Our core values remain universal and constant. Our community articulated a bold vision for our district and our work is informed by our strategic plan and Theory of Action.





### PPS Strategic Plan Theory of Action:

If... We braid Racial Equity and Social Justice strategies into our instructional core, work with our students, teachers, and content, and build our organizational culture and capacity to create a strong foundation to support every student...

Then... We will reimagine Portland Public Schools to ensure every student, especially our Black and Native American students who experience the greatest barriers, realize the Vision of the Graduate Portrait.

Throughout our fall reopening planning, PPS will center racial equity and social justice and hold three principles as the foundation of our reopening work. These principles remained at the center of our planning and decision making, as their consideration informed all planning throughout this process. All planning will incorporate [RESJ Plan and Framework](#) and utilize the [PPS RESJ Lens](#) as we provide student and family supports.

**B Curriculum Support**  
All schools, with the support of the District Office, provide intentional support for curriculum.

**C Student Success Teams (SSTs) (9th Grade)**  
This is a statewide program and team leads meet as a community to share resources and further the work.

**D Gear Up**  
The goal of the GEAR UP program is to ensure that Oregon's low-income middle school and high school students are prepared for, pursue, and succeed in postsecondary education whether that be a Bachelor's degree, Associates degree, certificate, apprenticeship or other training.

**E Headstart/Pre-School Promise**  
Our PK programs include play-based instruction as well as wrap-around supports including meals, mental health & health support, disability support, family education, and community connections.

Schools provide a variety of family supports and engagement opportunities throughout the summer and 20-21 school year. Many existing supports provided in past years will continue and some new supports and engagement opportunities will be available.

**A Attendance Coaches**  
Attendance Coaches support school and community staff in building relationships with diverse families, as well as conduct intensive interventions for some of our highest needs students and families.

**RJ Restorative Justice (RJ)/ Restorative Practices**  
RJ provides support to schools and families by responding to harm using a restorative process and circle practices, we offer RJ training, and give guidance and assistance.

**School Counselors**  
All PPS schools have counselors. Their focus is on helping students address their academic, personal/social, and career development goals and needs.

**SUN Youth Advocacy**  
Youth case management and supports for their families academic support and skill building activities for children ages 12-18.

### District-Wide: McKinney-Vento Program, Migrant, and Indian Education

Formerly known as Title X, the McKinney-Vento program provides direct support to students experiencing homelessness or unstable housing. Migrant Education Program is for students who have moved frequently due to family work in agriculture, fishing or forestry. Indian Ed Program, this program is open to documented members of American Indian tribes.



### PPS Nutrition Services

PPS Nutrition Services will be offering Grab and Go meals at 36 schools.



### SUN Food Pantry or Food Market

Food pantries or free food markets at SUN Community Schools that provide food to families.



### SUN P-3 Schools

SUN Community Schools have a deep focus on engaging diverse families with young children. P-3 schools offer play and learn groups for 0-5 year olds, parent leadership activities, and support for families.



### Kinder Teacher Family Visits

Home visits during the school year to build partnerships with parents and strengthen kindergarten transitions.



### Transportation Access

PPS, in collaboration with Trimet, provides all high school students with student ID cards that serve as an annual Trimet bus pass.

### Childcare

PPS is beginning a phased rollout to open nine school buildings for two cohorts of partner child care programs with no more than 30 students per school.

## Academic Support Programs: Full details

### **School Based Academic Supports - Specific Plans for Black and Native Students** **Start Time and Duration: Summer, 2020 and 2020-21 School Year** **Department or Partner: Individual Schools supported by central office**

PPS provides many different types of academic supports for students and families to ensure success with online learning and in particular focusing on supporting our Black and Native students and families. Our intent is to build upon our families' existing knowledge and skills around technology to ensure families are prepared to support students with online learning. Continued outreach to families will ensure that we are able to support digital learning work for all our families. We will continue to take a tiered intervention approach to provide more supports to those who need it most. Examples of supports are:

