Reshape Richmond!

Dear Richmond Family,

Parents, students, community members and educators are invited to four January meetings in different quadrants of the city to give input on options for repairing, remodeling and/or rebuilding Portland Public School buildings. Sessions will be held at:

- North region of Portland at Jefferson High School (5210 N. Kerby) at 7-9:30 PM
- West region of Portland at Wilson High School (1151 SW Vermont) at 7-9:30
- Northeast region of Portland at Madison High School (2735 NE 82nd Ave.) at 7-9:30 PM
- Southeast region of Portland at Franklin High School (5405 SE Woodward) at 7-9:30 PM

At the meetings, consultants hired by the school district will present findings from their analysis of both the physical conditions and educational suitability of each school in the quadrant. They also will summarize public input on building priorities captured at community meetings in May and November. Based on those findings, the consultants will present options for repairing, renovating or replacing each school, and the costs of each option. Community members can ask questions and give feedback on the options. Community members interested in attending the January sessions are asked to email rsvp@pps.k12.or.us.

Following the meetings, the consultants will meet with district staff in February to develop a recommended plan, which will be presented to the school board in March. Another round of public input sessions on the plan will be held in April. The Board of Education is scheduled to adopt a final facilities plan in May.

Richmond opened its doors to the first class of students in 1908 and is the oldest building currently in use as a school in the Portland Public School District. In addition, our Japanese immersion school supports the fastest growing student population of any school in the district. While our school building has had many updates in its 100 year history, it has a long way to go before it can adequately support the technology and space needs of our growing immersion program. I strongly urge you to attend one of these important community forums, if at all possible, and speak to the facility needs you see at Richmond. Your parent voice carries a great deal of weight.

Kindergarten— In the English classrooms, we have started our unit on weather. We will be singing about weather, reading weather related stories, and writing about weather. Also, each student will be making their own personal book about weather!

Good news! Save Our Elms coffee is switching back to the ever popular - and wonderfully priced - pound size bags of coffee!

Even better: Portland Roasting will package our 1 pound of fabulous, freshly roasted coffee in compostable bags! These bags have a corn oil liner and can be composted after removing the small metal tie at the top of the bag. (The previous packaging was non-recyclable.) Look for the new order form on the next page of this newsletter (page 6).

With this bag switch, we will move back to the price from earlier in the school year: one pound bags are \$10 for regular coffee and \$11 for ground. There will be ground regular coffee on hand for purchase in the office and orders are filled weekly for whole bean and decaf coffee, too. Thank you for supporting this program and for hanging in there as we make this exciting switch to a more earth-friendly package. (Compostable or not, buying coffee in pound size bags versus 12 ounce bags also reduce waste as we buy fewer units to meet our caffeine needs!) Remember it is all for the benefit of our beautiful Dutch Elm trees.

Lunch & Recess Schedule



How many minutes do Richmond students have to eat lunch in our cafeteria? Is it 15 minutes? 20 minutes? 25 minutes? Do we allow them to eat at all? The answer is that Richmond students have 25 minutes to eat their lunch every school day, with another 20-25 minutes for noon recess.

Buy Coffee in compostable bags to Support Richmond's Elm Trees

Richmond school's 20 American Dutch Elm trees need to be inoculated every 3 years to resist Dutch Elm Disease which can kill the beautiful trees which shade our school grounds. During inoculations in June of 2007, we used 800 microinjections of a fungicide recommended by foresters to protect our trees. The cost per injection was \$3.50 for a total of \$2800. For the next round of inoculations in 2010, prices and shipping costs are expected to be slightly higher.

To raise money for the inoculations, Save Our Elms, a 501c(3) non-profit, partners with Portland Roasting to sell delicious, freshly roasted coffee to the Richmond community. \$4.60 from every bag of regular coffee sold allows us to buy approximately 1.31 microinjectors. (Save Our Elms gets \$5.05 from every bag of decaf coffee, too!) The coffee is delicious, environmentally friendly and costs \$10/pound for regular and \$11/pound for decaf.

If you haven't tried the coffee yet, ground regular coffee is available for purchase in the office. The price is \$10 /pound (checks made to Save Our Elms, please.) You can look in the coffee basket on Patsy's counter for the variety you like and either give your money to Patsy or place it in the box marked "Save Our Elms" on the office front wall. I place orders every Thursday morning at 8 AM for whole bean, decaf, and additional ground coffee. For an order, please fill out an order form (some are usually available on the table in front of the office or on Richmond's website) indicating your coffee choice and whole bean or ground preference and attach payment. (Please note decaf coffee costs \$11.00 a pound.) Coffee from orders will be available in the office by the next afternoon and it will be held in Patsy's coffee drawer just for you. Patsy can retrieve this for you; she is a great supporter of this program. We accept donations as well.

Portland Roasting descriptions:

All coffees for Richmond are our Farm Friendly™ Direct coffees because as important to us as the quality of our coffee is our social responsibility. We strongly believe that we can make a positive difference in the coffee world through direct, socially responsible coffee sourcing. We pay growers a premium for their coffee with 100% of the premium going to farm and community projects. All of these projects are designed to give back directly to the farmers - furthering the long term sustainable infrastructure.

Ethiopian – Kochere: This coffee is part of Project H.O.P.E., which stands for Hope and Opportunity for the People of Ethiopia. We are helping build a much needed community center for the Ethiopian farming community of Kochere to provide a common meeting place for educational purposes, as well as a vital medical dispensary for the people of Kochere.

French Organic - Certified organic; dark roast

(new) Tanager's Song – an organic blend (Central American and Indonesian certified shade grown coffees), silky-rich and full-bodied with a caramel-like finish.

(new) Papua New Guinea - a single varietal that is passive organic.

Farm Friendly Direct, SWP (Swiss Water Process) French Decaf – directly sourced, chemical free, dark roast. Farm Friendly Direct, SWP (Swiss Water Process) Morning Decaf – directly sourced, chemical free, light roast.

§ Can buying Scrip really make a difference? Yes!

We raised over \$23,000 last year through Scrip, with only a few families ordering in each class. If only 20 families in a class purchase \$300 of grocery store scrip every month, by the end of this school year, that class will have \$2430 more in their class trip fund.

- \$ Should I Pay With Cash, Check, Or Credit Card? We are charged a low percentage fee for every credit card transaction we run. With some merchants that provide a low discount rate, the credit card fee eats some of that profit. If it is just as easy for you, paying by check gives us the entire profit. BUT, if you have a standing order, or find it easiest to pay by credit or email your order, we would MUCH rather have your credit card order than no order at all!


