## INTRODUCTION

### Executive Summary

This report is a profile of current and historical enrollments for Portland Public Schools. Included herein are various summaries of these data, *e.g.*, by high school attendance area, building, grade level, gender and ethnicity. In recent years enrollment counts are compiled on or about the first of October. An enrolled student is defined as a student who attends one or more schools or programs within the District. Regardless of the number of schools or programs attended, each student is counted only once; the counts are unduplicated.

Following are brief highlights of the report.

- Overall enrollment is 54,746, a drop of 1,085 students from the previous year.
- Middle and high school enrollments declined slightly (down 109 and 106 students respectively). Elementary school enrollment was reduced by 3.0 percent (776 students). The elementary school reduction seems largely a reduced enrollment in pre-kindergarten (92 fewer students or 19.3%) and kindergarten programs (223 fewer students or 5.8%). In comparison, there were 475 (2.3%) fewer students in grades 1 through 5.
- Enrollment in Special Education Programs decreased by 55 students (2.6%).
- Enrollment in community-based alternative programs is 2.1 percent (36 students) higher than last year.

## Explanations and Definitions of Computed Data

The Late Enrollee Ratio and Stability Index are indicators of student mobility within the District in a given instructional year. Used in conjunction with enrollment counts, these statistics provide a broader picture of the District's student population. For example, in schools with high Late Enrollee Ratios or low Stability Indices, enrollment counts during the school year may vary considerably from the October 1 counts.

**Please note that methods for calculating both the Late Enrollee Ratio and the Stability Index were revised in 1997-98.** Previous years' summaries were derived from aggregate data depicting how and from where students entered the District and why they left (*i.e.*, entry and leave codes). These data provided only a general indication of when students entered and/or left Portland Public Schools (PPS). Summaries contained in subsequent reports were derived directly from the District's student database and individual entry and leave dates. In all cases, comparisons of Stability Indices calculated using the current method are higher than those derived from the previous method. In contrast, similar comparisons of Late Enrollee Ratios are mixed. Extreme caution should be used when making comparisons of these data across years.

### *Late Enrollee Ratio*

This is the percentage of students in a given school year who enrolled **after** October 1 compared to those who enrolled **by** October 1. The average Late Enrollee Ratio for the District in 1998-99 was 18.9% (this includes the District's alternative schools and programs); for elementary schools 12.9%; for middle schools 12.3%; and high schools 10.5%. The formula is A / B, where:

- A = the number of students enrolled **after** October 1  
B = the number of students enrolled **by** October 1

### *Stability Index*

This is the percentage of students in a given school year enrolled at the same school October through June compared to October 1 enrollment. The average Stability Index for the District in 1998-99 was 84.6%; for elementary schools 88.0%; for middle schools 87.5%; and high schools 82.7%. (Again, the District Stability Index reported above includes the alternative schools and programs, in addition to the regular elementary, middle and high schools.) The formula used is A / B, where:

- A = number of students enrolled in the same school October through June  
B = the number of students enrolled **by** October 1


### District Enrollment Historical, 1980 Through 1999 Recent Trends by Ethnicity (Graphics)
