An enrolled student is defined as a student who attends one or more schools or programs within the District. Regardless of the number of schools or programs attended, each student is counted only once; the counts are unduplicated.

An enrolled student is defined as a student who attends one or more schools or programs within the District. Regardless of the number of schools or programs attended, each student is counted only once; the counts are unduplicated. Schools and programs that are no longer in operation are designated as "closed."



- (1) Effective $201ar{6}$ -17, "New Avenues for Youth" and "Outside In" are no longer contracted with PPS
- (2) Effective 2016-17, Self Enhancement Academy does not serve 6th grade
- (3) Effective 2016-17, Ockley Green re-opens as a middle school, 5th grade from Chief Joseph remains in the Ockley Green building for 2016-17. Effective 2016-17, Dckley Green re-opens as a middle school, 5th grade from Chief Joseph becomes a K-4, Peninsula becomes a K-5, Woodlawn becomes a K-5.
- (4) Effective 2013-14, Chief Joseph and Ockley Green merged to form Chief Joseph/Ockley Green K-8. (5) Effective 2012-13, Humboldt closed. Students from Humboldt neighborhood now attend Boise-Eliot/Humboldt. (6) Effective 2012-13, Young Women's Leadership Academy closed.
- (7) Effective 2011-12, Marshall closed. Students in the Harrison Park K-8 School area attend Madison High School. Students in the Kelly and Woodmere Elementary School areas, and the Bridger, Lent and Marysville K-8 areas, attend Franklin High School. Students in the Whitman Elementary School area attend Cleveland High School.
- (8) Effective 2011-12, students in the Jefferson duster have the choice to attend either the new Jefferson Middle College program or a neighborhood comprehensive high school program at Roosewelt, Madison or Grant, depending on where they live within the Jefferson cluster boundaries

 - (9) For the 2011-12 school year, Rigler neighborhood 7th and 8th graders attended Vernon. (10) Effective 2010-11, Clarendon-Portsmouth was renamed César Chávez.
- (11) Effective 2008-09, Binnsmead closed and the Clark School students and staff moved from the Clark site to the Binnsmead site. The school was renamed Harrison Park. The Creative Science School Program (CSSP) expanded and moved from Bridger Elementary to the Clark site.
 - (12) ACCESS is a district-wide alternative education program. Starting in 2013-14, it is located at the Rose City Park site.
- (13) In 2009-10 Scott and Rigler became K-8 schools. Effective 2008-09, Scott and Rigler remained K-7 schools, and those students that matriculated from 7th to 8th grade attended at the Madison 8th grade academy.
- (14) Effective 2007-08, Clarendon ES and Portsmouth MS merged to form a K-8 school. Enrollment counts for years prior to 2007-08 for Clarendon consist of grades K-5 only. Enrollment counts for Portsmouth prior to 2007-08 are contained in the MS section of this report. Similarly, Hollyrood ES and Fernwood MS merged to form a K-8 school (renamed Beverly Cleary) as did Rose City Park ES and Gregory Heights MS (renamed Roseway Heights). (15) Effective 2007-08, Kellogg MS was closed. Eighth grade students that would have been enrolled at Kellogg for the 2007-08 school year were enrolled at Franklin HS. Tubman MS was also closed and a new Young Women's Academy was opened on the Tubman campus as part of Jefferson High School
- (16) Transitioned to K-8. In 2009-10 Laurelhurst, Rigler, Scott became K-8 schools. In 2008-09 Arleta, Astor, Boise-Eliot, Bridger, Clark, Creston, Faubion, Humboldt, Irvington, Lee, Lent, Marysville, Peninsula, Sabin, Skyline, Vestal, Woodlawn became K-8 schools. In 2007-08 Beach, Clarendon-Portsmouth, Beverly Cleary, King, Roseway Heights, Vernon became K-8 schools.
 - (17) Day and Residential Treatment Programs (long-term care and treatment).
- (18) Effective 2006-07, Meek Professional Technical HS, Portland Night HS at Grant, Marshall Night HS, and Madison Focus (shown in Madison enrollment in prior years) merged to form Alliance High School.
 - (19) Effective 2006-07, Ockley Green converted from a middle school to a K-8, and Kellogg and Portsmouth no longer received sixth grade students.
- (20) Effective 2005-06, two high schools located at the Marshall campus, Linus Pauling Academy and Portland Academy of International Studies, merged into one school renamed Pauling Academy of Integrated Sciences.
- Applegate neighborhood area went on to attend Woodlawn. Similarly, students residing in the Edwards neighborhood area went on to attend Abernethy, those at Kenton to Chief Joseph; those at Richmond to Abernethy, Creston or Glencoe; and those at Smith went on to Capitol Hill, Maplewood or Markham. Most middle school students residing in the Whitaker neighborhood area went on to attend Tubman. A new focus/option school was established at the (21) Applegate, Edwards, Kenton, Richmond and Smith Elementary Schools were closed at the end of the 2004-05 school year. Whitaker Middle school was closed as well. Most elementary school-aged students residing in the

