Dear Richmond Families,

In our last newsletter of Friday, March 23rd I gave you the most recent information about the number of transfer applications received to date and the configuration and size of classes for 2007-08. The purpose of this letter is to give you one more update about the number of classes at each grade level and the expected size of each class now that the transfer deadline has closed and all applications have been entered into the online system.

Richmond has received a record number of transfer applications for 2007-08 with 196 total transfer requests, up from 173 in 2006. As you read the table below, please focus on the column labeled "1st choice" to highlight the transfer numbers that represent the most likely scenario for each grade and class.

Given the above transfer numbers, what will class sizes look like for 2007-08? Here's the most *conservative* picture:

There are some special notes you need to know for several grade levels:

- **PreK**—Yesterday I received verbal approval from our Superintendent, Director of ESL, Director of Enrollment & Transfer and our Area Director to have three classes of PreK allowing us to admit ALL first choice transfer applications for 2007-08.
- **Kindergarten**—Total number of students is expected to be 96-98 from the following sources: 76 from 1st choice transfers, 3-4 from 2nd choice transfers, 14 current Richmond PreK students moving into kindergarten, and 3-4 students who have already contacted us with firm plans to move to Portland this spring and enroll their children for 2007-08.

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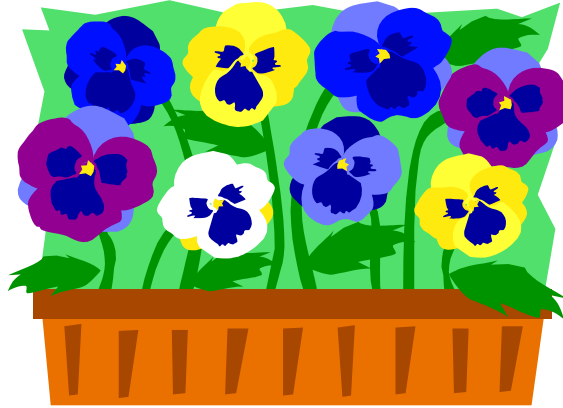

Letter from the Principal, cont.

- **1st Grade**—Total number of students is expected to be 93. Additional fundraising via the Richmond Foundation is needed to pay for one-fourth the cost of a classroom teacher. We currently have the equivalent of 0.75 FTE for this position by using the FTE from the reading/immersion specialist position and the \$26,000 the Foundation has raised to date.
- **4th & 5th Grade**—Four classes in grades 4-5 (two English, two Japanese) rather than three classes with one mixed-age configuration (e.g. 4, 4/5, 5), reflects my priority to keep class sizes in these grades as small as possible due to the steep increase in academic expectations from the Oregon content standards and the Japanese language curriculum. This priority was strongly supported by Richmond's faculty.

We will need to come together as a school community to raise funds to cover one-fourth of the cost of a classroom teaching position to keep class sizes manageable for our first grade students. Any additional funds raised would help us retain our wonderful reading specialist who works with students in grades 1-5. **This fundraising is the work of our entire school community – families AND staff – because we ALL benefit when the needs of Richmond children are effectively met in small class sizes with support from highly skilled teachers and instructional specialists.** Please see pages 6-7 of this newsletter for specific fundraising information from Richmond's Foundation.

Many new parents at Richmond are shocked to learn they need to raise funds via our local school foundation to maintain or add precious programs and staff to support our immersion program. Unfortunately this is not a new phenomenon that is limited to Richmond. Last week, the Portland Schools Foundation issued a press release announcing \$850,000 in grants to help schools across the district to improve teaching and learning. Last year, local school foundations raised a total of \$2,526,000 to support their local school programs and contributed \$842,000 (i.e. one-third of total funds raised) to the Portland Schools Foundation's equity fund for school improvement grants. Over the last ten years, local school foundations have contributed over \$4.5 million to this equity fund from more than \$13.5 million in total funds raised to "add back" staff positions and program support in local schools.

I've scheduled several sessions for parents to gather with me to get any and all questions answered about the staffing process, our school's fundraising needs and any other issues parents may have. I've set sessions at morning, afternoon and evening times to accommodate most schedules. Please let me know if you can't make one of these sessions and we'll try to schedule another time to get together at your convenience.

Update on our Interviews with Childcare Providers

Last month Richmond sent out a parent survey to measure your satisfaction with the YMCA, our current childcare provider, and get feedback about the kinds of services and fee structure you prefer. 74 parents completed this survey in its online or paper format and the feedback from the survey was used to create the following list of family needs for any childcare provider working at Richmond. **Our goal has been to find a childcare provider who can deliver improved services to Richmond children and their families at a rate equivalent to, or cheaper than, the YMCA's current rate.**

- Create an environment and use a teaching philosophy conducive to furthering students' proficiency in English and Japanese
- Offer before school care at 7:00-8:00 AM and after school care from 2:15-6:00 PM, at a minimum
- Offer full-day services on ALL school holidays and vacations (e.g. winter break, spring break, summer)
- Provide age-appropriate childcare for students ages 3-12 with a program divided between primary (pre-school to grade 1) and intermediate (grades 2-5) housed in separate areas of the school
- Provide a variable fee structure according to family income level with full scholarships available for families in need
- Staff the program with a student/teacher ratio of no more than 1 to 10 (the YMCA staffs their program at 1 adult to 15 students) to ensure student safety
- Provide daily time for homework help in English AND Japanese
- Provide daily enrichment activities with art and athletics, using projects and activities representing a variety of cultures
- Demonstrate the flexibility to offer excursions and host regional experts or crafts people to teach art and athletics

