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# Principal's memo:

Hello Senators,

Forecasting for classes for the 2020-21 school year will begin the week of January 6th. We will send out more info about the process before the winter break. This is a great time to have a conversation with your child about their post-secondary plan. The classes they take now may affect their choices.

Students will be in many different places regarding their plans after high school. There is not a prescribed benchmark by grade level where a student should be in their thought process. Some Freshman have a clear plan regarding the colleges they are planning to apply to for a specific career path, and some Seniors are still undecided what their next steps will be. The goal for all students at all grade levels is to think about options and look at the forecasting process as an opportunity to either prepare them for a more locked-in post secondary plan, to try different subjects to discover a new interest, or a combination of both. Starting the conversation now and checking in multiple times prior to forecasting can have a positive impact on the process and increase interest in
