

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Helping Oya No Kai

Dear Richmond Families.

Oya No Kai is a long-serving parent group dedicated to the support of the Japanese Magnet Program (JMP) from PreK to 12. This summer, Oya No Kai's access to students and families at Richmond, Mt. Tabor and Grant High School was limited by a new policy enacted by Portland Public Schools' board of education in June 2006. This policy (#3.30.038) requires all "outside" groups to request and receive district permission before sharing information with students and families or hosting events. As a separate 501(c)(3) organization, Oya No Kai must comply with the new district policy. The only groups with greater access to students and families are school PTA groups, school foundations and booster clubs.

For the last four months, I've been working with Oya No Kai's board of directors to help them navigate the transition to approved booster club status. Our conversations have centered around these legal priorities:

- 1. Compliance with Portland Public Schools' policies for community groups
- 2. Compliance with the legal requirements for 501(c)(3) status (e.g. financial reporting, Board policies and structure, etc.)
- 3.Equal opportunities for meaningful involvement and access to information in Oya No Kai by all stakeholders

Over the last four months, the entire Richmond community has reached out to lend a hand to Oya No Kai as their board of directors examined the transition to a booster club. Richmond's PTA has donated hundreds of hours of time to help Oya No Kai with fundraisers this fall. Our Site Council has provided support and served as a sounding board for ideas. Richmond's strategic fund-raising committee developed an ambitious fund-raising plan and a parent worked with me to write two grants totaling almost \$60,000 to fund collaborative endeavors (i.e. tea house, revision of the Japanese curriculum and completion of the Japanese garden). I facilitated a temporary waiver from Oya No Kai's status as an "outside" group under the new PPS policy, to give Oya No Kai the time it needs to make sound restructuring decisions. I invited members of Oya No Kai's board of directors to our November staff meeting to listen to teachers' feedback and gave them detailed information from Richmond parent surveys to guide restructuring efforts. On a weekly basis, I have helped Oya No Kai committees with articles for Richmond's newsletter and website to expand their communication ability. Finally, I've been at Oya No Kai's disposal to listen and answer questions, brainstorm possibilities, and research options.

The Richmond community has helped Oya No Kai identify several strong possibilities for booster club collaboration:

- Expand/enhance partnerships within Portland's Japanese community
- •Write grants for cultural enrichment
- Expand/enhance public relations and marketing to facilitate expansion of the JMP
- \bullet Expand extended day/year enrichment opportunities to meet the needs of more families
- Refine cultural exchanges and move coordination of the 5th grade Japan trip to PPS with the addition of a Japanese immersion specialist.

As we discussed at the October 24th meeting of Oya No Kai's board of directors, each possibility has the potential to benefit the entire Japanese Magnet Program PreK to 12, something that has always been a high priority for Oya No Kai. (continued on page 8)

Lecture About Wabi Sabi at Art Museum Sun. Dec. 10th


Diane Durston, Portland Art Museum's Curator of Education and author of four books on Japan, will explore the concept of *wabi sabi* featured in her new book, *Wabi Sabi*: *The Art of Everyday Life*, during a lecture at the Museum on Sunday, December 10 at 2:00 PM. Using images from the Museum's permanent collection as well as her book, Durston's lecture will highlight this quintessentially Japanese concept of beauty, one that has captured the imagination of architects and designers worldwide in recent years.

The term *wabi sabi* is a pairing of two separate words, neither of which translates easily into English. *Wabi* connotes rustic simplicity, tranquility and natural austerity. *Sabi* has been interpreted as the beauty of age and of the patina that reveal the passage of time. The combined aesthetic appreciates the beauty of imperfection and impermanence.


The *wabi sabi* aesthetic has influenced traditional Japanese arts, from painting and haiku poetry to flower arranging and pottery. Its influence can be attributed to its close association with Zen Buddhism, making its important spiritual as well as aesthetic. The Japanese tea ceremony is considered a manifestation of *wabi sabi*. The first English text written about the ceremony mearly 100 years ago simply describes the aesthetic as "the art of everyday life."

Inspired by that simple premise, Durston's new book includes photographs and quotes from prominent Japanese art historians, as well as from international artists and writers. It also present personal insights into *wabi sabi* leaned from everyday life over the 18 years that she lived in Kyoto, Japan. Ms. Durston moved to Japan in 1977 and spent three years studying Japanese *sumi-e* painting with a master painter, learning the concepts of *wabi* and *sabi* first-hand. The New York Times has referred to her two previous books, *Old Kyoto* and *Kyoto: Seven Paths to the Heart of the City*, as "classics." Following her lecture, she will sign copies of her most recent books.

