Professional Development

One way to increase staff knowledge around students with Autism Spectrum Disorder is to provide Professional Development opportunities within your building. We are happy to schedule these during late openings or during your weekly staff meeting.



ASD Library

Attend Team Meetings

Most special education teams have a team meeting. This is a great opportunity for us to come and introduce ourselves and for the school team to talk with their ASD Specialist. Please let us know when these team meetings are occurring so that we can put them on our calendar.

Coaching & Observations

We can meet with teachers and help determine some areas of need. Through this we can schedule follow-ups to work on this skill. Sometimes it is helpful to have an extra set of eyes take time to observe a student in a classroom. We can arrange this and then provide some ideas and strategies when working with the student.

Some things to remember as you set up your room

Think about Routines

Whether you are in a Kindergarten classroom and need to remind students about what to do when they want to go to the bathroom or you are in high school and need to remind students about where to turn in their homework and how to track assignments. Routines are crucial for supporting students to know what to know what to expect, to be independent and to decrease anxiety.



Decrease sensory stimulation in the room

Many students can be visually over stimulated by all of the materials and posters in classrooms. When possible keep you room neat, organized and clean.



Remember to have clear expectations

Teach the rules!

Let students know what is going on

Post the schedule, the agenda and support students in breaking down assignments into smaller chunks.

Know your students' accommodations and modifications

There is a lot going on at the start of the school year, but accommodations and modifications are a must! We will post an "IEP at a Glance" on the Autism Services Website that is easily typed into, saved and provided for all staff working with your students. Getting everyone on board helps students get the services they need from the start.
