#### **Planning for Standardized Tests**

Soon students in grades third through eighth will be taking the Oregon state standardized tests. Having a plan may help to boost your students confidence and help him/her to do their best. The following strategies can be used every step of the way:

Before the test encourage your student to try his/her best on the practice test. The results can help him/her know what he/she needs to brush up on.

Being well rested and well fed can keep your student focused and alert. The night before the test, plan a breakfast which includes protein and whole grains. And it goes without saying that a good night's sleep is a must. Also have your student pack a healthy snack like an apple, whole grain crackers, and water.

On the day of the test encourage your student to think carefully about how to approach different types of questions. For a reading passage he/she might skim the questions first in order to know what information to focus on. For multiple-choice math problems he/she might skim the answers first and eliminate the obviously incorrect answers to narrow the possible choices.

SafeOregon was funded by the Oregon Legislature as part of a statewide effort to improve school safety. It provides a secure means for anyone to anonymously report suspicious or imminently unsafe situations, such as threats of violence, fights, drugs and alcohol, weapons, bullying, harass-
