### 7 TIPS TO DIGITAL CITIZENSHIP

- 1. **Take the time to read and understand the original post.** Read and reflect on an entire article or post as well as the comments of others before joining the conversation.
- 2. Exchange ideas with one or more users. Approach online conversations as an opportunity to learn new things; read, ask questions and hear others out as much as or even more than you speak.
- 3. **Tag and mention community members.** Reference a particular person, line of thinking or portion of the original text. Stay on topic.
- 4. **Carefully craft your message.** Consider the audience you are writing for. Comments with typos, incomplete thoughts or uncommon slang can make it hard for others to understand your message.
- 5. **Present evidence and personal experiences that support your opinions.** This is a more respectful and effective way to engage with others who do not agree with your opinions than insults, name-calling, and attacking other users.
- 6. **Uphold the digital community's agreed-upon norms for interaction.** If you don't know the norms, look to how others are behaving or ask for guidance.
- 7. **Consume as much as you contribute.** Read with the intention of understanding and learning more, not to combat other people's opinions.



### GOOGLE MEET SOCIAL NORMS FOR STUDENTS:

- 1. Keep your microphone muted unless you are speaking.
- 2. Each student is in charge of their own microphone.
- 3. Use the chat area to let your teacher know that you want to talk or for messages that are on-topic for the discussion.
- 4. Prioritize your time during the class and avoid multitasking.
- 5. Take turns and do not interrupt others when speaking.
- 6. If you turn off your video during calls for privacy for your household, be sure that your profile picture is school appropriate.
- 7. You may use headphones if you have them, but they are not required.

#### GOOGLE MEET SOCIAL NORMS FOR TEACHERS:

- 1. Before starting with the first official class meeting, take time to make sure each student understands how to mute, unmute, use comments, and share screens.
- 2. Consider this platform as an opportunity for connection and conversation.
- 3. During each session, allow each attendee an opportunity to speak.
- 4. Don't use this platform for lecture or one-sided communication.
- 5. Facilitate student-student interaction as much as possible.
- 6. Keep calls under one hour and allow students to come and go as needed.
- 7. Captions can be turned on if needed.
- 8. Establish hand signals for whole group responses.
