Resources during the strike

The Portland Public School District and the union representing District educators, Portland Association of Teachers (PAT), are negotiating the union contract. The district has been preparing for a potential strike by the union, in the event that an agreement can not be reached. If there is a strike, teachers will not be available to provide classroom or virtual instruction and the District will have no choice but to close schools to students until the strike ends.

If a deal is not reached, the strike is scheduled to start tomorrow, November 1st. In the event of a strike, the school will be closed and students should not be dropped off at the school. The district has posted resources online in case of a strike.

Strike Resources

Meals for during a strike: PPS will provide grab and go meals at more than half of our school locations* for free for all kids, ages 1-18 and all current PPS students. If a strike occurs, meals will be available for pick up on Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Thursdays, between 11:30 am - 1:00 pm, beginning on Wednesday, November 1.

Chief Joseph Elementary School is a school meal pick up location. Check the <u>map</u> for other site's you can pick up meals from. You are not limited to picking up meals at your home school, if another location is closer for your family.

- Communicate changes with their teacher
- Let the front office know when:
 - It is a change for the same day, and the teacher might not get a message in time
 - It is a long term, and regular change
 - If it will change their bus riding schedule

We work to try and make the end of day release go as smoothly as possible so knowing plans ahead of time is extremely helpful!

BIZ town Field Trip for 5th Grade!

Our 5th graders had an amazing opportunity to participate in JA BizTown last week. In Biz town, students are able to interact within a simulated economy and take on the challenge of managing organizations. Students not only discovered the intricacies of jobs and being members of the community, but also discovered the abundance of opportunities available within their cities. See a few highlights from the field trip below:



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Student Health Needs

Children can receive the 2023-2024 COVID-19 and flu vaccines ahead of the respiratory virus season, but where they get vaccinated may depend on which health care coverage they have.

- Student Health Centers offer both COVID-19 and flu vaccines for students in grades K-12 at no cost. Call your nearest <u>Multnomah County Student Health Center</u> or OHSU's <u>Benson Wellness Center</u> for an appointment.
- 2023-2024 COVID-19 vaccines are fully covered by all <u>Marketplace</u> plans and most other private insurance plans at no cost to the patient anywhere the vaccine is offered. It's best to go to an *in-network* provider or pharmacy*, but if you can't find one, call your insurer *in advance* to arrange full coverage at an out-of-network location.
- Flu vaccines are fully covered by all <u>Marketplace</u> plans and most other private insurance plans at *in-network* providers and pharmacies*. Call your insurer in advance to confirm.
- Children age 18 and under who are enrolled in OHP/Medicaid, or those who are uninsured, underinsured or American Indian/Alaska Native, can receive the 2023-2024 COVID-19 and flu vaccines at no cost from providers that participate in the federal Vaccines for Children (VFC) program. VFC providers can include private doctors and clinics, schools, hospitals, public health clinics, retail pharmacies, community health clinics and Tribal health departments. Search for VFC providers or pharmacies here.
- Eligible children (and adults) in Oregon can also receive vaccines at no cost through OHA's Vaccine Access Program (VAP). Search for VAP providers or pharmacies here.
- Flu and COVID-19 vaccines are fully covered for those 18 and under who are enrolled in OHP/Medicaid anywhere those vaccines are offered that also accepts OHP, which includes most retail pharmacies.

* Oregon pharmacies can administer COVID-19 and flu vaccines (but <u>not</u> other routine childhood vaccines) to children as young as 3 through Dec. 2024. After that, the minimum age for children to receive any vaccines at a pharmacy returns to 7 years old.

Oregon Health Plan Open Enrollment:

The deadline to enroll your Family for 2024 Health Coverage by January 15, 2024

Individuals and families will have the opportunity to enroll in, renew, or change their health insurance plan for 2024 during the upcoming Marketplace health insurance **open enrollment** period, which is **Nov. 1, 2023 through Jan. 15, 2024**. Open enrollment is the only time when anyone who is not offered coverage from a job or a public program like the Oregon Health Plan or Medicare can enroll in health coverage through <u>OregonHealthCare.gov</u>, often with financial help.

Health insurance covers essential health benefits critical to maintaining individual health and treating illness and accidents. Health insurance helps to reduce medical and prescription drug costs, making health care more affordable and thus more accessible.

Health coverage also is important for students because:

- Having health insurance is linked to better health (study <u>here</u>).
- Health insurance coverage helps boost test scores among children from low-income households (study <u>here</u>).
- Expanded health insurance coverage has led to historic reductions in racial disparities in access to health care (study <u>here</u>).

Trained community groups, Tribal health organizations and insurance agents are available to help Oregonians enroll in coverage through the Marketplace during open enrollment. There is no cost for their services. Many of them offer services in multiple languages. These "Enrollment Assisters" also can help people transition to private health coverage if they have experienced a qualifying life event. This includes people who are losing Oregon Health Plan benefits as the state works to renew each of its current members. The challenge would be for each class to bring in pennies or change and the class that brings in the most pennies will get to use a portion of the money raised (from all the classes) to pick out and purchase books that they want for their classroom library; the remaining of the money will be used to support the Backpack Program in getting books to students who may not be able to shop the Book Fair.

TAG NEWS:

October TAG News

The window for data driven referrals begins October 17, 2023. As a parent, you don't need to do anything yet.

What will happen during the data-driven referral process is:

- Based on OSAS and NNAT scores, the top 10% of students in the district will be referred for TAG identification.
- Parents will receive a postcard telling them to complete the online referral if they want their child to be considered for TAG identification.
- Teachers will receive a notification of students who are referred
- Final decisions must be completed by January 12, 2024

NNAT Testing for Intellectual Giftedness for 2nd graders this month

The second graders will take the NNAT test intellectual giftedness. If your child qualifies for this identification, you will be notified by the TAG department directly

Students who don't qualify during the data driven process, can begin referring their child starting in December. There will need to be supporting work samples and assessments to evidence the need for identification, so it would be best to discuss this with your child's teacher during conferences. TAG identification is used to differentiate instruction based on academic need or performance and not a program per se. If you have any other questions about how your child's rate and level are being met, the teacher is your first resource. This is the work of the Playground Committee, and the first step in our goal this school year to dial up the vitality and functionality of the "4 Trees" areas. A gigantic thanks goes out to HABITAT (@cultivateyourhabitat) for the most generous donation of plants, soil amendment and overall botanical expertise!!

Now that we've accomplished this initial round of planting and soil amendment (more of that will happen throughout the year as needed and seasonally appropriate), we'll be turning our attention towards finalizing the design of permanent structures to surround the wells (trellis fencing, benches and educational signage) and securing the funding to make those happen.