- Teachers and staff meet directly with families when possible to provide support, build trust, and facilitating practice opportunities.
- Families received from schools on an as-needed basis a physical toolkit of resources to launch the 2020-21 school year.
- Integration of the Racial Equity & Social Justice (RESJ) lens and culturally responsive practices into curriculum and instruction.
- SUN Community School partnerships.
- Student and Staff Affinity Groups.
- Grade Level Professional Learning Communities (PLCs), a great opportunity for teachers to learn from each other.
- Academic Interventions and Small Group Instruction.
- Diversifying classroom libraries.
- Mentorship Partnerships, such as NAYA, Ambassadors, Cavaliers, etc.
- Additional community partnerships, such as IRCO, Juntos Aprendemos, Black Parent Initiative, Urban League, Gear Up, Neighborhood House.

### **Curriculum Support**

#### **Start Time and Duration: 2020-21 School Year 2018-19 through 2022-23** **Department or Partner: Multiple Pathways to Graduation, US Department of Education, Education Northwest and others**

All schools, with the support of the District Office, provide intentional support for curriculum through:

- Instructional coaching.
- Intervention specialists.
- Weekly Professional Learning Communities (PLCs).
- Integration of culturally responsive practices into school curriculum.

Additionally, all teachers have office hours to ensure that students and families are able to reach their instructor to get the help they need.

Some schools (Alliance, MLC, Rosemary Anderson HS) are supported by a federal grant to develop project-based learning, career technical education, and social emotional learning to support the engagement of high school age students.

### **Multi-Tiered Systems of Support (MTSS) & Social Emotional Learning (SEL) support for students and families**

#### **Start Time and Duration: 2020-21 School Year** **Department or Partner: MTSS**

The MTSS Department supports students and families through providing professional development and resources to schools, including:

- School Climate
- Engaging Students
- Conducting Virtual Professional Learning Communities.
- Social Emotional Learning Lessons for schools focusing on: making connections, building relationships, creating community and supporting resilience during challenging and traumatic times.

At the school level, MTSS and SEL supports will include: welcome back assemblies and grade level orientations, parent and family committees, counselor, School Psychologist, and Social Worker supports, SEL lessons for students, SEL workshops for families, helpful resources in newsletters, on the schools website, through videos and connections to community partnerships, and Racial Affinity group facilitation.

## Academic Support Programs: Full details

### **Technology and digital resources support**

#### **Start Time and Duration: Districtwide, Fall 2020** **Department or Partner: OTIS**

Centrally we will continue to offer curbside support at BESC for students and families to provide repair and/or exchange services. The call center (503-916-3375) is available from 7:00 AM to 5:00 PM (hours to be extended to 9:00 PM once able to staff) weekdays to provide phone support for devices and digital resources for families with interpretation available.

### **Student Success Teams (9th Grade)**

#### **Start Time and Duration: 2017- ongoing** **Department or Partner: College and Career Readiness Department, TOSA, Center for High School Success/Stand for Children**

This ongoing program provides an opportunity for 9th grade teachers to ensure ninth grade students get or stay on-track to graduate. Teams use data and an antiracist lens with a focus on closing the opportunity gap, and share ideas on effective instructional practices and interventions in order to meet this goal. This is a statewide program and team leads meet as a community to share resources and further the work.

### **Teacher on Special Assignment (TOSA)**

#### **Start Time and Duration: Districtwide, Fall 2020** **Department or Partner: OTIS**

A Teacher on Special Assignment (TOSA) provides support for the implementation of the district's Educational programs in a particular content area. They support the development and teaching strategies in partnership with the educational community and serve as an additional support for a school.

Currently, schools may have a TOSA in one or all of the following three areas: directly tied to carrying out the goals of a funding program, to support Migrant Education, and to support MTSS (tiered systems of support and services).

### **Migrant Education Program**

#### **Start Time and Duration: Ongoing**

For students who have moved frequently due to family work in agriculture, fishing or forestry. The Migrant Education Program (MEP) provides:

- Supplemental tutoring.
  - Family engagement.
  - Student support in multiple languages to identified students and their families.

