#### RICHMOND RUN リッチモンド ラン

A huge thank you to the PTA and all of the volunteers that supported this year's Richmond Run. Also, a big thank you to Deb Madore for working with the volunteers in making the preparations and leading all the runners. There were 611 students who ran that day involving a total of 12,028 laps or 1503.50 miles. The total amount pledged for enrichment and staffing was \$50,986.17.

The funds raised from last year's Run paid for four enrichment assemblies this year including: *Exploring the Great Barrier Reef*, *The Signature Project*, *The Sonnet Man*, and *Northwest Tales*. The funds also paid for eight tablets in each K-2 classroom as well as art and science enrichment at each grade level including learning African dance, Mad Science in the classroom, trip to the Oregon Zoo, and a trip to Fort Vancouver.


The Richmond Community is consistently an inspiring example of what is possible when people come together to achieve a common goal- providing the best educational experience possible for our students. Thank you all!

#### PPS BOND MEASURE PPSの施策

After an extensive community feedback process, PPS has proposed a \$790 million capital construction bond on the May 16 ballot to fund renovations and additions at Benson and Madison High Schools, and full rebuilds of Lincoln High School and Kellogg Middle School. Approximately 30% of the budgets for these projects comprehensively address health and safety issues, including lead and asbestos abatement, roof repairs, seismic upgrades, and accessibility improvements in accordance with the Americans with Disabilities Act. If approved, the proposed May bond would also fund planning for upgrade of Cleveland, Jefferson, and Wilson High Schools.

Additionally, if the bond passes, at least \$150 million would fund district-wide health and safety projects, including:

- Replacing old pipes and fixtures to reduce lead, improve water quality, and reduce the need to use bottled water;
- Removing or encapsulating exposed lead paint and asbestos;
- Upgrading fire alarm and/or sprinkler systems;
- Repairing or replacing leaking or deteriorating school roofs;
- Improving accessibility for people with disabilities;
- · Improving building foundations and ventilation to decrease radon exposure; and
- Strengthening school safety and security.

The average levy rate for the proposed bond is estimated to be \$0.68 per \$1,000 of assessed value over 30 years. The levy rate is estimated to be \$1.40 per \$1,000 for the first four years, declining thereafter.

If the proposed bond doesn't pass, PPS will continue to respond to health and safety emergencies and take steps to make sure schools remain safe. But, PPS currently does not have funding available to embark on significant long-term mitigation of these hazards.

Ballots went out to registered voters in late April and are due on May 16.

#### SPRING COUNSELOR'S CORNER カウンセラ―からのお知らせ

In April students were learning about a very popular topic in Counseling Class- Growth Mindset. Based on research by Carol Dweck, growth mindset is the idea that intelligence is not set or fixed; that time, effort, and perseverance through challenges, and making mistakes leads to learning new skills and success. This is such an important concept, and can really impact your child's future learning and self-esteem.
