day may not be delivered to students prior to the dismissal bell.

Students are only permitted to use the Main Office phone for emergencies. If students have a personal cell phone, we ask that families do not call students and/or send text messages during the school day, as it can cause a disruption to classroom learning. Please see student cell phone policy information under School Climate later in the Handbook.

Attendance

Regular daily attendance and arriving to school on time are important factors in ensuring successful achievement in school as well as good habits.

Absences

Please call the Office at **503-916-6415** if your child is ill or will not be attending school that day. If possible, please contact the teacher about missed work or plan to make arrangements to check in after your child returns to school.

Tardiness

Instruction will begin promptly at beginning of school day. Tardiness is considered a classroom disruption. Chronic tardiness or absences will be addressed by school administration so we can partner to make your child's year a successful one.

Leaving School Early

If you need to pick up your student before 3:15PM, use the front entrance and sign your student out in the Main Office. Your student will be called out of class to meet you there. Please do not go directly to your child's classroom.

Students will be released early only with the written permission of the person(s) who signed the registration card or if that person(s) comes to the Main Office and requests early dismissal. It is not our policy to accept permission for early release from a parent phone call.

Early dismissals should be kept to a minimum as classroom learning continues until the school day ends. Please schedule appointments so that their child's learning is not interrupted. These procedures have been developed to help ensure the safety of all students.

Books and Supplies

Lost and Found

Should any items be lost, we maintain a lost and found area in the hallway by the SE blacktop/playground doors. At the end of each quarter, the unclaimed clothing is laundered and sent to the PTA Clothing Center to be used for donations. Please be sure to label your child's clothing, lunch bags, and reusable water bottles by writing his/her name in permanent marker.

School Meals

Breakfast at Vernon is free for all students. 2019-2020 lunch prices will be:

Elementary K-5: \$2.90 6th-8th grade: \$3.15 Adult: \$4.40

Students may qualify for free or reduced priced meals depending on parent's income or status (Food Stamps or Aid to Dependent Children recipients, Foster Child Care provider, etc.). We urge you to complete a meal application form if you think you may qualify for reduced price meals.

*Students who qualified for reduced-price meals in 2018-2019 must reapply and be approved within 30 days of the start of the school year to continue to receive benefits.

Field Trips

Teachers will send home permission slips for each school field trip. We have a very generous PTA that helps make field trips more affordable and accessible. A student cannot leave school grounds for a field trip without parent or guardian permission. Volunteers are welcome and needed on most field trips. In order to chaperone a school field trip, you must complete the PPS Volunteer Information Form and background check. Health Services

Health services are provided by a licensed Registered Nurse (RN) from Multnomah Education Service District one-half day each week and we have a student Health Aide Monday-Friday each week. If your child has an immediate, short-term, or chronic health concern, the RN will work with you, your child, your child's physician, and school personnel to ensure that their health needs are met while at school. Office staff has received trainings to administer medication and provide basic first aid. A nurse is always available by phone.

If your child becomes ill or injured during the school day, s/he will receive nursing intervention from the RN or student Health Aide. An assessment of the student's health problem will be made and the nurse will determine what follow-up care and home communication is needed and necessary.

Children who have a well-balanced diet and get sufficient sleep and exercise generally have a better school experience. It is advisable to keep students at home when they are ill. This will speed recovery and prevent the spread of potential disease to others.

Some general guidelines to use in deciding if you should send your children to school are as follows:

- No one with a fever should be sent to school.
- No one who has been vomiting or experiencing diarrhea should be sent to school.
- Students should remain at home until free of symptoms and of fever without use of medication for 24 hours

Health Screenings

Oregon Law ensures that children receive vision and hearing screenings regularly to help identify children's health problems. The nurse oversees these screenings. The usual screening schedule is:

Dental: Grades 2, 3, 7, 8

Vision: Kindergarten, Grades 1 & 3 **Hearing:** Kindergarten, and Grade 1

If you do not want your child included in these screenings you must submit a written request to the school each school year. Screening results for dental, hearing and vision are all sent home to parents/guardians.

Food for Classroom Celebrations

District Policy requires that any food to be served in classrooms must be pre-packaged commercially. Please check with your child's teacher in advance for the best time of the day or week to bring in your treat.