The overall free and reduced price meal percentage shows who can eat for free. This metric is not comparable across schools. Free Meal by Direct Certification % is the only comparable measure of economic hardship across all schools, because CEP schools and Head Start do not collect paper applications.

Funds included are general funds (personnel, supplies, operations); grant funds (including tuition collected for fee-based full-day kindergarten, and funding of personnel through fundraising /donations). General Fund FTE – General Funded positions allocated mostly by enrollment projection, but also includes Equity and Non-Formula components.

- Staff (in licensed equivalents) purchased with a school's federal Title 1 grant allocation. Within some general constraints, each school decides the proportion of its grant that is spent on staffing. This number will be zero if the school did not qualify for Title 1 funding, or if they do not buy FTE with this grant. For elementary schools receiving Title 1, this number includes Full Day Kindergarten if paid for with Title 9

Other Grants - The number of FTE provided through grants other than Title 1. These might include state, federal or private grants obtained by the District or school for specific programs

Counts of students are unduplicated within a school and action. For example if a student at a school received two out-of-school suspensions and one expulsion, that student will be counted once in the Expulsion column, once in the Out-of-School Suspension column and once in the Overall column. In this example, three incidents would be shown for that student in the Incidents row.

Caution should be exercised when comparing discipline data across schools and years. Although District policies and regulations increase consistency in addressing and reporting student discipline incidents, corrective action is based on an understanding of the individual student and ultimately determined by the best professional judgment of the administrator.

^{**} For most of the schools and programs reported here, October enrollments are representative of the total number of students served throughout the school year, and thus a reasonable basis for calculating suspension and expulsion rates. However, for Alliance HS, an alternative high school serving 16- to 21-year olds previously unsuccessful in traditional high school programs, the total number of students served during the school year may be as many as 2 to 3 times greater than October enrollments. Consequently, suspension and expulsion rates reported for Alliance HS should be viewed with caution. Pioneer Programs, similarly take students throughout the school year, therefore October Enrollment is not a good representation of the total students served.

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1. Budget and Staffing

School Budget Per Student – Dollars budgeted for current year at each school divided by the total enrollment at the school as of October. Funds included are general funds (personnel, supplies, operations); grant funds (including Federal grants such as Title 1-A); and special revenue funds (including parent-paid half of Kindergarten and funding of personnel through fundraising /donations). Included in the general funds is the Arts Education and Access income tax disbursement, which provides funding for art teachers for students in grades K to 5 at a ratio of 445 to 1, rounded to the nearest 0.5 FTE. (Source: PeopleSoft Financial System – Budget Office)

<u>Budget Rank (range)</u> – Rank of this school's Budget per Student from highest (1) to lowest among schools in the same category. FTE accounted for by the Art Tax disbursement is an aspect of the General Fund FTE and Budget per Student calculations. Charter schools budget data not available and excluded from budget rank. The school categories used here and throughout these profiles, unless otherwise noted, are:

PK/K-5 (elementary) – 31 schools PK/K-8, PK/K-12 (multi-level) – 27 schools 6-8 (middle school) – 11 schools 9-12 (high school) – 10 schools

Economic Disadvantaged – As of September 2, 2014, Portland Public Schools implemented the Community Eligibility Provision (CEP) program at 25 eligible schools. These CEP schools provide school breakfasts and lunches to all students at no charge while enrolled in a CEP school. Another component to CEP is that Districts no longer collect paper application for free or reduced priced meals at CEP eligible schools. This means that Districts who implement CEP need to find a new way to measure economic disadvantage.

