IMPORTANT NEWS FROM OUR PTA

There have been a couple cases of Chicken Pox at Richmond Elementary School in the last week. Is this unusual? No. Should anyone be concerned? No, not unless your immune system is compromised, such as during chemotherapy.



Recent studies of outbreaks indicate that the vaccine is 85% effective in preventing a mild case of Chicken Pox (Less than 50 lesions) and 98% effective in preventing a severe case of Chicken Pox. Considering Richmond's population of ~300 students, it would not be unusual to have 45 students show signs of Chicken Pox.

The studies of outbreaks among vaccinated children state that the first case was often not identified because it was so mild that there was no indication of disease. Subsequent cases may show up with only 2+ lesions, no fever, and no other identifiable signs of illness. Chicken Pox is contagious before any spots show up, therefore, it is very difficult to prevent the spread to others.

What should we do? Watch children and adults for skin rash identified by a reddened raised spot typically found on face, neck, chest, or back first. The lesion may be mistaken for a pimple. The spot may develop into a blister and crust before disappearing. Once a lesion has been found, that student should stay home until all lesions have appeared and crusted.

All medical conditions are to be kept confidential. No student should be singled out for having chicken pox. Frequently Asked Questions from the Center for Disease Control appear below (in brief) and are available at this link: http://www.cdc.gov/nip/vaccine/varicella/default.htm

Is the vaccine effective in preventing chickenpox all the time?

No vaccine is 100% effective in preventing disease. For chickenpox vaccine, about 8 to 9 out of every 10 people who are vaccinated are completely protected from chickenpox. The vaccine almost always prevents against severe disease. If a vaccinated person does get chickenpox, it is usually a very mild case with fewer skin lesions (usually less than 50) lasting only a few days, no fever or a low fever, and few other symptoms.

There have been lots of cases of chickenpox at my child's school over the past month. Is it too late to have my child vaccinated?

No, it is not too late to vaccinate your child if she/he has not previously had chickenpox or the vaccine. In schools and child care centers, it may take many months for chickenpox to spread to every classroom. At any stage of an outbreak, all susceptible children and adults should be vaccinated.

How long does the vaccine protect someone against chickenpox? Will a booster vaccination be needed?

The length of protection/immunity from any new vaccine is never known when it is first introduced. However, available information collected from persons vaccinated in Japan in the United States show that protection has lasted for as long as the vaccinated persons have been followed (25 years in Japan and more than 10 years in the U.S.). Follow up studies to determine how long protection will last and to evaluate the need and timing for booster vaccination, are ongoing. If it is determined in the future that a booster dose is necessary, your health care provider will inform you. Currently, no booster dose is recommended.

Have cases of chickenpox declined in the United States since chickenpox vaccine became available?

Yes, cases have declined dramatically. Since 1995, CDC, in collaboration with Los Angeles County, Texas and Philadelphia health departments, has been monitoring chickenpox cases in these 3 areas in the United States. As use of the vaccine has increased, chickenpox cases have declined substantially.

ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE - ACHIEVABLE GOALS

Writing (targets set by District):

- Increase the percentage of students who meet/exceed writing standards to 71.4%.
- Reduce the percentage of students scoring low/very low on writing standards by 10% for a total of 14.5% or less.
- Increase the percentage of students who exceed the writing standards by 10% for a total of 6.5% or more.

Reading:

 A minimum of 98% of Richmond 3rd, 4th and 5th graders will meet or exceed the Oregon reading/ language arts standards.

Mathematics:

• A minimum of 98% of Richmond 3^{rd} , 4^{th} and 5^{th} graders will meet or exceed the Oregon math standards.

Japanese:

 A minimum of 98% of Richmond students (grades K-5) will meet each of the Japanese language benchmarks for listening, speaking, writing, and reading.

Art:

100% of Richmond students will meet or exceed grade level expectations for their participation in all
aspects of art (music, visual, drama, and dance) including experiences that reflect culture and art from
Japan and other countries.

Assessment to Inform Instruction:

• Divide required assessments between English and Japanese teachers to share results about student progress and equally distribute assessment workload.

