Parking Lot Drop-Off/Pick-Up Concerns

Drivers: We know you're in a hurry, but please, please follow our guidelines for morning drop-off and afternoon pick-up of your children in the school's parking lot. The safety of your children is at risk because a few drivers are ignoring some basic expectations. Please:

• Help your child exit/enter the car quickly on the right side of the car to avoid exiting into the path of a passing car. Avoid side-by-side drop-offs and pick-ups in the car so kids do not have to walk in front of automobiles.

- Keep good-byes brief! Park your car if you need to continue a conversation with your child.
- Do not stop your car in the center of the parking lot to talk on your cell phone or to folks walking through the parking lot. Thanks!

Buy Coffee to Support Richmond's Elm Trees

Richmond School is lucky to have 18 mature Elm trees on the school grounds. Richmond's *Save Our Elms* affiliate, a non-profit 501(c) 3 group, raises money to inoculate the trees against Dutch Elm Disease (DED) by selling coffee. Richmond's *Save Our Elms* has also paid some of the cost to prune trees to keep them healthy.

DED is a fungus that kills the trees, once infected, within 2-3 weeks. An infected tree can quickly infect adjacent trees. The fungus is spread by a beetle attracted to dead wood. Good tree pruning and regular inoculation prevent the spread of DED which has ravaged Elm trees in communities throughout the United States. According to the City of Portland Urban Forestry Department, Portland has about 3,000 Elm trees and approximately 35-55 confirmed cases of DED each year. About half of the Elm trees in the Richmond Neighborhood are at Richmond School. Save Our Elms - Richmond Affiliate has \$390 in the bank right now; it costs about \$150 to inoculate each tree using volunteers.

Please consider purchasing coffee offered through Portland Roasting. The cost is \$10/lb. with 50% going to Save *Our Elms*. This year, we will offer three kinds of coffee:

- Santa Leticia is a medium-dark roasted, Farm-Friendly Direct[™] coffee. For every bag of coffee sold, Portland Roasting plants a fruit-bearing shade tree.
- French Organic is dark-roasted, certified organic coffee.
- Swiss Water Process (SWP) Cascadia Decaf is medium-roasted, certified organic, fair trade, shade grown coffee.

Foundation Funds to Support Richmond

The following two questions came from parent surveys turned in at Back-to-School Night. Answers follow.

How can Richmond retain donations to our foundation to support staff positions? Richmond keeps 100% of the first \$5,000 donated to our Foundation each school year. Richmond keeps 67 cents from every dollar raised for our foundation above and beyond the \$5,000 mark. The remaining 33 cents from every dollar donated to Richmond remains with the Portland Schools Foundation (not part of the district of Portland Public Schools). This reserve amount funds a variety of grants to schools across the district. Several teachers and our principal are currently working on two grant proposals for Richmond to support strategic planning and the cultural center. These grants are due in mid-October for funding prior to the end of 2005. Keep your fingers crossed that we're successful!

Do parents have the choice of participating in fundraisers or making a donation straight to the Foundation instead? Parents, grandparents, friends, relatives <u>always</u> have the ability to make a donation to Richmond's Foundation. You can place your donation in the Foundations mailbox in the main office. All donations are tax deductible.

Scrip Update

- Please give your orders to Patsy in the Richmond office or to the Scrip Volunteer in the Cafeteria on Order Tuesday mornings. Orders MUST be turned in by 8:45 am. We cannot guarantee that late orders will be filled. You may still email orders to onkscrip@comcast.net by Monday 8 pm before an order day.
- 3. If you indicate you will pick up your order at Richmond but are unable to, contact Leslie Kowash (503-235-5513) to arrange a pickup time.
- 4. Check your order as soon as you receive it. We are careful when we fill orders, but we do make mistakes.
- 5. We are eligible for Safeway eScrip by the end of September. You can register your Safeway Club Card at eScrip.com, and select Oya No Kai as your organization. Up to 4% of your Safeway purchases will go to Oya No Kai. You can also sign up friends, family, neighbors anyone who shops at Safeway in any state.

School Expansion in 2006-07

Parents attending the Back-to-School Night presentation by Interim Principal, Kathryn Anderson, heard that Richmond needs to expand the number of classrooms in order to remain a viable magnet program. Many of you have wondered how we can expand the school if our enrollment is limited by the district transfer lottery. Here's how expansion could work:

Schools set the number of student slots for transfer applicants in the winter of each school year. A district report on expansion of immersion programs, recommended increasing the number of kindergarten slots at Richmond by two more classes. We make our final decision about the number of transfer slots in December after serious discussion with staff and our Stie Council. If we decide to increase the number of kindergarten slots, our class limit will increase from 55 kindergarten students in the 2005-06 school year (equivalent of two classrooms) to 110 kindergarten slots, or four classrooms for 2006-07.

Increasing the number of kindergarten spaces allows us to do three things:

- 1). Reduce the likelihood of the lottery if the number of applicants does not exceed the number of slots;
- 2). Virtually guarantee all siblings gain admittance to Richmond, even though they will continue to receive transfer priority; and
- 3). Increase the diversity of our school population.