PPS is now relying on a measurement called "Direct Certification" to measure economic disadvantage. Direct Certification information is shared with PPS Nutrition Services from the State of Oregon. The State identifies families for free meals, mostly related to 130% of poverty, or a categorical reason such as Supplemental Nutritional Assistance Program, Temporary Assistance for Needy Families, Foster Care, and other reasons.

When using Direct Certification as opposed to Free and Reduced Meal eligibility, the definition of economic disadvantage changes from a qualification level of \$44,863 for a family of 4 (185% of poverty level) to \$31,525 for a family of 4 (130% of poverty level). This means that schools will have a smaller direct certification percentage than they will free and reduced meal percentage. For example in 2014-15, if a school's Free and Reduced Meal percentage was 60%,

the corresponding Direct Certification percentage would be approximately 40%. (Source: PPS System Planning and Performance; Nutrition Services; SIS)

<u>School Receives Title I Funds?</u> - Dollars are allocated per qualifying student. High schools only receive Title I funding if they are identified as "High Poverty", which is equivalent to 75% Free or Reduced Price Meals. (Source: PPS Funded Programs Department; System Planning and Performance)

<u>Special Education</u> – Percentage of October enrollment at each school with records indicating participation in an Individualized Education Plan (IEP), that is, Special Education program students. (Source: PPS Special Education Department)

<u>English Language Learners</u> – Percentage of students enrolled in October who are English Language Learners eligible for ESL/Bilingual Services based on a language other than English spoken in the home and a language proficiency assessment indicating limited English proficiency. ELL is also referred to as "LEP." (Source: ESL Department)

<u>Talented and Gifted</u> – Percentage of October enrollment identified as academically talented, intellectually gifted or TAG potential as measured by Talented and/or Gifted Program criteria. (Source: SIS Membership Report)

<u>Licensed FTE Allocation</u> – An <u>FTE</u> (Full Time Equivalent) is defined as a regular staff (administrative, licensed, or classified) position scheduled to work eight hours per day. FTE does not count people, but positions. Two individuals who each work half time (4 hours per day) equal 1.0 FTE.

A <u>Licensed</u> FTE refers to certified staff such as teachers, counselors, media specialists, psychologists, social workers, nurses, athletic trainers, occupational speech, and physical therapists. For <u>allocation</u> purposes, licensed "equivalents" are used for comparison. For this calculation, two (2) classified FTE is equivalent to one (1) licensed FTE. Allocations are shown as licensed equivalent so that comparisons can be made across schools. Since principals choose different balances between teachers (licensed) and educational assistants (classified), a common measure – FTE in licensed equivalents – is applied to allocate and compare resources across schools.

General Fund Staffing Allocations are based on each school's average enrollment – Average Daily Membership – adjusted for projected demographic trends, and school reconfigurations. General Fund allocations are divided into three categories –

<u>Administrative Support FTE</u> provides for Principal/Assistant Principals and Secretaries, Counselors, and other Support Staff at High Schools (depending on type and size of school);

<u>Ratio FTE</u> based on a student to teacher ratio that varies by school level: for 2016-17 K-5 schools are at 25.8:1, K-8 & K-12 schools are at 24.0:1, middle schools are at 24.75:1 and high schools are at 21.63:1.

Equity FTE In accordance with PPS Racial Educational Equity policy, which explicitly calls for the differentiation of resources, additional FTE is allocated to promote greater equity across the District. This equity allocation is eight percent of the non-administrative formula (Ratio, Kindergarten, Equity) FTE. Half of the Equity FTE will be allocated based upon students' Socio-Economic Status, and the other half of the Equity FTE will be allocated based upon the number and percentage of students PPS identifies as historically underserved.

Formula-based allocations cannot always reflect the special circumstances of a particular school and as a result some additional FTE is allocated for unusual school requirements or schools in transitioning situations. These allocations outside the allocation formula are One Time Adjustments.

