

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Thanks to Portland Schools Foundation for Writing Grant!

Dear Richmond Families,

We just received the official word from the Portland Schools Foundation about a New Visions grant award to help us expand our improvements to writing instruction at Richmond. Our school joined a small group of schools in the Cleveland/Franklin region to write a New Visions grant together to address our common need to improve the way we teach writing. Specifically, this grant will:

- Provide a protocol for teachers to use to examine student writing and the learning behaviors of students during classroom writing lessons.
- Provide more time for teachers to examine student writing in grade level and/or language teams to determine the implications for improving instruction.
- Provide opportunities for teachers to visit colleagues classrooms during writing lessons to examine the impact of new instructional strategies and materials on the quality of student writing.

The work of this New Vision grant gives us the resources to carefully apply the information Richmond teachers have gleaned from teacher training sessions at the district level. For example, over the last year our PreK-2 teachers have been involved with professional training to improve reading and writing instruction. Walk into any Richmond classroom (both English and Japanese) and you should see evidence of the impact of teachers' training with writing instruction:

- Lots of current student writing on display around the classroom and in the halls.
- Children writing for many purposes throughout the school day.
- Children writing together with the whole class, in pairs, in small groups with the teacher, together with a parent volunteer or intern, and independently.
- Teachers leading mini-lessons about writing skills to the whole class based on needs taken from the teachers' examination of student writing.
- Child authors sharing their writing with partners, table groups or the entire class on a daily basis.
- Writing folders filled with writing in different stages of the writing process (i.e. planning, drafting, revising, editing, publishing).

Grant writing at Richmond is going strong for other school needs as well. I've shared a massive grant calendar with our faculty, Site Council and parent fundraising committee that I developed to target the goals and objectives in Richmond's school improvement plan. We've set a goal to write two grants a month to fund our school priorities, so look for updates about this work in the months ahead. In the meantime, I hope your family has a wonderful, restful Thanksgiving holiday!

APPLE SALE RAISES OVER \$2500.00!!! Thank you to all who participated in our annual apple sale with Kiyokawa Family Orchard. It was such a success on so many levels and I thought I would share with you how your purchase of apples touched the lives of so many people. Randy Kiyokawa of Kiyokawa Family Orchards was so pleased when I told him we were ordering 273 boxes of fruit to be shipped the last week of October. While other farmers were laying off their employees for the season, Randy was able to keep his crew on for another week to pick our fruit. We received crunchy, crisp, healthy goodness, and hard-working people kept their jobs! He was also happy that we were supporting Oregon farmers and keeping our local economy strong. We also surpassed our goal of \$1000 and raised approximately \$2600. Great job!

I also want to send out a special thank you to all the volunteers who helped us unload the apples from FedEx (who delivered the apples to us for free saving us over \$200 in shipping charges!) in such a short period of time. We had only 45 minutes to unload and categorize 6500 pounds of fruit and the volunteers met the challenge! You are amazing, and I cannot thank you enough!!! Now go and make some apple pie....!

Auction Procurement Questions and Answers

Where do I bring my donation?

All donations must be brought to Richmond School and placed in the "drop off" bin in the office, so they can be entered in the data base and given a "number." Please attach your donor form to your item or include in an envelope with a gift certificate.

What if my donated item is too large or too fragile to bring to Richmond?

If your item is too large to bring to Richmond, please bring only the completed donor form to Richmond and check the box on the form labeled "Oya No Kai will pick up." THEN, please contact Jody Little (503) 232-4782 littlesj@qwest. net to arrange for item pick up.

If four Moms put together a package of a dessert a month, do they all get a tax deduction? If so, how do they fill out the form for that?

The four of them need to have an estimated value for their donation. I believe each individual could get a tax deduction on 1/4 of that estimated value. Each mom needs to have a copy of the procurement form, although we only want ONE copy for our data base which includes all their names. Please consult your personal tax advisor for details.

Trader Joe's is willing to donate \$25 of non-perishable snack items in a canvas bag, but they won't give a gift certificate...on the form, what does one check regarding the Merchandise: Donor will deliver, ONK will pick up or already picked up?

