An example follows each description.

Book with One Author

Author's Name. Title of Book. City of Publication: Publisher, Copyright Date.

Adams, Simon. Life in Ancient Rome. Boston: Kingfisher, 2005.

Book with Two Authors

Author's Name and second Author's Name. Title of Book. City of Publication: Publisher, Copyright Date.

Jakobson, Roman, and Linda R. Waugh. The Sound Shape of Language. Bloomington: Indiana University Press, 1979.

Book Article or Chapter with Author

Author's Name. "Title of Article." Title of Book. Editor of Book. City of Publication: Publisher, Copyright Date. Pages.

James, Nancy E. "Two Sides of Paradise." Spectrum of the Fantastic. Ed. Donald Palumbo. Westport, CT: Greenwood, 1988. 219-223.

Encyclopedia or Reference Book with an Author

Author's Name. "Title of Article." Title of Book, Copyright Date.

Akmund, Joseph. "Wizards." The World Book Encyclopedia. 1993.

Encyclopedia or Reference Book without an Author

"Title of Article." Title of Book, Copyright Date.

"Wizards." The World Book Encyclopedia. 1993.

Newspaper or Magazine

Author's Name. "Title of Article." Title of Newspaper/Magazine. Date.

Internet

Author's Name. "Title of Article." Title of Site. Copyright Date. Editor of Site. Date of Access. URL.

Interview

Name of person interviewed. Kind of interview (personal interview, telephone interview, class discussion). Date.

McDougall, Jennifer. Personal interview. May 23, 2005.

Television or Radio Show

"Title of Episode." Title of Program. Title of Series (if anything.) Name of network. Broadcast date.

"Uncertainty Surrounds Next Supreme Court Nomination." Morning Edition. NPR. September 29, 2005.