Categories above are funded from the General Fund. The remainder of the staffing shown represents positions funded by Grant and Special Revenue sources that have special purposes and restrictions on use:

<u>Title 1</u> shows the staff (in licensed equivalents) purchased with a school's federal Title 1 grant allocation. Within some general constraints, each school decides the proportion of its grant that is spent on staffing. This number will be zero if the school did not qualify for Title 1 funding, or if they do not buy FTE with this grant. For elementary schools receiving Title 1, includes Full Day Kindergarten if paid for with Title 1.

<u>Foundation/Fee-For-Service K</u> shows the number of licensed equivalent FTE purchased by the school using local fundraising and donations (foundation) and fees paid by parents for Full Day Kindergarten programs. Note: These FTE are determined on a per-school basis and are not part of General Fund allocations.

Other Grants is the number of FTE provided through grants other than Title 1. These might include state, federal or private grants obtained by the District or school for specific programs.

2. Enrollment Characteristics

Enrollment – Enrollment counts include students enrolled in Portland Public Schools. Counts were compiled on the first school day in October of each year. An enrolled student is one who attends one or more schools or programs within the District. Students receiving Special Education services only who are not regularly attending, but are in the student information system (SIS), are excluded from the enrollment summaries. Regardless of the number of schools or

programs attended, each student is counted only once; the counts are unduplicated. (Source: SIS)

PK – Pre Kindergarten students, K – Kindergarten students, 1 through 12 – first through 12th grade, N/A – grade not available, or students not assigned a grade.

<u>Projected Enrollment in 2020-21 (K-12)</u> – Five year enrollment projection for students Kindergarten through twelfth grade developed by Population Research Center, College of Urban and Public Affairs, Portland State University; "N/A" shown data unavailable at time of publication.

<u>Racial/Ethnic Background</u> - Percentage of various racial/ethnic backgrounds as reported in October enrollment counts. Latino ethnicity includes students identified as Hispanic/Latino regardless of race. Asian and Pacific Islander are shown in separate columns (in prior years they were combined).

Multiple Races category includes students identified as two or more races, exclusive of Hispanic/Latino. Multiple Race students can be further disaggregated by ancestry: students with Historically Underserved ancestry (African American, Native American, or Pacific Islander) are distinguished from students with only Asian/White ancestry. (Source: SIS)

3. Neighborhood Attendance Characteristics

Neighborhood PPS Student Population - Number of Portland Public School students who reside within the neighborhood boundary surrounding the school. This breakdown categorizes the types of schools attended by PPS students. (Note: This number does <u>not</u> include students who live in the area but who attend private schools, are home-schooled, attend school in other school districts, or who do not attend school.)

Some special focus schools do not have a neighborhood boundary since they draw students from many areas of the District. This section is not applicable to those schools.

The Jefferson <u>Dual Assignment Area</u> was created in 2011-12. Students in 9th to 12th grade living in the Jefferson neighborhood have the right to attend Jefferson Middle College or their neighborhood high school. The neighborhood high schools with Dual Assignment areas are Grant, Madison and Roosevelt. Grant, Madison and Roosevelt show their Jefferson "Dual Assignment" area characteristics as well as neighborhood attendance area characteristics.

Attending (Name of School in this Profile) – Number and percentage of Neighborhood PPS Student Population who attend their neighborhood school. This percentage is sometimes referred to as the school's *capture rate*. Pre-kindergarten (PK) is excluded from the neighborhood calculation, due to the limited number of schools at which the program operates.

<u>Other PPS Neighborhood Schools</u> - Number and percentage of neighborhood student population attending a neighborhood school other than the school in this profile.

Selected Special Programs/Focus Options – Number and percentage of neighborhood student population attending one of the schools or programs listed below that, because of their design, draw students districtwide: Benson High School, Jefferson Middle College, Richmond Elementary (Japanese Immersion), Winterhaven, Alliance High School, daVinci Middle School, Metropolitan Leaning Center, ACCESS, Odyssey Program, Buckman Arts Focus School, Creative Science School Program, and Sunnyside Environmental. Also included are the Japanese Immersion programs at Mt. Tabor, Richmond, and Grant; the Mandarin Immersion programs at MLK Jr, Woodstock, Hosford, and Cleveland; the Russian Immersion programs at Kelly, Lane, and Franklin; the Spanish Immersion programs located at Ainsworth, Atkinson, Beach, Beaumont, Bridger, César Chávez, Franklin, James John, Lent, Lincoln, Madison, Mt. Tabor, Ockley Green, Rigler, Roosevelt, Sitton, Scott, and West Sylvan; and the Vietnamese Immersion program at Roseway Heights.

