
#### **Safety First**

Thank you for your cooperation.

## Counselor's Corner

An important part of helping students effectively solve problems is teaching them selfregulation skills. Self-regulation

is the ability to manage your emotions and behavior in accordance with the demands of the situation. Self-regulation skills can help students calm down, stay focused, adjust to change, and better handle frustration. At Astor, we use The Zones of Regulation (see poster) as a

way to teach self-regulation skills and help students create plans to cope with challenging feelings like anger. For example, it's okay to have a Red Zone feeling, but what can we do to get to the Green Zone? Our goal this year is to start using the language of Zones schoolwide. At this point, all teachers have been introduced to the basic language of Zones during staff development. Additionally, I have started to incorporate Zones language into my classroom lessons and community circles. I will continue to do this throughout the year in all classrooms.


Fridays are School Spirit Days. Show your school spirit by wearing Astor's school colors, red and black, or wearing your Astor gear.
