Kellogg MS Timeline

Early years



 Kellogg opened as a K-8 school in 1913. Peak K-8 enrollment was 856 students in 1960. Major classroom and building additions occurred in 1952, 1980 and 1987.

Middle school era

Kellogg was converted to a middle school in 1980 with 648 grade 6-8 students.
Students came from five nearby K-5 schools: Youngson, part of Atkinson, part of Woodstock and all of Arleta and Creston.



 In 2002 enrollment at Kellogg was 671 students. Mandatory No Child Left Behind transfers started this year and impacted enrollment at many schools in PPS.
Kellogg received Title I funds, and did not meet state achievement standards, so all students were eligible for a guaranteed transfer to different schools that were

- not "in need of improvement". This same year, Youngson Elementary closed due to low enrollment of 177 students. The Youngson K-5 attendance area, which includes the Kellogg site, became part of Bridger Elementary, but continued to feed Kellogg MS and Franklin HS.
- In 2005, the consequences of NCLB were having a major impact. Enrollment had dropped to 482 students, 67% of whom were eligible for free or reduced-price meals.
- 2006: Due to a projected \$56 million budget deficit, the School Board voted on a district-wide plan to consolidate several schools and convert others to K-8s. Kellogg was closed in part due to poor facility conditions and insufficient ADA accessibility. Arleta and Creston began conversion to K-8 schools that year, while the Kellogg portion of the Atkinson neighborhood program moved to Mt. Tabor MS, the Atkinson Spanish Immersion program moved to Hosford MS, and the Kellogg-portion of the Woodstock neighborhood program moved to Hosford MS. In 2007 the remaining 103 Kellogg students moved into a one-year 8th grade Academy at Franklin HS, and Kellogg was closed.

From closure to revitalization

Detween 2008 and 2015, Kellogg was used for storage, district professional development and student testing. In 2015, Kellogg was proposed to re-open as part of a district-wide boundary review process. Most community members from nearby K-8 schools were not in favor of the proposal. In 2016, Kellogg was named along with three other east side middle schools to reopen in the coming years as part of a shift back to K-5s/middle schools across the eastside. Years of closure had taken a toll, and the cost for repair was so high that the decision was made to include Kellogg as a complete rebuild in the 2017 School Modernization bond. The bond passed, and the more than 100,000 square foot project is slated to open in Fall 2021. It will be the first school building in PPS to be constructed specifically for use as a middle school.