### **Indian Ed Program**

#### **Start Time and Duration: Ongoing and 2020-21 AY** **Department or Partner: Funded Programs, community partners: Portland Parks and Recreation, METRO, PCC, PSU, PNCA (Pacific NW College of Art), NAYA, NARA**

PPS Indian Education program offers:

- Connection and educational supports.
- Provides cultural education to connect students with their Native history, cultures and traditions, instilling pride and confidence to achieve challenging academic standards.
- Indian Education staff will continue reaching out to families by phone, email and through surveys to assess their academic and social needs and support existing relationships.
- Virtual workshops for students of all ages, and visit virtual classrooms when appropriate.
- This year we will continue our bridge program for 8th grade students as well as a social, academic and cultural group for 9th grade students.
- Cherokee classes for preschool students.
- Fun project for elementary students.
- Referrals for students who need tutors.
- This program will continue to work with community partners (this year PNCA and the Jewish Holocaust Museum and Constructing Hope are new) to provide exciting opportunities for our high school students.
- Helping with professional development training and share best practices for implementing Tribal History/Shared History.

This program is open to documented members of American Indian tribes.

## Academic Support Programs: Full details

### Gear Up

Oregon GEAR UP (Gaining Early Awareness and Readiness for Undergraduate Programs) - is supported by a grant from the U.S. Department of Education and the contributions of many community partners.

The goal of the GEAR UP program is to ensure that Oregon's low-income middle school and high school students are prepared for, pursue, and succeed in postsecondary education whether that be a Bachelor's degree, Associates degree, certificate, apprenticeship or other training.

Our GEAR UP program currently supports 12 cohorts of students within the Jefferson, Madison and Roosevelt clusters.

### Head Start / Pre-School Promise

This fall, PPS will offer all virtual pre-kindergarten (PK) programs to qualifying 3 and 4 year old students at 12 different school sites.

Eligibility for these programs is primarily based on income.

Our PK programs include play-based instruction as well as wrap-around supports including meals, mental health & health support, disability support, family education, and community connections.

### The Fund for Portland Public Schools

The Fund for PPS is working with the local business and philanthropic community to support direct relief efforts (groceries, internet connectivity, etc.), and academic supports (tutoring supports) for PPS students and families in the fall.

The Fund is also engaging corporate partners to fund Home Classroom Kits on behalf of PPS students.

The Fund for Portland Public Schools in collaboration with PPS teams will launch an HBCU Virtual Residency program that offers cohorts of students access to tutoring from rising educators.

### Home Classroom Kits

PPS is working to be able to provide all students who qualify for free and reduced lunch with a Home Classroom Kit to ensure that all students have the tools they need to succeed in this learning environment.

### RESJ Strategy 4: Extended Learning and Enrichment

**Department or Partner: Chess for Success, Urban League, Licensed Child Care partners**

Programming provides safe, structured and engaging activities to enhance and expand the learning of students outside of school hours. This includes after school programming and enrichment activities. Enrichment activities provide opportunities for students to pursue learning in their own areas of interest and strengths. Research has shown that students engaged in these activities can lead to increased academic performance and attendance. ### School Based Family Support and Engagement

**Start Time and Duration: Summer, 2020 and 2020-21 School Year**  
**Department or Partner: Individual Schools supported by central office**

Schools provide a variety of family supports and engagement opportunities throughout the summer and 20-21 school year. Many existing supports provided in past years will continue and some new supports and engagement opportunities will be available. Schools are also connecting families to resources including food, gift cards, mental health, rent assistance, etc. Examples of supports include:

### Attendance Coaches

**Department or Partner: MTSS**

PPS recognizes the importance of attendance and its direct connection to student achievement. We are building a systematic approach to reduce chronic and severe absenteeism through both universal and preventative programs.

Attendance Coaches support school and community staff in building relationships with diverse families, as well as conduct intensive interventions for some of our highest needs students and families.

### Restorative Justice (RJ)/Restorative Practices

**Department or Partner: Multi-Tiered Systems of Support (MTSS), Social Emotional, Learning (SEL), Rapid Response Team (RRT), Teachers On Special Assignment (MTSS)**

Restorative Justice (RJ) practices are designed to support repairing relationships to form healthy, supportive, reflective, and inclusive communities.

