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Reading List for Parents Raising Teens Who Respect Girls/Women

This guide, compiled by PPS's Title IX Office, includes resources, activities, and recommendations to help parents who are struggling with how to address their teen or pre-teen's sexting, exchanging nudes, dating, and generally, how to respect boundaries and/or body autonomy. The guide includes resources and education aimed at helping parents understand the vast difference between their experience as teens and what today's teens are struggling with, and may not feel comfortable asking their parents (or other trusted adult) for help.

Helping Boys Stand Firm in Respecting Girls	What if your son's friends started comparing notes on female schoolmates, ranking the girls according to their attractiveness? How would your son respond? What if the discussion were darker? What if peers were urging your son to join in a contest to harass one of the girls in their year, hoping to be the first to convince her to send a nude selfie?
Your Teen is Sexting	Consensual teen sexting is on the rise. A shame-free talk about safe sexting can protect your teen from legal and reputational harm.

Sextortion Prevention & Response (Thorn)	Sextortion is when someone blackmails/threatens to expose a sexual image in order to make a person do something they don't want to do, like send more photos or send money.