SCHOOL LEADERSHIP

DRAFT Strategic Plan Objectives

Establish team leaders for Primary and Intermediate teachers to lead monthly team meetings. Use extended responsibility pay to compensate team leaders for time (classroom teachers and principal).

Change committee focus and structure to support goals and objectives of the strategic plan. Details per staff discussion and consensus (classroom teachers, support staff and principal).

Prioritize at least 50% of professional development days for English and Japanese language teams to work on the following projects (classroom teachers and principal):

- Revise Japanese curriculum to include pre-school strand
- Refine and coordinate work in the cultural section to the plan for Richmond's cultural center
- Writing framework for pre-school to grade 5 across both languages

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ACADEMIC ENRICHMENT

Create a comprehensive menu of art, culture and athletic experiences offered pre-school to grade 5 <u>within</u> the school day (Japanese Resource Teachers to complete before June 2006).

Create a comprehensive menu of art, culture and athletic classes offered at Richmond during the <u>summer and before or after school</u>. Design a booklet with description, schedule and cost for each activity. Establish one registration form and payment system for classes (Japanese Resource Teachers to complete before June 2006).

Coordinate and support practicum students (principal and classroom teachers).

Revise format and day for monthly morning assemblies (principal, classroom teachers, PE teacher, Library aide).

Prepare a design plan for a Japanese Cultural Center & Garden at Richmond. Design plan includes physical space, program plans, fundraising strategies and partnerships necessary to implement (parent leaders and principal).

PARTNERSHIPS & PARENT INVOLVEMENT

Facilitate volunteer recruitment, leadership, and scheduling (PTA).

Provide volunteer training to support writing instruction (PPS literacy specialist, classroom teachers, principal).

Complete new parent handbook (principal).

Develop a PreK-5 curriculum map for all subjects (principal).

Continue parent curriculum night in Fall (classroom teachers).

DRAFT Strategic Plan Objectives

Expand partnerships with groups in Portland's Japanese community (principal, Site Council, parent groups).

Collaborate with school-based partners (e.g. Foundation, Oya No Kai, PTA) on school-wide initiatives (principal and Site Council).

Coordinate host family recruitment for interns (Oya No Kai).

SCHOOL BEAUTIFICATION

Improve cleanliness via increased diligence with custodial service and daily classroom cleaning by students (all).

Paint hallways and classrooms (parent volunteers and principal).

Expand classroom displays of student artwork on a monthly basis (classroom teachers).

Improve school grounds with permanent artwork, a Japanese garden and landscaping (Cultural Committee).

Replace playground structure (PTA playground committee).

MARKETING & RECRUITMENT

Pursue formal school name change with PPS Board of Education to better reflect the school-wide immersion program (Site Council and principal).

Revise packets for prospective parents (parent, teacher and community volunteers).

Revise packets for community & business partners (parent, teacher and community volunteers).

Continue refinement of new website (Jean M. and principal).

Provide Japanese fluency assessment to determine eligibility of students wishing to enter program in grades 1-5 (Japanese teachers).

Maintain training and coordination of docents for Wednesday tours. Conduct tours once per month October to December and weekly January to March or until transfer deadline closes (Oya No Kai).

Continue participation in community festivals, fairs, and school expos (e.g. Oban, Japan Festival, Mochitsuki, etc.) with professional displays of school artifacts (principal, parent volunteers, high school JMP for community service credit).

Solicit articles about Richmond for professional education journals and local news media (principal and Site Council).



TRANSFER WINDOW OPEN AGAIN MAY 12-22

Portland Public Schools will re-open the transfer process on May 12th through May 22nd to allow families a second chance to transfer to the school of their choice. Here's the timeline:

- May 8th Letter of notification mailed to all parents of elementary and middle school students
- May 12th Online and paper applications available
- May 16th Richmond mandatory meeting at 7-8:30 PM
- May 22nd Application deadline
- May 23rd Richmond mandatory meeting at 7-8:30 PM
- June 9th Lottery results mailed to families

June 15th Deadline for families to withdraw from approved transfer

Families who applied for a transfer by the original March 24th deadline should not submit another application if their school choices have not changed.