School/Home Communication and Problem-Solving

Vernon IB World School considers the relationship between students' families and the school to be of paramount importance. In classrooms and in our school, our staff, parents and students work together frequently to problem solve issues and improve our processes with the goal of creating the best possible educational experience for students. This type of collaboration is the best way to resolve concerns. While not part of the complaint process, the following procedure applies to this type of problem-solving work.

1. If you have a concern related to the classroom and/or school:

- a. The complainant is encouraged to first speak to the teacher or staff person involved.
- b. If the concern is not resolved through direct communication, the complainant is encouraged to speak with the Principal and/or Assistant Principal. Principals have 10 calendar days to respond to concerns, which may include an in-person conference if requested by any involved party. If the concern is not resolved to the complainant's satisfaction, the Principal shall inform the complainant of the complaint process. Report Cards and Family/Teacher Conferences

Vernon will send home report cards three times each year (after the 2nd, 3rd, and 4th quarter), approximately one week after the grading period ends. Expect to get a report card in January, April, and June 2020. In place of 1st quarter report cards, there will be fall Family-Teacher Conferences on Monday, November 25th and Tuesday, November 26th. We will share more details on conference sign-ups as the dates approach.

Between reporting periods, families should keep in contact with their child's teacher via email, phone or notes. We ask that families allow teachers up to 24 hours to respond to inquiries.

Spring Student-led Conferences are scheduled for Tuesday, April 21st from 5:30pm -7:00pm at school. Student-Led Conferences are attended by the student, parent/guardian, teacher, and other adults the student would like present. The teacher facilitates the multiple conferences that are occurring in the classroom, and the student is in charge of presenting to their family. This year, we are continuing to use student work portfolios and emphasis on the IB Learner Profile to drive our conferences (Learner Profile: Principled, Reflective, Open-Minded, Balanced, Thinker, Risk-Taker, Inquirer, Caring, Communicator, Knowledgeable).

During the conference, students explain their progress on both academic (content/skill) and holistic (IB Learner Profile) targets. Students justify their progress by leading their families through a collection of assignments and personal reflection. The tone of the conference is positive with a focus on what can be done to ensure success

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School Climate

Vernon staff, students, and community will work together to create a learning environment that provides opportunities for each student to be challenged academically, enhance positive self esteem, develop respect and concern for others, and become responsible, independent, global thinkers. School Climate encompasses CR-PBIS (Culturally-Responsive Positive Behavioral Interventions & Supports), Restorative Practices with the lens of racial Equity.

CR-PBIS

CR-PBIS (Culturally-Responsive Positive Behavioral Interventions & Supports) uses implementation science to help students to develop positive behaviors. The unique racial, cultural and linguistic makeup of the school is explicitly addressed at every decision point.

At the most basic level, CR-PBIS can be described as a three-pronged approach:

- 1. Explicitly teach classroom and common area expectations.
- 2. Actively acknowledge students when they are following the expectations and exhibiting positive, productive behaviors.
- 3. Instructionally correct and reteach kids when they are not following or meeting the expectations.

Research shows that when school staff acknowledge positive behaviors at least three times more often than correcting behavioral mistakes, misbehaviors decrease significantly.

Celebration of Positive Behaviors

As a part of our school climate plan, we recognize students who have shown positive behaviors by embodying the IB Learner Profile.

- Students earn IB Learner Profile "Compliments" for positive behaviors. These can be redeemed for both schoolwide, classroom, and individual incentives.
- Quarterly School Spirit Celebrations/Assemblies acknowledge positive academic and behavioral achievements.

Restorative Practices

Restorative Practices, also referred to as Restorative Justice, is a range of community building and peacemaking practices adapted to the school setting. The intention is to build trusting relationships and offer restorative alternatives to punitive discipline. Our goal is to continue building, maintaining, and repairing relationships to form a healthy, supportive, an inclusive community. When we do things that impact others and create harm in the community, it is our individual and collective responsibility to make things right.

Restorative Inquiry is an essential restorative practice. A series of guiding questions are asked:

- What happened?
- Who was affected/impacted?
- What can be done to make and keep things right?
- How can others support you?

