Dear Richmond Families,

As I type this letter there are just two hours remaining in the annual enrollment and transfer cycle for Portland Public Schools. The number of transfer applications for Richmond has exceeded our expectations and gives us the opportunity to expand Japanese immersion education to far more students and families in 2007-08. Here's a snapshot of our anticipated class enrollments for the coming school year:

- 70 students in 3 pre-school classrooms with 23-25 students each
- 88-94 kindergarten students in 4 classrooms with 22-24 students each
- 93 first graders in 3 classrooms with 31 students each **OR** 4 classrooms with 23-24 students each **(see note below)**
- 56 second graders in 2 classrooms with 28 students each
- 57 third graders in 2 classrooms with 28-29 students each
- 45 fourth graders in 2 classrooms with 22-23 students each
- 47 fifth graders in 2 classrooms with 23-24 students each

Support staff includes PE and Library in addition to our secretary and principal.

A special note about 1st grade: Four classrooms in first grade are not possible unless we raise funds for FTE from the following sources:

- 0.50 FTE by eliminating the reading or immersion specialist position
- 0.25 FTE from Richmond Foundation
- 0.25 FTE raised by parents donating the equivalent of one month of kindergarten tuition to Richmond's Foundation (\$265 x 135 families = \$36,000 enough for 0.25 FTE after 1/3 is donated to the Portland Schools Foundation)

Please give some serious thought to making a donation to Richmond's Foundation in order to keep our 1st grade class sizes small so our teachers can give your children the attention and support they need to thrive in school.

Help Save Our Elms This Summer

Save Our Elms has close to \$2100 saved towards the next innoculations for Dutch Elm Disease. We need about \$900 more to reach our goal of the \$3000 required to buy the innoculant that our 18 trees need this summer.

Thank you to the many Richmond families who have been buying coffee this year. While enjoying fine Portland Roasting coffee, you have been helping our community climb towards our goal. \$4.50 from every pound of coffee purchased goes to the elm tree fund! Donations from coffee buyers and others have also been very helpful and I want to say thank you to those who have made donations to our 501(c)3 group.

It's not too late to get in on the coffee buying habit or to make donations. Consider buying this coffee to share at your workplace or to serve to friends in your home. Ground regular coffee is available for purchase in the office at \$10 a pound. Order forms with descriptions of the coffee varieties are available on the table in front of the office for whole bean and decaf orders. (Decaf coffee is \$11/pound.) Orders are placed every Thursday morning and fresh coffee is ready for pick-up from the office on Friday afternoons. Almost no waiting required! Donations or payments for purchases and orders can be placed in the Save Our Elms box in the office. Please make checks out to "Save Our Elms."

How many student transfers for 2007-08?

The following transfer results were obtained from our online system at 3:00 PM on Friday, March 23, 2007. Staff in Portland Public Schools' enrollment and transfer office still have *hundreds* of paper applications to enter into the online system, so **the numbers listed below do not represent the total number of applications received for Richmond, to date.** Use these numbers with caution!

1st Choice Applications for Richmond:

- 12 = Pre-school (half-day)
- 45 = Pre-school (full-day)
- 72 = Kindergarten
- 5 = 1st grade
- 3 = 2nd grade
- 3 = 3rd grade
- 1 = 4th grade
- 2 = 5th grade

143= TOTAL transfer applications by 3-23-07

What's the <u>anticipated</u> PPS timeline for the lottery and parent notification?

- Early April Schools verify that families submitted all required paperwork and attended the mandatory meeting.
- Mid-April to Early May PPS enrollment and transfer staff conduct the lottery and double-check results against application choices.
- Week of May 7th —Letters of notification of transfer results mailed to families. Families have 10 days to accept the school assigned in the lottery or remain at their neighborhood school for 2007-08.

Buy Coffee to Support Richmond's Elm Trees – every week! Decaf now \$11/pound

Our school grounds are home to 18 mature Elm trees – about half of the Elms in the Richmond neighborhood. Elms are susceptible to Dutch Elm Disease (DED) and many communities - including Portland - have lost the Elms trees lining their streets to this disease. Richmond's Save Our Elms chapter, a 501(c) 3 non-profit, partners with Portland Roasting to raise money for inoculations and pruning of our trees through the sale of coffee.

The Richmond chapter of Save Our Elms currently has about \$1800 in the bank to use to inoculate the trees once every three years with a fungicide to protect them from Dutch Elm Disease (DED). Our trees were inoculated in 2001 and 2004 and are due for inoculation this summer, all with the help of generous volunteers. Our chapter has also helped PPS pay a portion of tree pruning costs. Fungicide prices vary every year, but we can expect inoculant prices to cost \$3,000 this summer.

Decaf price change (still a bargain!)

Please consider helping our elm trees throughout the school year. Due to a price increase, Save Our Elms sells Portland Roasting's delicious, environmentally friendly regular coffee for **\$10/lb** for and decaf coffee for **\$11/lb**. \$4.50/lb. of each pound goes to Save Our Elms. We accept donations as well.

Portland Roasting descriptions:

All coffees for Richmond, including the decafs, are our Farm Friendly[™] Direct coffees because as important to us as the quality of our coffee is our social responsibility. We strongly believe that we can make a positive difference in the coffee world through direct, socially responsible coffee sourcing. The foundation of this coffee sourcing is our Farm Friendly Direct[™] Programs. These Programs involve paying growers a premium for their coffee with 100% of the premium going to farm and community projects. All of these projects are designed to give back directly to the farmers - furthering the long term sustainable infrastructure. These are extremely important issues to Portland Roasting!

Ethiopian – Kochere: This coffee is part of Project H.O.P.E., which stands for Hope and Opportunity for the People of Ethiopia. We combine Portland Roasting's efforts with our coffee broker and farming cooperative to build a much needed community center for the Ethiopian farming community of Kochere. This community hub will provide a common meeting place for educational purposes, as well as a vital medical dispensary for the people of Kochere.
