As we all know, the international financial crisis is being felt here at home, and the state budget will be affected. Many of us are asking: how will this crisis affect our schools?

FROM THE SUPERINTENDENT

I want to let you know that Portland Public Schools budget remains stable this school year. We have the resources to cushion the impact of the financial crisis this year, due to the choices we have made in managing our budget. As we enter these financial straits, we are fortunate to have several strengths:

*With the local option, our community has helped us achieve fragile budget stability. *Through prudent financial management, the School Board has developed reserves that are adequate to weather this immediate downturn. This allows us time to plan appropriately how to curtail spending if and when revenues are further reduced. Such planning prepares us for making changes that have the least negative impact on students and employees.

*By managing our costs, we have kept our budget in alignment with conservative projections of our resources.

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On Friday, Governor Ted Kulongoski told the Oregon School Boards Association conference, "We are here today once more caught in the downdraft of the national economy." However, he said the state should not return to the "let everyone share the pain theory of budget deficits. . . . In tough times, children go to the head of the line." Education may indeed go to the head of the line, but the Governor was clear there just is not enough funding to go around. Governor Kulongoski already is calling for state school superintendent Susan Castillo to withhold \$130 million in School Improvement Funds (SIF) that school districts across Oregon were counting on this year to balance their budgets.

That could mean \$10 million less for Portland Public Schools this year, before any potential cuts we might face in the next state budget.

SIF represents about 4% of the State School Fund and it is an integral part of the state funding to schools. We use 100% of our funding to accomplish our mission to make every student college-ready and work-ready. The programs specifically supported by SIF dollars are not optional programs - instead, they are integral to the educational programs PPS provides its students.

We have used our school improvement funds locally to keep high school students on track to graduate by focusing on 9th graders who have had a history of missing classes or failing courses. SIF funds also support all our alternative school options for students who need a learning environment that supports their individualized needs.

Our commitment to those students, those programs and those staff remains. If state leaders choose to cut the SIF - in effect cutting every school district's budget mid-year - we must and we will continue to support all our high school students.

We do not know how long this international recession will last. It is essential for us to manage our reserves carefully and to spend cautiously. As Gov. Kulongoski told school board members on Friday, "If the money doesn't absolutely have to be spent, I urge you don't spend it.... It is going to get worse before it gets better."

Tomorrow, the state will receive its revenue forecast for the remainder of this school year and the next two-year budget cycle. Later this month, our finance staff will report to the School Board on our own PPS financial outlook.

The Governor will propose his 2009-2011 budget Dec. 1, the 2009 Legislature convenes January 5, and Portland Public Schools will begin our budget deliberations shortly thereafter.

This will be a tough time, and we will have to make some difficult decisions. As we move forward, we will continue to share what we know, when we know it, and call upon you to make your voice heard on behalf of our schools and our students.

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Thank you for your support - we will get through this, together.

Buy Coffee in compostable bags to Support Richmond's Elm Trees

Richmond school's 20 American Dutch Elm trees need to be inoculated every 3 years to resist Dutch Elm Disease which can kill the beautiful trees which shade our school grounds. During inoculations in June of 2007, we used 800 microinjections of a fungicide recommended by foresters to protect our trees. The cost per injection was \$3.50 for a total of \$2800. For the next round of inoculations in 2010, prices and shipping costs are expected to be slightly higher.

To raise money for the inoculations, Save Our Elms, a 501c(3) non-profit, partners with Portland Roasting to sell delicious, freshly roasted coffee to the Richmond community. \$4.60 from every bag of regular coffee sold allows us to buy approximately 1.31 microinjectors. (Save Our Elms gets \$5.05 from every bag of decaf coffee, too!) The coffee is delicious, environmentally friendly and costs \$10/pound for regular and \$11/pound for decaf.

If you haven't tried the coffee yet, ground regular coffee is available for purchase in the office. The price is \$10 /pound (checks made to <u>Save Our Elms</u>, please.) You can look in the coffee basket on Patsy's counter for the variety you like and either give your money to Patsy or place it in the box marked "Save Our Elms" on the office front wall. I place orders every Thursday morning at 8 AM for whole bean, decaf, and additional ground coffee. For an order, please fill out an order form (some are usually available on the table in front of the office or on Richmond's website) indicating your coffee choice and whole bean or ground preference and attach payment. (Please note decaf coffee costs \$11.00 a pound.) Coffee from orders will be available in the office by the next afternoon and it will be held in Patsy's coffee drawer just for you. Patsy can retrieve this for you; she is a great supporter of this program. We accept donations as well.

Portland Roasting descriptions:

All coffees for Richmond are our Farm Friendly[™] Direct coffees because as important to us as the quality of our coffee is our social responsibility. We strongly believe that we can make a positive difference in the coffee world through direct, socially responsible coffee sourcing. We pay growers a premium for their coffee with 100% of the premium going to farm and community projects. All of these projects are designed to give back directly to the farmers - furthering the long term sustainable infrastructure.

Ethiopian – Kochere: This coffee is part of Project H.O.P.E., which stands for Hope and Opportunity for the People of Ethiopia. We are helping build a much needed community center for the Ethiopian farming community of Kochere to provide a common meeting place for educational purposes, as well as a vital medical dispensary for the people of Kochere.

French Organic - Certified organic; dark roast

Tanager's Song – an organic blend (Central American and Indonesian certified shade grown coffees), silky-rich and full-bodied with a caramel-like finish.

Papua New Guinea - a single varietal that is passive organic.

Farm Friendly Direct, SWP (Swiss Water Process) French Decaf - directly sourced, chemical free, dark roast.

Farm Friendly Direct, SWP (Swiss Water Process) Morning Decaf - directly sourced, chemical free, light roast.
