Portland Public Schools is an urban school district in Portland, Oregon. With more than 49,000 students in 81 schools, it is the largest school district in the Pacific Northwest.

The School

U.S. Grant High School is one of seven comprehensive high schools in Portland Public Schools. We serve neighborhood students and many transfer students grades 9-12. The population is diverse ethnically and economically. 14% of our students qualify for free and reduced lunch. Our student body is talented, energetic, and diverse, reflecting the strong extracurricular programs at Grant, including a large and competitive athletic program, a strong Black Student Union that developed school-wide race talks, the Gold-Crown Award-Winning Grant Magazine. the nationally ranked U.S. Constitution Team, Model United Nations, and over 50 school clubs and associations.

PPS Grading Practices in Response to COVID-19

Portland Public Schools, in response to COVID school closures and Oregon Department of Education mandates, moved to distance learning and Passing (P) and Incomplete (INC) grades for all high school coursework beginning March 2020. This grading adjustment is reflected on the spring 2020 portion of student transcripts, as well as any credits earned during the summer of 2020.

Proficiency credit and Passing (P) grades were issued for coursework that met Oregon Department of Education guidelines for proficiency. These credits are noted on students transcripts with proficiency next to the course name (i.e. Eng 4- Proficiency) and a grade of P (Pass).

Students graduating with the class of 2022 are required to meet the Oregon Diploma graduation requirements, as opposed to the standard Portland Public Schools Diploma. Finally, PPS high schools shifted to a 4x4 schedule for the 2020-21 school year with students taking 4 classes per quarter (each class earning .50 credit) and the opportunity to earn up to 8 credits per year.

Grading Calculations (GPA)

The GPA, computed at the end of the sixth semester, includes all subjects in which a student has received a letter grade. The transcript reflects a standard and weighted GPA/Rank. Weighted GPA is calculated by adding one point for each AP course completed. Grant High School reports standard GPA and rank on the secondary school report. If a student repeats a course (R), the GPA on the transcript is reflective of the higher grade earned.