Ideally, whoever approached Trader Joe's should pick up the donated item and bring to Richmond. If this is not possible, they should contact Jody (see above information) to arrange an alternative.

A woman has a home business and wants to donate a service, does she need to make up her own gift certificate?

If the donor wants a certificate with a particular logo, picture, etc, than yes, she should make her own. Otherwise, it is my understanding that the auction archetype software can make certificates to use.

Are all tickets to the auction tax deductible, whether it is \$1000 or \$750 or \$50?

The amount of the ticket minus the value of the dinner is tax deductible. Please consult your personal tax advisor for additional details.

Can one of my family's donations be a cash donation?

Yes, please put your cash donation in an envelope with the completed donor form and bring to Richmond school. Please note that all cash donations will be applied to the cultural exchanges unless otherwise specified.

- Increasing the rigor AND relevance of our middle and high schools – preparing kids for higher education and higher wage jobs.


We saw our community come together in incredible

RICHMOND PARENT PLEDGE DRIVE 2006-2007 SCHOOL YEAR FOR SUPPORT OF STAFF AT RICHMOND

"An investment in knowledge pays the best interest." Benjamin Franklin

Dear Richmond Parent,

This year, for the first time in Richmond School's history, we were rated 'exceptional' by Oregon's Department of Education. This is the highest of the five possible academic scores for a public school. One of the major reasons our school is so successful is the high level of parent involvement in our program. The parents at Richmond are extra special and extra dedicated to making and keeping Richmond JMP the best. Your help is essential to the success of our program.

Like last year, the school needs your help to maintain the high quality of teaching at Richmond. **Without donations** from parents, we would not have all the key staff at Richmond our children need to be exceptional students and motivated learners. Last year (2005-2006 school year) through parent pledges, we raised more than \$20,000. Other funding sources for staff included the school auction, grants, a business pledge drive and other sources. The fundraising for staff for 2005-2006 school year totaled \$74,000; it was used to save our librarian and acquire a reading specialist. Hooray Richmond parents!

These are the fundraising goals this year for the annual Richmond Parent Pledge Drive:

- * Raise funds to keep our librarian
- * Raise funds to keep our reading specialist
- * Raise funds to hire a Richmond Japanese immersion specialist

How does the Parent Pledge Drive work?

- Like last year, we are asking each family in grades 1-5 to make a voluntary donation equal to one month of kindergarten tuition (\$265) each semester...once in the fall and once in the spring. If our kindergarten families can pay this each month, it seems a small thing to ask families in grades 1-5 to pay this amount just twice.
- If every family donates the full amount, we will raise more than \$150,000! Wow! Together we can do it... there is power in everyone playing a part. As they say, stone by stone an arch is built. How's that for 'power to the people' and working together?

Why are the Richmond PTA and Richmond School Foundation working on this pledge drive together?

- One of PTA's continual objectives is to promote student achievement, and by partnering with the foundation to maintain and hopefully add essential staff, we are working together for student achievement.
- This summer, the Richmond PTA and Foundation partnered to help raise money for our reading specialist. Many families donated to help and we were successful in attaining this staff position. For the summer pledge drive, we were able to keep 100% of the funds we raised at Richmond. As of this fall, however, the only way to raise funds for staff is directly through your local school foundation.

What is the Equity Fund? How do all schools benefit from it? Has Richmond benefited from it?

- As many of you also know, when funds are raised for staff through local school foundations, the Portland School Board requires that 1/3 of the money raised be donated to the general Portland Schools Foundation's Equity Fund...and 2/3 of the money stays right at your own school. (This 'kicks in' after the first \$5000 we raise...you keep 100% of the first \$5000 you raise.)
- The Equity Fund is used to help less fortunate schools that are unable to raise money themselves and/or to fund innovative programs throughout the district. Based on competitive grant process, all the money in the Equity Fund is donated back to schools across the entire district each year.
- Richmond itself has benefited from grants awarded to us from the Equity Fund in the past. Since 1999, we received 12 different grants totaling \$47,000. We also just received news that we were awarded \$6,000 this year as part of multi-school writing instruction grant!

- Although we encourage one donation per semester, you can give a one-time gift or even monthly...whatever works for your family.