Winter Weather Information for School Closure

Winter weather is on the way. Although rare, it is sometimes necessary to close school or delay the opening of school due to the unsafe weather conditions. In making the decision if schools should remain open or closed, first consideration is given to student and staff safety, while keeping in mind the importance of attendance and learning.

Before the school district makes the decision, local meteorologists, transportation officials, and traffic safety experts are consulted. The school district will attempt to make the decision as early as possible and communicate it quickly to the media and our website. Sometimes it will be possible to make the decision the night before, but often this decision cannot be made until early in the morning. The Student Transportation Department will be distributing the Alternate Emergency Snow Route Stops booklet to students who ride the bus. Please refer to this book when we announce through the media and our website that Portland Public Schools buses will be on snow routes.

As a general rule PPS will not close schools early. The potential negatives of children arriving home early without parental supervision or the ability to gain entry clearly offsets most foreseeable weather circumstances. All of our schools are safe and sound structures capable of providing shelter in place until the end of the school day. As always, parents have the individual choice of picking up their child prior to the end of the school day.

RICHMOND PARENT PLEDGE DRIVE 2006-2007 SCHOOL YEAR FOR SUPPORT OF STAFF AT RICHMOND

Dear Richmond Parent,

This year, for the first time in Richmond School's history, we were rated 'exceptional' by Oregon's Department of Education. This is the highest of the five possible academic scores for a public school. One of the major reasons our school is so successful is the high level of parent involvement in our program. The parents at Richmond are extra special and extra dedicated to making and keeping Richmond JMP the best. Your help is essential to the success of our program.

Like last year, the school needs your help to maintain the high quality of teaching at Richmond. **Without donations** from parents, we would not have all the key staff at Richmond our children need to be exceptional students and motivated learners. Last year (2005-2006 school year) through parent pledges, we raised more than \$20,000. Other funding sources for staff included the school auction, grants, a business pledge drive and other sources. The fundraising for staff for 2005-2006 school year totaled \$74,000; it was used to save our librarian and acquire a reading specialist. Hooray Richmond parents!

These are the fundraising goals this year for the annual Richmond Parent Pledge Drive:

- * Raise funds to keep our librarian
- * Raise funds to keep our reading specialist
- * Raise funds to hire a Richmond Japanese immersion specialist

How does the Parent Pledge Drive work?

- Like last year, we are asking each family in grades 1-5 to make a voluntary donation equal to one month of kindergarten tuition (\$265) each semester...once in the fall and once in the spring. If our kindergarten families can pay this each month, it seems a small thing to ask families in grades 1-5 to pay this amount just twice.
- If every family donates the full amount, we will raise more than \$150,000! Wow! Together we can do it... there is power in everyone playing a part. As they say, stone by stone an arch is built. How's that for 'power to the people' and working together?

Why are the Richmond PTA and Richmond School Foundation working on this pledge drive together?

- One of PTA's continual objectives is to promote student achievement, and by partnering with the foundation to maintain and hopefully add essential staff, we are working together for student achievement.
- This summer, the Richmond PTA and Foundation partnered to help raise money for our reading specialist. Many families donated to help and we were successful in attaining this staff position. For the summer pledge drive, we were able to keep 100% of the funds we raised at Richmond. As of this fall, however, the only way to raise funds for staff is directly through your local school foundation.

What is the Equity Fund? How do all schools benefit from it? Has Richmond benefited from it?

- As many of you also know, when funds are raised for staff through local school foundations, the Portland School Board requires that 1/3 of the money raised be donated to the general Portland Schools Foundation's Equity Fund...and 2/3 of the money stays right at your own school. (This 'kicks in' after the first \$5000 we raise...you keep 100% of the first \$5000 you raise.)
- The Equity Fund is used to help less fortunate schools that are unable to raise money themselves and/or to fund innovative programs throughout the district. Based on competitive grant process, all the money in the Equity Fund is donated back to schools across the entire district each year.
- Richmond itself has benefited from grants awarded to us from the Equity Fund in the past. Since 1999, we received 12 different grants totaling \$47,000. We also just received news that we were awarded \$6,000 this year as part of multi-school writing instruction grant!
