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Richmond Earns *Exceptional* Rating on Oregon State Report Card!

Dear Richmond Families,

Today the Oregon Department of Education (ODE) released report cards for every public school throughout the state. Each school was given one of five possible overall ratings: exceptional, strong, satisfactory, low or unacceptable. **Richmond's rating on the Oregon report card simply confirms what everyone knows:** We have an EXCEPTIONAL school! Richmond's exceptional overall rating is based on the following three factors:

- **Student Performance** The percentage of students who meet and exceed state standards on reading, writing, and math standardized tests. We received a student performance rating of exceptional because more than 95% of Richmond third, fourth and fifth graders met/exceeded the 2006 Oregon reading and math tests.
- **Student Behavior** Rated on the percentage of students attending school each day. We received a student behavior rating of exceptional, because our daily attendance average exceeded the goal of 95%.
- School Characteristics Rated on the percentage of students in school taking the state tests. We received an exceptional rating for school characteristics because 100% of Richmond third, fourth and fifth graders took the state tests.

While we are pleased and proud of this year's overall score, we want to remind you that the state report card is one of many tools used at Richmond to determine how effective we are with our instructional program. The state report card focuses primarily on test scores for 3rd-5th graders as a benchmark of student achievement. At Richmond, we also evaluate students on the quality of their daily work and nightly homework, their level of class participation and their social and emotional development. Our evaluation of your child's academic progress will be thoroughly explained to you during your parent/teacher conference the week of November 20-22.

Richmond's exceptional rating is a success for everyone in our school community: the staff, students, and parents who are working together to make this school such a wonderful place for learning in English and Japanese. It's proof the sky's the limit if we pull together and keep ourselves firmly focused on the crucial work of teaching and learning. Thank you for your support and dedication to our school!

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Oya No Kai Status in Portland Public Schools

Greetings Richmond Parents,

You've probably noticed the absence of Oya No Kai information and backpack flyers this school year. The reason for this absence is a new policy that was initiated by PPS concerning which non-PPS groups would be allowed access to students. Groups that were automatically given approved status are PTA, Foundation and Booster clubs. Unfortunately Oya No Kai Inc. did not neatly fit into any of those categories and we were prohibited from fundraising and distributing materials at school. Oya No Kai has been in contact with the folks at the district office who are responsible for making the status determination. PPS currently does not have a definition of what a "booster club" is. They are doing research into this matter. In the meantime due to Kathryn Anderson's efforts on our behalf we were given temporary approved status until January.

So between now and January we need to morph Oya No Kai into a club that fits PPS's idea of a booster club. Representatives from the Strategic Fundraising Committee, Oya No Kai, PTA and Kathryn Anderson met on October 9th to start planning the next steps.

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Save Our Elms Update

For parents new to Richmond, our school grounds are home to 18 mature Elm trees — about half of the Elms in the Richmond neighborhood are at our school. These trees are not only beautiful, but cool our grounds, provide habitat to urban wildlife and help absorb carbon monoxide emissions. Elms are susceptible to Dutch Elm Disease (DED) and many communities — including Portland — have lost the Elms trees lining their streets to this disease. DED is a fungus that is spread by a beetle who eats dead Elm wood. Once infected, an Elm will die within weeks and can spread quickly to neighboring trees.

The Richmond chapter of Save Our Elms currently has \$1274 in the bank to use to inoculate the trees once every three years with a fungicide to protect them from Dutch Elm Disease (DED). Our trees were inoculated in 2001 and 2004 and are due for inoculation this summer. Our chapter has also helped PPS pay a portion of tree pruning costs and waters three DED-resistant Elms planted with the help of Richmond Neighborhood's Debbie Stoller and Friends of Trees in 2005. Sadly, one of these new Elms was cut down in early September, 2006.

Fungicide prices vary every year, but we can expect inoculant's prices to cost \$3,000 (in 2004, the scientist who developed a new fungicide gave a huge price break and it only cost \$2,000). As you can see, we are currently short of our goal.

To raise money, Save Our Elms has partnered with Portland Roasting to sell coffee. The coffee is delicious, environmentally friendly and costs \$10/lb. \$4.50/lb. of each pound goes to Save Our Elms. We accept donations as well. Much thanks to parents Paul Gilles, Mikiko Mori-Gilles, Mary Klinger and Secretary Patsy Burke for making this program happen.

Please include payment in the order (make checks to *Save Our Elms* only – no cash please!) or arrange to get a check to Mary before picking up your coffee. For orders submitted by 8:00 AM Thursday, coffee will be available in the office by Friday afternoon.

Here's is a description of the coffees available:

All coffees for Richmond, including the decafs, are our Farm Friendly™ Direct coffees because as important to us as the quality of our coffee is our social responsibility. We strongly believe that we can make a positive difference in the coffee world through direct, socially responsible coffee sourcing. The foundation of this coffee sourcing is our Farm Friendly Direct™ Programs. These Programs involve paying growers a premium for their coffee with 100% of the premium going to farm and community projects. All of these projects are designed to give back directly to the farmers - furthering the long term sustainable infrastructure. These are extremely important issues to Portland Roasting!

Ethiopian – Kochere: This coffee is part of Project H.O.P.E., which stands for Hope and Opportunity for the People of Ethiopia. We combine Portland Roasting's efforts with our coffee broker and farming cooperative to build a much needed community center for the Ethiopian farming community of Kochere. This community hub will provide a common meeting place for educational purposes, as well as a vital medical dispensary for the people of Kochere.