When a neighborhood student attends a special program/focus option that is located in their neighborhood school, they are counted as attending their neighborhood school. For example, if a Hayhurst neighborhood student attends Odyssey Program at Hayhurst, they are counted as attending Hayhurst rather than as attending a special program/focus option. This assumption is applied to Odyssey at Hayhurst, Buckman Arts, and Sunnyside Environmental School, as well as Language Immersion programs located in Neighborhood Schools.

<u>PPS Charter Schools</u> – Number and percentage of the neighborhood student population attending one of the District Charter schools: Arthur Academy, Emerson Public Charter, Opal Charter School, Le Monde French Immersion, Kairos PDX, Portland Village School, Self Enhancement Inc. or Trillium Public Charter. State-sponsored charter schools aren't included in these profiles.

<u>Special Services</u> – Number and percentage of the neighborhood student population attending Special Education-administered programs not in schools, day and residential treatment and other special services.

<u>Community Based Alternative Programs</u> – Number and percentage of the neighborhood student population attending contract-based alternative programs such as DePaul Center, Mt. Scott Park Center for Learning, NAYA Early College Academy, Open School North, various PCC programs, Rosemary Anderson, YouthBuilders and others.

4. Educational Programs

Achievement Scores – Percent Meeting or Exceeding Benchmarks – 2014-15 was the first year that Portland Public Schools administered the Smarter Balanced Assessment. Students who perform at level 3 or 4 on the assessment are categorized as on track to be college and career ready. http://portland.schoolwires.net/Page/2077

5. School Environment

This section shows selected data intended to summarize important indicators of school environment. In each case two measures are shown: a measure of the school profiled and an average on this same measure across all schools in the same category. Thus each elementary school (PK/K-5) is compared to the average comprised of all elementary schools; each multi-level (PK/K-8 or K-12) school is compared to the average across multi-level schools, each middle school (6-8) is compared to the middle school average, and each high school (9-12) to the high school average. These measures are calculated on an annual basis and thus the numbers shown are for the 2015-16 school year.

<u>Teacher Experience</u> This is the average number of years of teaching experience for teachers at each school and the average of similar schools in the District. Average years are weighted by the full time equivalent for each teacher. Thus a half-time teacher would be half-weighted in the calculation. The Comparable District Average is the average teacher experience for all schools in the comparable category (elementary, multi-level (PK/K-8, PK/K-12), middle school or high school).

<u>Substitute Usage</u> This is the total days of substitute usage at the school by individuals in teaching positions, divided by the average number of licensed teachers (and others, such as counselors and media specialists, who receive substitutes when teaching classes). Special education and ESL teachers are included in this measure. The Comparable District Average is the average substitute usage for all schools in the comparable category (elementary, multilevel (PK/K-8, PK/K-12), middle school or high school).

Average Daily Attendance This number, derived from individual student data, indicates the percentage of enrolled students who were present (in attendance) averaged across all school days during the entire school year. The Comparable District Average is the Average Daily Attendance for all schools in the comparable category (elementary, multi-level (PK/K-8, PK/K-12), middle school or high school). Attendance used in ODE report cards is calculated differently.

Average Class Size This statistic for each school reflects the average number of students in homeroom or self-contained classrooms (generally grades K-5, but sometimes 6-8) or, for higher grades, in classes defined as "core" and other subjects. The Comparable District Average is the average for all schools in the comparable category (elementary, multi-level (PK/K-8, PK/K-12), middle school or high school). Classes taught by Special Education and ESL teachers are included with this calculation. This is a "snapshot" as of May 2, 2016. Sources: SIS and Staffing Management Tool (SMT). Students were matched with teachers, course codes, period of day, and room assignments.)

Stability Index This is a measure of students who are enrolled for at least 145 days of the school year divided by the official October enrollment count. Students not enrolled for the full year include those who enroll after the start of the school year, leave before the end of the school year, or are enrolled sporadically. Schools with a higher index generally have a more stable student population than those with a lower percentage. The Comparable District Average is the average for all schools in the comparable category (elementary, multi-level (PK/K-8, PK/K-12), middle school or high school). Another measure (not shown in the School Environment section, but in the District Summary section) identifies the amount of student mobility in a school by calculating a *Late Enrollee Ratio*, which measures how many students arrive after the first school day in October.

