
Take the Budget Quiz!

strategic plan and our instructional program at Richmond.

We Need Written Notice for Changes to After School Plans

Please send a handwritten note to school with your child when your child's after school arrangements deviate from the normal routine. A handwritten note from you helps us ensure the safety of your child in many ways:

- Children and adults forget changes to the normal routine when we get busy or distracted. A note in our hand helps all of us remember the revised routine.
- We do not always have time or access to email before

or during the school day, so an electronic note may not reach us before it's time to go home.

- School bus drivers have been trained to only accept a handwritten note from a parent before allowing a child to ride the bus home with another student.
- A written note helps other school employees or classroom volunteers who may not know your child well (e.g. substitute teacher, intern, etc.) support your revised plan.