RJ provides support to schools and families by responding to harm using a restorative process and circle practices, we offer RJ training, and give guidance and assistance.

Restorative Justice supports are available at all PPS schools and programs.

### School Counselors

All PPS schools have counselors. Their focus is on helping students address their academic, personal/social, and career development goals and needs.

School counselors work to promote safe learning environments for all members of the school community and regularly monitor and respond to behavior issues that impact school climate, such as bullying, student interpersonal struggles, and student-teacher conflicts. Effective school counseling programs are a collaborative effort between the school counselor, teachers, families, and other educators to create an environment promoting student achievement, active engagement, equitable access to educational opportunities, and a rigorous curriculum for all students.

### Social Workers / Qualified Mental Health Providers

Many of our schools have social workers and/or other QMHPs (Qualified Mental Health Providers), who work alongside families and students to decrease barriers to learning and increase student/family voice.

Social workers work closely with students, teachers, administrators, other educators,

Social workers can support community systems navigation, resource sharing, one on one connections with students and families, and developing support services within the school based on student/family/staff identified interests.

Youth case management and supports for their families academic support and skill building activities for children ages 12-18.

### McKinney-Vento program

**Duration:** 2020-21 School Year

Formerly known as Title X, the McKinney-Vento program provides direct support to students experiencing homelessness or unstable housing. Schools can refer students using the online McKinney-Vento referral [here](#). Students and families can self-refer by calling their school liaison listed on this [McKinney-Vento flyer](#) or by calling (503) 916-5770. Students need to confirm eligibility annually.

### Child Care

**Department or Partner:** Early Learner Programs

PPS is beginning a phased rollout to open nine school buildings for two cohorts of partner child care programs with no more than 30 students per school. PPS is supporting staff of childcare partners to enable them to support students during distance learning. These programs will be operated independently by licensed childcare organizations. Providers operate under strict licensing guidelines per the childcare standard operating procedures. Fifty percent of these slots will be reserved for families who qualify for state subsidized care. Because slots are limited and will fill up quickly, we ask that families reach out to 211 information for additional childcare referrals and subsidy information. In support of helping families access childcare, we are working with a Childcare Resource and Referral to offer multiple informational sessions for SUN agencies, P-3 coordinators and community agents to support families in accessing a complex web of child care options.

### PPS Nutrition Services

PPS Nutrition Services will be offering Grab and Go meals at 36 schools. For everyone's health, this meal distribution will happen outside of the buildings, walk up or drive through starting September 2nd. Lane and Ockley Green Middle Schools will be added to the list of schools offering grab and go meals mid-September (pending construction completion). Each site will serve 3:00-5:00 pm on Mondays and Wednesdays, offering both breakfast and lunch for every scheduled school day. Meals are free of charge for all students who attend the 38 meal distribution schools, or attend one of the Community Eligibility Provision (CEP) sites for 2020-21, and for those who qualify individually for free and reduced price meals. New this year- Oregon has expanded the income guidelines for eligibility for free meals from 185% of federal poverty level to 300%; families are encouraged to visit the [Nutrition Services](#) website for more information and apply if they are eligible. Home Meal Delivery via Transportation Department - A sign up form will be shared soon in all our supported languages offering home meal deliveries for families not able to access one of our 38 grab and go locations. Delivery schedules will vary depending on the number of requests.

### SUN Food Pantry or Food Market

**Department or Partner:** Mult Co via, Oregon Food Bank, IRCO, Latino Network, Impact NW, Portland Parks & Rec, Self Enhancement Inc.

Food pantries or free food markets at SUN Community Schools that provide food to families.

### SUN P-3 Schools

SUN Community Schools have a deep focus on engaging diverse families with young children. P-3 schools offer play and learn groups for 0-5 year olds, parent leadership activities, and support for families.

### Parent Teacher Family Visits

**Department or Partner:** Technical support provided by Mult. Co.

Home visits during the school year to build partnerships with parents and strengthen kindergarten transitions. During this pandemic these are virtual home visits, video chats or phone calls.