Student Expulsions Number of students expelled during the school year as a percentage of October enrollment. The Comparable District Average is the number of expulsions for all schools in the comparable category (elementary, multi-level (PK/K-8, PK/K-12), middle school or high school).

<u>Student Suspensions</u> Number of students suspended from school (out-of-school suspension) during the school year as a percent of October enrollment. If one student were to be suspended more than one time, the count would not be duplicated. The Comparable District Average is the number of expulsions for all schools in the comparable category (elementary, multi-level (PK/K-8, PK/K-12), middle school or high school).

6. Enrollment Indicators

These calculations are indicators that additional data and further review of the school may be needed.

Declining Enrollment

<u>Yes</u> if enrollment has declined by 5% or more compared to the prior year, accompanied by an enrollment decline of 15% or more over the past four years. No if enrollment has not met these conditions.

Neighborhood Capture Rate

<u>Yes</u> if the number of neighborhood students attending this school is less than 55% of the Portland Public schools students who live within this school's neighborhood boundaries.

No if 55% or more of neighborhood students attend this school.

<u>Density Index</u> October enrollment divided by Number of Classrooms. This is intended as an indicator of the classroom capacity of the building compared to the number of students using the physical space. A high number could indicate crowding; a low number might indicate potential excess capacity. This index is a broad indicator of capacity, and must be considered in light of actual space usage for Special Education classes, computer labs, Head Start classrooms, ESL and Title 1.

Number of Classrooms Actual amount of "potential" classroom space in a school including classrooms housing standard education programs, other District programs, outside programs/partnerships, Special Education classes, English Language Learner classes, and vacant rooms. Generally this number is greater than the number of rooms used for standard classroom purposes. (Prepared by PPS Facilities and Asset Management, Classroom Use Survey, December 2004, and updated for the placement of modular buildings since that date.)

Building Density Index

<u>Yes</u> if the school's enrollment divided by the number of classrooms is less than 15 or greater than 20.

<u>No</u> if the school's enrollment divided by the number of classrooms is between 15 and 20.

Note that a building density index greater than 20 means there is little or no room left for growth in that facility, whereas a number less than 15 may indicate the potential for excess capacity.

7. Comments/Issues

This section is intended for comments or mitigating factors with respect to the enrollment indicators (shown above) or for clarification of other data presented. This section is to be completed by the Principal and/or Deputy Superintendent. It may be left blank.

School ESEA Levels

The Oregon Waiver offers the State the flexibility to address school improvement through a model of growth and support. Students are ranked with their grade-level and performance-level peers across the state to determine the level of performance of the school. The five areas of performance that are measured are Achievement, Growth, Subgroup Growth, Graduation, and Subgroup Graduation. Each of these five categories is weighted and the overall ESEA score classifies each school.

The five ESEA classifications are as follows:

Level 5– Model (top 10% of schools in state),

Level 4 – Strong (falls between 44% and 90% of schools in state),

Level 3 – Satisfactory (falls between 15% and 44% of schools in state),

Level 2 – Focus (falls between 5% and 15% of schools in state),

Level 1 – Priority (falls in the bottom 5% of schools in state).

The schools labeled SIG have received School Improvement Grants that are earmarked for school improvement. Schools that were designated as Focus or Priority in prior years, may remain with that designation for several years with extra support from the state.

Feeder Patterns and Jefferson Cluster Dual Assignment

The Comments/Issues section also may list school feeder patterns. These include several for schools in the Jefferson cluster. These comments refer to "Dual Assignment," the policy giving students in the Jefferson cluster the choice to attend either the new Middle College program at Jefferson or a neighborhood comprehensive high school program at Roosevelt, Madison or Grant, depending on where they live within the Jefferson cluster boundaries.

These students also maintain the same placement options as all other PPS students, such as enrollment in a focus, charter or educational option school, placement to a different school that can best serve their special education needs, and possible eligibility for priority transfer to another comprehensive high school due to NCLB sanctions.
