Dear Richmond Families,

Thank you very much for your wonderful staff appreciation activities this week!
The flowers, banners, cards, letters, special meals and helpful hands (i.e. classroom cleaning) have been tremendous displays of support for our work at Richmond. We are all very fortunate to be able to educate children at Richmond.

Another thank you goes to all the children and parents who have been so supportive of Lucky the cat's presence in our school office since March 9th. As you know, Lucky was found by a group of Richmond students on our playground. He was starving, severely dehydrated and absolutely alone. The children brought him to our office and together we brought him back to full health and happiness.

Many children, parents and staff were hopeful that Lucky could become our school cat, much like the kitty at Llewellyn Elementary School in southeast Portland. Unfortunately, a parent has strongly objected to Lucky's presence at Richmond due to the fact this parent's child has an allergy to cats. This allergy had not been shared with our office via school medical forms, so our nurse had no idea about the allergy and potential complications before we introduced Lucky in last week's newsletter.

This situation illustrates the need for parents to keep their child's medical information up-to-date at school. Richmond is located in a community with an abundance of animals and it's not uncommon to find cats, dogs, and even a bunny or two, wandering on our playground. GREAT NEWS ON TRANSFER NUMBERS

As of Wednesday evening, our list of transfer numbers is VERY encouraging for classes in the 2006-07 school year. 48 hours remain before the transfer deadline as this newsletter goes to print. According to our district transfer office, our transfer numbers are likely to grow by 5-10% in the next 48 hours. So far we have:

Grades 1-5 = 13 requests

Kindergarten = 86 requests

Pre-school (full-day) = 20 requests Pre-school (half-day) = 17 requests


Our kindergarten numbers are 115% of our target for 75 students in three classes. We need 2 more students for the minimum of 88 students for <u>four</u> kindergarten classes of 22 each. 14 more gives us 100 kindergarteners in four classes of 25 each.

It all seems to be going well when suddenly, the supernaturalists find out a horrifying secret that forces them to question everything they believe in.

I liked this book especially because of the way that the supernaturalists work together as a team, even when things aren't looking good. I also like the book because of it's futuristic setting of 50 mile-high buildings and it's funny characters. I recommend this book for children 10 and up because some of it is a little confusing. 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MUSIC IMPROVISATION CLASS OFFERED AFTER SCHOOL

KIDS JAM! Music Improvisation Class at Richmond Elementary (Music Room) with Michael "Shoehorn" Conley

Tuesday afternoons 3:05-4:05 PM Begins Tues. April 4th ALL AGES

Fee: \$30 for 4 weeks, renewing monthly

Children will use instruments from the Richmond music room, which are mostly percussion (including xylophones) and recorders plus piano. Voice and rhythm dance concepts will also be incorporated as time allows. Students who have their own instruments are encouraged to bring them and participate. The instructor will also play his own instruments with the class.

We will rotate instruments and parts to cultivate a comprehensive and FUN approach to music making. Students will be taught some basics such as simple chords and

scales, and we will create our own music out of the improvised beats, with the goal of composing a song with Rhythm, Melody, and Harmony (chords) and Lyrics.

Class size is limited to 20 students. A Wednesday class may be added if needed.

Two other books with haiku about cats are available:


