# When will we know our staff allocation for 2008-09?

How many staff positions will Richmond receive in the Portland Public Schools' budget for the 2008-09 school year? What will this look like for classroom teaching positions? Will we be able to add any extra support teachers, like a school counselor, music teacher or art specialist? Will we be able to add an extra secretary or assistant principal to meet the information and administrative needs of our growing school?

These are the questions on everyone's mind. Answers available next week, as follows:

**Monday, February 25th**—Principals meet with Superintendent Carole Smith at 8:00 AM to hear the details of her budget message to the Board of Education. Elementary principals have encouraged several budget priorities for schools serving PreK-5 or PreK-8 students:

- Minimum of a half-time counselor in every school.
- Student/teacher ratio that provides more staff positions than middle and high schools currently receive. Middle and high schools received more staff positions per child than elementary schools did in 2007-08.
- Make "priority" staff positions permanent. These were funded in some schools in 2007-08 under the superintendent's special grant fund for enrichment. Richmond was one of a few schools that requested and received a half-time position to fund our cultural arts specialist.
- Minimum of two secretarial positions in each school to adequately serve families.

**Wednesday, February 27th**—Principals receive our staff allocation for 2008-09.

**Thursday, February 28th**—PTA meeting where our principal, Kathryn Anderson, will share the details about the staff allocation and get written feedback from attendees about the options presented. Please plan to attend this important meeting, 6:30-8:30 PM.

#### The Rosetta Stone Comes to Richmond!

We've asked Portland Public Schools' department of English Language Learning to set Richmond up with an enterprise license for the English and Japanese versions of Rosetta Stone. This means that all of our students, staff and families will have web-based access to the Rosetta Stone language system to enable us to improve our English and/or Japanese language skills from anyplace we have internet access. Our student and staff data is being loaded this weekend so our school will be able to access Rosetta Stone by next week. A letter will be sent home on Friday with students, to give parents the infor-

mation and password to allow their child to log in and start learning.

How will Rosetta Stone help our students with their English or Japanese fluency? Rosetta Stone will never replace a great teacher, but it can provide extra tutoring and reinforcement of language skills that have been taught in the classroom. At school, the program will give classroom teachers the flexibility to concentrate on the personal instruction and interactive classroom activities that promote fluency while allowing some students to work independently on the computer to stretch

**Healthy Meals Committee is Cooking!:** On Monday, 2/11, the Healthy Meals Committee and Kathryn Anderson met with Kristy Obbink and Shannon Stember, the Director and Assistant Director of Nutrition Services for PPS, to discuss how we could provide our students with food grown and prepared right here at Richmond in the education garden or food that is grown locally. It was very exciting to discover we discovered we were on the same page as Director Obbink and that we were all working toward the same goal of educating children about where food comes from, healthy food choices, and fighting childhood obesity. In order to move us toward our goal of supplementing our breakfast and lunch menu daily, we are going to begin by:

- 1. In April we will supplement the existing lunch menu with items like soba noodles, soup, produce, etc. These items must be submitted to Director Obbink prior to April for approval.
- 2. Our goal is to begin in September supplementing our breakfast and lunch menu each day of the week with our own Richmond-garden-grown produce and/or locally grown food (that will be subject to the regular PPS vendor bidding process).
- 3. We will become a part of a pilot study to use permanent ware dishes rather than the environmentally unsound and unfriendly Styrofoam trays. This will involve some volunteer/student dishwashing so more to come on this item.
- 4. PPS will come and inspect our stove/oven to ensure it is operating properly.
- 5. PPS will provide us with pots and pans to begin our supplementation process.

We are moving forward and will keep you updated! This is an exciting time!

# Why should your child learn Japanese?

## (Instead of another immersion language like Chinese, Spanish, Russian, etc..)

- Japan is the fifth largest exporter of goods, services and income.
- Japan has the largest official reserve in the world (IMF position and gold at market prices).
- The extent of Japan's economic and social aid to needy countries makes Japan the second most generous country in the world.
- Japan has the third highest innovation index in the world (a measure of the adoption of new technology and the interaction between business and the scientific sector), with the United States and Taiwan in first and second place respectively.
- Tokyo, Kobe and Osaka, Japan all have a higher quality of life index than Portland, Oregon.
- Japan has the second largest industrial, manufacturing and services output in the world, with the United States first.
- Japan leads the world in the number of patents granted to residents.

Japan is an economic world leader, second only to the United States in gross domestic product (GDP). Consider the following information from a Cornell University study (*The Dynamics of East Asian Regionalism*, 2006):

In terms of economic size Japan outranks China and will continue to do so for some time to come. In 2002 Japan accounted for 13.5 percent of global national income, compared to China's 3.5 percent. In terms of market exchanges, which best indicate regional power dynamics, Japan's GDP lead over China is roughly 4:1—about 40:1 on a per capita basis.

The majority of foreign-owned businesses in the Portland metro area, 14 of the top 25, have their headquarters in Japan, according to a recent list in the Portland Business Journal (Feb. 15, 2008). These businesses provide a wealth of employment opportunities for graduates of the Japanese Magnet Program and not a single business on the list has its headquarters in China, Russia or a Spanish-speaking country.



Educational Garden	Add a new classroom garden on the Richmond field to accom- modate full classes.	"North Garden" plan developed by garden committee; work party scheduled for Sat. Feb. 23 to begin to outline the new garden. See calendar for details.		
"From Scratch" Kitchen	Create Richmond kitchen modeled after Abernethy's food program.	Kitchen plan developed by Clint Jones, Richmond parent and professional chef. PTA president, Kristina Kallen, Clint Jones and Kathryn Anderson met with PPS Nutrition Services on Feb. 11 and received permission to begin with one "from scratch" entrée this spring. See PTA update on page 3 for more details.		
School Name Change	Involve Richmond community in formal name change to reflect Japanese immersion program.	Staff committee has led community in online and paper surveys to generate possible names; community feedback on top five names set for Thurs. Feb. 28th at 6:30-7:00 PM, prior to the PTA meeting. Final vote by students will be led by Student Council, while the community vote will be an online Zoomerang survey the week of March 10th. Presentation to PPS Board of Education in spring.		
Art Residencies	Establish calendar of artist residencies for the 2007-08 and 2008-09 school years. Committee of parents and teachers will begin to schedule artists for 2008-09 in the next month.		
Trip Transition from Oya No Kai to Portland Public Schools	Move trip coordination and leadership to Portland Public Schools.	Staff committee has met with Mt. Tabor teachers to learn their planning and approval process for the 8th grade trip. Surveys to parent chaperones and students from the 2007 trip have been completed and are being reviewed. Draft itinerary developed, with current work focusing on forms and required information to meet PPS policies. Kathryn has informed principals of sister schools in Japan that the 2009 trip will be a district coordinated trip.		
Performance Troupe	Establish a student performance troupe to represent Richmond at local festivals and cultural events.	A troupe of almost 40 students has been established by Ritsuko Fujiwara, our cultural arts specialist. Students practice with Fujiwarasensei during their recess breaks on Monday, Wednesday and Friday. A recent performance at Mochitsuki brought huge rounds of applause and recognition for these dedicated students.		
Adult Language Classes	Expand classes during school day and add a night option for working parents.	Japanese language classes offered on Tuesday mornings and Friday afternoons with big increase in enrollment. Parents will be able to use Rosetta Stone for supplemental language instruction from anywhere they have internet access by logging on from link on the Richmond website.		
Taiko Drums	Purchase and ship 10-15 taiko drums from Japan for classes at Richmond.	No progress on this initiative. Looking for grants to provide funding.

Playground Improvement	Add second new playground structure specially designed for kids in grades 3-5.	Completed during Winter vacation, thanks to the tireless work of Richmond's PTA leadership and Colleen O'Brien. Opus Northwest, one of the largest US construction firms, donated staff, materials and \$15,000 to the installation.
Bike Racks with Covers	Install bike racks for students, parents and staff on multiple sites on school grounds.	City of Portland has scheduled the free installation of more than 30 bike racks clustered in four areas: two in front of the school, one for adults only in the service space between buildings, and one for students on the playground, adjacent to the north side of the school. Bids have been gathered for structures to cover the racks (\$7,000-15,000) and funding is under research.
Fence Gates	Complete installation of gates at 41st and 42nd avenues.	Complete. New gates making a huge improvement in play- ground and school safety for our young students.
Japanese Garden	Install front garden per landscape plan by Sadafumi Uchiyama.	Garden estimate is \$33,000 and we've raised \$21,000 to date. Bids currently being generated for the installation of a sprinkler system and lighting. Committee plans to start construction in the spring.
Cultural Center	Finalize cultural center plan and revise cultural section of JMP curriculum.	Portland Schools Foundation grant being written to allow teachers to revise the entire JMP curriculum during the summer (\$52,000). Committee working on establishment of supplies and serving materials for our Japanese tea house and are finalizing an agreement with a renowned tea ceremony instructor to give lessons at Richmond.
Painting	Complete painting of hallways on 1st and 2nd floors of the school.	Almost complete! Hosted a big painting party on January 21st with volunteers from Richmond and Kaiser Permanente. Completed all hallway painting on 1st floor with white top coat remaining for completion on 2nd floor. Also started "green tea" painting of tile in all stairwells.
Grants	Secure grants for priorities set by Site Council for school improvement.	Parent grant committee has established a webpage on Richmond's website to share grant proposals and facilitate collaboration. Grants currently under development to fund: 1) the revision of the JMP curriculum; 2) two mobile laptop labs for classroom use; and 3) both garden projects (North fruit and veggie garden, Japanese garden).
Japanese Library Collection	Expand the collection of Japanese language library books.	Parent committee working with Fujiwara-sensei and Mrs. C. have selected and ordered over \$2,300 in Japanese language books for the library. Books have started to arrive in the library for student enjoyment!