Circles are also an essential restorative practice in the school community. Circles help build positive relationships and social-emotional skills such as empathy and good communication skills, which affect both short-term (school success) and long-term (relationships and employment) factors. Circles give everyone a voice.

Equity

Ensuring equally high outcomes for all participants in our educational system and specifically at Vernon School involves removing the predictability of success or failure that currently correlates with social and cultural factors. In our Equity work and mission, we will continue to work around interrupting inequitable practices, eliminating biases, and creating an inclusive multicultural school environment for adults and children; discovering and cultivating the unique gifts, talents and interests that every child and human possesses.

School Wide Values

Our Core Values and Expectations are driven by the International Baccalaureate (IB) Learner Profile (to be Principled, Reflective, Open-Minded, Balanced, Thinker, Risk-Taker, Inquirer, Caring, Communicator, Knowledgeable).

Essential Agreements

Be Safe. Be Respectful. Be Responsible. Be IB.

Student Cell Phone Use

The policy for cell phone use for PYP (K-5) students is: cell phones and devices are off and away the entire school day.

The policy for cell phone use for MYP (6-8) students is: cell phones and devices are off and away the entire day, with the exception of recess and lunch. Students are allowed to use their phones in the cafeteria and outside at recess.

This means that no cell phones should be out in the hallways, classrooms or bathrooms at Vernon. If a student violates the policy, the following steps will be taken:

1st violation- Phone will be confiscated and turned into the office to be picked up at the end of the day by the student. 2nd violation- Phone will be confiscated and parents will have to pick up the phone in the office.

If your student needs to reach you, they need to come to the Office to make the calll, so the Office is aware of any emergency or concern. Please do not engage in phone or text conversations with your child during the school day. Instead, please contact the Main Office at 503-916-6415



Portland Public Schools Dress Code Policy

The District Dress Code policy applies to all schools in Portland Public Schools grades PK-12, with the exception of schools with a Uniform Dress Code policy. The responsibility for the dress and grooming of a student rests primarily with the students and their families.

Allowable Dress & Grooming

- Students must wear clothing including both a shirt with pants or skirt, or the equivalent and shoes.
- Shirts and dresses must have fabric in the front and on the sides.
- Clothing must cover undergarments, waistbands and bra straps excluded.
- Fabric covering all private parts must not be see through.
- Hats and other headwear must allow the face to be visible and not interfere with the line of sight to any student or staff. Hoodies must allow the student face and ears to be visible to staff.
- Clothing must be suitable for all scheduled classroom activities including physical education, science labs, woodshop, and other activities where unique hazards exist.
- Specialized courses may require specialized attire, such as sports uniforms or safety gear.

Non-Allowable Dress & Grooming

- Clothing may not depict, advertise or advocate the use of alcohol, tobacco, marijuana or other controlled substances.
- Clothing may not depict pornography, nudity or sexual acts.
- Clothing may not use or depict hate speech targeting groups based on race, ethnicity, gender, sexual orientation, gender identity, religious affiliation or any other protected groups.
- Clothing, including gang identifiers, must not threaten the health or safety of any other student or staff.
- If the student's attire or grooming threatens the health or safety of any other person, then discipline for dress or grooming violations should be consistent with discipline policies for similar violations.

IB PYP Exhibition and MYP Community Project

Students at Vernon participate in two culminating research and action projects that allow them to use the attitudes, skills and knowledge they have gained in the PYP and MYP to follow an area of interest and make the world a better place.

In 5th grade, Exhibition allows small groups of students to engage in a collaborative, transdisciplinary inquiry into a global or local problem. These groups then take action within the school or larger community. The project ends with a presentation and celebration of what they have learned.

In 8th Grade, the Community Project is a yearlong investigation into a local or global issue. Over the course of their 8th grade year, students examine multiple perspectives, review existing solutions and design a plan of action. Students can take direct action, spread awareness, design a technical solution, create an artistic response or conduct deepter research as their action. The project ends with a presentation of student learning and a celebration of their achievements.

Both the 5th Grade Exhibition and the 8th Grade Community Projects will take place on Monday, June 1, 2020 from 5:30-7:30.


