### A Letter from Carole Smith, Superintendent

Over the last few years, Portland Public Schools' central office has made huge strides in our efforts to again direct our energy where it belongs: The central mission of supporting our schools and educating our youth.

After long tough years of budget cuts and constant funding battles, we established three critical offices focused on our educational mission. First revived was the Office of Teaching and Learning, to lead our curriculum efforts and professional development to improve instructional practice.

Second, the Office of Schools has placed an intense emphasis on accountability, leadership development and continuing improvement to our schools serving pre-kindergarten through 8th grade.

And finally, we established the Office of High Schools, funded with a two-year grant from the Gates Foundation. The Office of High Schools has brought a new and much-needed focus on our high schools, digging deep into the data to spur reform, supporting new models and starting to weave together a true secondary system from our collection of independent high schools.

Superintendent Vicki Phillips created these separate offices to raise the profile of each of these high-stakes areas of reform, and attracted dynamic and talented leaders to carry the work forward. Together, the three chiefs, Judy Elliott, Barbara Adams and Leslie Rennie-Hill, built Portland Public Schools' capacity and strength in these critical areas through their energies and expertise.

Now it is time to move to the next stage of district reform. We must integrate these efforts and these offices into a seamless operation providing educational leadership and support for teaching and learning in all of our schools. And we must place principals at the center of the

work — both by involving them in the decision-making and vision of our school district at the highest levels and by making sure we all carry, at our core, the understanding that the central office exists to serve our schools, not the other way around.

As PPS evolves to meet those twin goals - an integrated, seamless focus on education and the voice of principals embedded in our work - I am making changes to the structure of our central leadership.

Today, I am posting the position of Chief Academic Officer. Starting July 1, the Chief Academic Officer will bring the functions of the Office of High Schools, the Office of Schools and the Office of Teaching and Learning together into one office. The Chief Academic Officer will

work with me to create a strong and coherent system of support and accountability for our efforts in improving instructional practice, managing day-to-day operations, and leading change in all of our schools, from pre-K through high school.

Some of you might be thinking "back to the future," recalling that PPS once had a Chief Academic Officer. While we are using the same title, I am re-establishing this office with a new focus, new vigor and new style of working with and for our schools. Our capacity to support

the work of our teachers, principals and schools has grown immensely over the last few years of high-profile work in the three separate offices. But together, under one chief, the

work will be stronger.

Once selected, the Chief Academic Officer and I will work closely on the structure of the department, reporting relationships and job responsibilities. That may leave many fine and dedicated leaders in a state of uncertainty for now, but I believe it is only fair to the prospective CAO to allow him or her to have a say in these decisions. I hope that you all understand the organizational imperatives behind this structural change: It is where we are right now as a district, and where we must go.

I am pleased to announce that Toni Hunter, currently principal at Grant High School, will be joining our central office team in July, working under the new CAO. Toni has served Portland students for more than three decades — as a teacher, counselor, program coordinator, TOSA, vice principal and principal — and I am delighted to have her taking on this new challenge. Toni's counsel and mentorship have been consistent assets to our school district, and her perspective as a seasoned and respected principal will help guide us to better decisions. Again, we will be able to define and describe her role more clearly later this spring. For now, I know she leaves large shoes to fill at Grant, and that community will want to get a jump on helping us select her replacement.

Ever onward! Portland Public Schools will continue to evolve in our quest to improve education for all students, and I am pleased that we continue to attract and cultivate talented leaders. Thank you for your ongoing dedication.



### Buy Coffee in compostable bags to Support Richmond's Elm Trees

Richmond school's 20 American Dutch Elm trees need to be inoculated every 3 years to resist Dutch Elm Disease which can kill the beautiful trees that shade our school grounds. During inoculations in June of 2007, we used 800 microinjections of a fungicide recommended by foresters to protect our trees. The cost per injection was \$3.50 for a total of \$2800. For the next round of inoculations in 2010, prices and shipping costs are expected to be slightly higher.

To raise money for the inoculations, Save Our Elms, a 501c(3) non-profit, partners with Portland Roasting to sell delicious, freshly roasted coffee to the Richmond community. \$4.60 from every bag of regular coffee sold allows us to buy approximately 1.31 microinjectors. (Save Our Elms gets \$5.05 from every bag of decaf coffee, too!) The coffee is delicious, environmentally friendly and costs \$10/pound for regular and \$11/pound for decaf. When you finish your coffee, you can remove the metal tie and put the bag in your compost or bury it in the ground.

If you haven't tried the coffee yet, ground regular coffee is available for purchase in the office. The price is \$10 /pound (checks made to Save Our Elms, please.) You can look in the coffee basket on Patsy's counter for the variety you like and either give your money to Patsy or place it in the box marked "Save Our Elms" on the office front wall. I place orders every Thursday morning at 8 AM for whole bean, decaf, and additional ground coffee. For an order, please fill out an order form (some are usually available on the table in front of the office or on Richmond's website) indicating your coffee choice and whole bean or ground preference and attach payment. (Please note decaf coffee costs \$11.00 a pound.) Coffee from orders will be available in the office by the next afternoon and it will be held in Patsy's coffee drawer just for you. Patsy can retrieve this for you; she is a great supporter of this program. We accept donations as well.

All coffees for Richmond are our Farm Friendly™ Direct coffees because as important to us as the quality of our coffee is our social responsibility. We strongly believe that we can make a positive difference in the coffee world through direct, socially responsible coffee sourcing. We pay growers a premium for their coffee with 100% of the premium going to farm and community projects. All of these projects are designed to give back directly to the farmers - furthering the long term sustainable infrastructure.

Ethiopian – Kochere: This coffee is part of Project H.O.P.E., which stands for Hope and Opportunity for the People of Ethiopia. We are helping build a much needed community center for the Ethiopian farming community of Kochere to provide a common meeting place for educational purposes, as well as a vital medical dispensary for the people of Kochere.


