PPS MASKING UPDATE

Masking is now optional for all staff and students across every PPS building. This is aligned with the new public health guidance released by the Center for Disease Control (CDC), the Oregon Health Authority (OHA), Oregon Department of Education (ODE) and Multnomah County Public Health.

The following information was shared with our students. If your student missed this presentation please see the slide presentation below.

"As you are aware, mask wearing becomes optional in PPS on Monday, March 14th. While we fully know that student opinions around this decision may vary, the level of respect students show one another cannot vary. In order to reinforce this point before Monday, we ask that you review these 6 informational slides with your students.

OHSU COVID-19 SCREENING TESTING

K-12 students can sign up to get free weekly COVID-19, PCR tests through their school during the 2021-2022 school year. The Oregon Health Authority (OHA) has contracted with OHSU to provide these tests to participating K-12 schools in Oregon. Grant High School will be participating in this important program. Parents can Opt their students into this program by completing the attached forms (Opt in form + OHSU Authorization form) and return to the main office at Grant HS.

Please note: This partnership program has multiple steps and processes that may take 2-3 weeks before we can distribute a test kit with labels to the student. After submitting paperwork to the Main Office, students should check in every Monday for status.

Our program rolled out on November 15th and continues on Mondays (when school is in session):

Mondays -

Students pick up test kits from the main office as they leave for the day.

Tuesdays -

Students complete their saliva sample, at home, before they come to school. Then, they bring to school, the labeled saliva sample tube, in the labeled biohazard bag, and drop it off at the main office on their way into school that morning.

Expectation of Communication from OHSU: **OHSU** is committed to sending results to **ALL families within 48 hours.** Positive and inconclusive results will receive a phone call; negative results will generate an email. - Students arriving more than 10 minutes late to a class must sign in at the Attendance Office (outside the main office).
- Students leaving early must sign out in the Attendance Office, and if returning, sign back in at the main office

HAVING YOUR STUDENT CALLED OUT OF CLASS (informs attendance office)

With notice: You can use this <u>form</u> to let our attendance secretary know that you will need your student called out of class.

Without advanced notice: Please call our Main Line at 503-916-5160. Please do not leave a message as it may not be heard in time.

Data is entered as soon as possible. However, we are not always able to process the large volume of data prior to it activating the auto-dialer, so you may receive a call even though you already reported. All data should be processed by the end of the day.

STUDENTS / PARENTS NEED TO KNOW

- Bike riders: All bikes need to be parked and locked in bike rack areas only. The safety team is asking that U locks be used instead of cable locks.
- Student drivers: The school parking lot is for staff and visitors only. If you park your vehicle in the Grant neighborhood please do not block driveways. You risk being towed.
- The School front doors, art building doors, and back sky bridge doors open at 8:00am.
 - The Library opens at 8:00am for students who arrive early to school.
- Students who arrive late to school will need to enter through the front doors, and then through the main office doors to check in at the attendance window in the main hallway.
- Students arriving late to the Art Building need to push the call box to the right of the entrance doors. To gain access they need to present their late pass or student ID card.
- Students leaving early need to check out through the main office, unless they have an open period at the end of the day.

Graduation is just around the corner for our Seniors!

The graduation of our Class of 2022 is rapidly approaching. This is an exciting time for everyone involved, and we want everything to go as smoothly as possible for you and your family. Here are a few important reminders to help ensure you stay on track to graduate, and be able to participate in the commencement ceremony.

- 1. Continue attending all of your classes and do the best you can until the last day of school. Don't let "senioritis" impact your success. Students who have NOT fulfilled <u>ALL</u> of their credits and other graduation requirements will not be able to participate in the graduation ceremony. This is a district policy, which we cannot alter.
- 2. Remember the "60 Day Rule" (beginning April 2nd). Commencement disqualification: Requiring that seniors be disqualified from participation in commencement exercises and related activities if within 60 school days of the last senior school day (June 2, 2022), they are found to be in violation of district Alcohol or Drug policy or any violation resulting in a three or more days of suspension or more serious disciplinary action. (Reference 4.30.020-AD) Be aware that all school pranks resulting in vandalism or disruption of the school day could also be a violation of this rule, and may result in not being allowed to participate in prom and/or graduation.

Cap and Gown Pickup Day: April 15th during lunch

Senior Fees/Fines will be shared beginning: May 9th

To graduate you must clear all charges to your school account; these could be as far back as middle school. The Grant Bookkeeper, Maggie Vera (mvera@pps.net), is with whom you will make your payment.

Library Overdue Books and/or Fines


Signing Day moved to May 19th




4-Star Hunger Project

EAGLE Caddie Program Opportunity for 9th Grade Students!

The <u>EAGLE Caddie Program</u> is available for 9th-grade students attending public or private schools within Portland city limits. Students must have good attendance in school, have achieved a 9th-grade cumulative grade point average (GPA) of at least 3.5, and students' family household income must not exceed \$75,000. Students are paid to caddie for local golfers at PP&R golf courses, no prior golf experience is required. This 3-year program takes place from June to early September, and students that complete the program can apply for the Evans Scholarship, a full tuition and housing scholarship to the University of Oregon. Black, Indigenous, People of Color (BIPOC), female, nonbinary, immigrant, and refugee students are encouraged to apply. <u>Applications</u> are due by May 13th.


