Course Overview: This class is designed for achieving success in reading and writing. We will practice the essential skills of reading, writing, and critically thinking through a variety of literary mediums (novel, short story, non-fiction, poetry, etc). Students will engage in many different writing styles, including: narrative, expository, analytical, persuasive, and more. We will read different texts from a variety of genres and authors, to help broaden our sense of the world around us, and discuss relevant/current themes in our lives. Students will engage in class activities aimed at helping them improve their critical thinking skills, whether working by themselves or with a small team.

Students will come to class each day with necessary materials, which include: pen/pencil, spiral and class book. Students will also need to have a current Multnomah County Library card with access to website for research.

Grading: Each skill will be graded on a 0-4 scoring rubric to indicate the level of proficiency that the student has demonstrated.

0=insufficient/no evidence of the skill

1=some evidence/does not meet in all categories 2=proficient/meets standard

3=approaching mastery 4=mastery of skill

All graded assessments will be given a score between 0-4. This will be translated to a grade percentage equivalent in Synergy.

4= 100% 2.5=79% 1=60%

3.5=93% 2=72%

3=86% 1.5=66%