We have interviewed four different providers: 1). YMCA, 2). Art4Life, 3). Vermont Hills, and 4). Portland Jewish Academy. Each of these providers operate successful programs at several schools throughout Portland Public Schools and the Portland metropolitan area. The Portland Jewish Academy program appears to offer wonderful services, but is far more expensive than our criteria allows. A group of parents and principal plan to visit schools served by Art4Life and Vermont Hills on Thursday, April 12th to get a firsthand look at the structure of each program. Those schools are:

- Maplewood Elementary School—the first school to work with Art4Life (also working at Abernethy, Winterhaven and Emmerson)
- Bridlemile Elementary School and the German-American School working with Vermont Hills

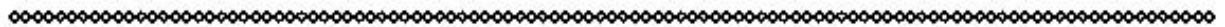

Richmond School Foundation Questions and Answers

What is the Richmond School Foundation and why does it exist? The Richmond foundation is a segment of the not-for-profit Portland Schools Foundation. The Portland Schools Foundation was created years ago to allow parents to raise money for additional staffing at schools. This foundation is the ONLY AVENUE AT RICHMOND IN WHICH MONEY CAN BE RAISED FOR STAFFING. Neither the Richmond PTA, nor Oya No Kai can raise money to fund staffing.

How much money does the foundation raise? Last year the foundation raised over \$32,000 (see the following breakdown). This money helped fund a portion of the library teacher.

Why does the foundation need to raise more money?

The short answer is to keep class size small at Richmond. According to Kathryn Anderson's letter on March 23, you know that it will be possible to hire a fourth first grade teacher for 2007-2008, IF an additional \$36,000 can be raised by the foundation. This additional teacher will reduce next year's class sizes in first grade from 31-32 students per class to 23-24 students per class.

Although the specific position we are aiming for is a fourth 1st grade teacher, funding this position enables us to have 4 kindergarten classes of 22-24 students and allows us not to have any mixed 4/5 grade classes. So funding a fourth 1st grade teacher benefits everyone at Richmond.

How much does the Richmond Foundation need to raise?

We have approximately \$26,000 now. In addition, the Richmond PTA, which partners with the Richmond Foundation to help staffing needs at Richmond, is planning on adding their fundraising efforts to the pledge drive. It looks like we need an additional \$20,000 to help fully fund a fourth 1st grade teacher. An additional \$20,000 above this amount will be needed to be able to keep our reading specialist.

How does the foundation plan to raise this money?

- 1) The parent pledge drive is the main vehicle for Richmond Foundation fundraising. Donations are accepted all year long...although as the school year is coming to a close, the need for donations is higher.
- 2) On May 1st, with the help of the Portland Schools Foundation, a letter will be sent to all Richmond families encouraging them to make a tax-deductible donation to the Richmond Foundation.
- 3) On May 6th, a repeat phone bank will occur as a follow-up to the May 1st letter.

How can you help?

- 1) Consider making a donation of \$265 (equivalent of one month's kindergarten tuition) to the Richmond Foundation. The easiest way is by check. Please make it out to Richmond Foundation and drop off in the school office or send to the school.
- 2) You can also give online at the Portland Schools Foundation website. However, be sure, if you use this method, that you 'designate' your gift to Richmond on their online form. Otherwise the money will go to the general fund and not to Richmond.
- 3) Ask your child's grandparent or other relative to donate.
- 4) Volunteer to help with the phone bank on May 6th.
- 5) Volunteer to be a part of the Richmond foundation. **Currently it is a group of one!** The foundation needs the skills and input of many parents. The next Richmond Foundation meeting will be on April 16th at 7pm at Richmond.

Buy Coffee to Support Richmond's Elm Trees – every week!

Decaf now \$11/pound

Our school grounds are home to 18 mature Elm trees – about half of the Elms in the Richmond neighborhood. Elms are susceptible to Dutch Elm Disease (DED) and many communities - including Portland - have lost the Elms trees lining their streets to this disease. Richmond's Save Our Elms chapter, a 501(c) 3 non-profit, partners with Portland Roasting to raise money for inoculations and pruning of our trees through the sale of coffee.

The Richmond chapter of Save Our Elms currently has about \$1800 in the bank to use to inoculate the trees once every three years with a fungicide to protect them from Dutch Elm Disease (DED). Our trees were inoculated in 2001 and 2004 and are due for inoculation this summer, all with the help of generous volunteers. Our chapter has also helped PPS pay a portion of tree pruning costs. Fungicide prices vary every year, but we can expect inoculant prices to cost \$3,000 this summer.

Decaf price change (still a bargain!)

Please consider helping our elm trees throughout the school year. Due to a price increase, Save Our Elms sells Portland Roasting's delicious, environmentally friendly regular coffee for **\$10/lb** for and decaf coffee for **\$11/lb**. \$4.50/lb. of each pound goes to Save Our Elms. We accept donations as well.

Portland Roasting descriptions:

All coffees for Richmond, including the decafs, are our Farm Friendly™ Direct coffees because as important to us as the quality of our coffee is our social responsibility. We strongly believe that we can make a positive difference in the coffee world through direct, socially responsible coffee sourcing. The foundation of this coffee sourcing is our Farm Friendly Direct™ Programs. These Programs involve paying growers a premium for their coffee with 100% of the premium going to farm and community projects. All of these projects are designed to give back directly to the farmers - furthering the long term sustainable infrastructure. These are extremely important issues to Portland Roasting!

Ethiopian – Kochere: This coffee is part of Project H.O.P.E., which stands for Hope and Opportunity for the People of Ethiopia. We combine Portland Roasting's efforts with our coffee broker and farming cooperative to build a much needed community center for the Ethiopian farming community of Kochere. This community hub will provide a common meeting place for educational purposes, as well as a vital medical dispensary for the people of Kochere.
